OAKLAND COMMUNITY POLICING ADVISORY BOARD

RESOLUTION NO. 12-1-21

ADOPT A RESOLUTION DETERMINING THAT CONDUCTING IN-PERSON MEETINGS OF THE COMMUNITY POLICING ADVISORY BOARD AND ITS COMMITTEES WOULD PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO ATTENDEES' HEALTH, AND ELECTING TO CONTINUE CONDUCTING MEETINGS USING TELECONFERENCING IN ACCORDANCE WITH CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 54953(e), A PROVISION OF AB-361.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency related to COVID-19, pursuant to Government Code Section 8625, and such declaration has not been lifted or rescinded. *See* https://www.gov.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/2020/03/3.4.20-Coronavirus-SOE-Proclamation.pdf

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, the City Administrator in their capacity as the Director of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), issued a proclamation of local emergency due to the spread of COVID-19 in Oakland, and on March 12, 2020, the City Council passed Resolution No. 88075 C.M.S. ratifying the proclamation of local emergency pursuant to Oakland Municipal Code (O.M.C.) section 8.50.050(C); and

WHEREAS, City Council Resolution No. 88075 remains in full force and effect to date; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends physical distancing of at least six (6) feet whenever possible, avoiding crowds, and avoiding spaces that do not offer fresh air from the outdoors, particularly for people who are not fully vaccinated or who are at higher risk of getting very sick from COVID-19. See https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html;

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends that people who live with unvaccinated people avoid activities that make physical distancing hard. *See https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/about-covid-19/caring-for-children/families.html*;

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends that older adults limit in-person interactions as much as possible, particularly when indoors. *See* https://www.cdc.gov/aging/covid19/covid19-older-adults.html;

- **WHEREAS**, the CDC, the California Department of Public Health, and the Alameda County Public Health Department all recommend that people experiencing COVID-19 symptoms stay home. *See* https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/if-you-are-sick/steps-when-sick.html;
- **WHEREAS**, persons without symptoms may be able to spread the COVID-19 virus. *See* https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html;
- **WHEREAS**, fully vaccinated persons who become infected with the COVID-19 Delta variant can spread the virus to others. *See* https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/fully-vaccinated.html;
- WHEREAS, the City's public-meeting facilities are indoor facilities that do not designed to ensure circulation of fresh / outdoor air, particularly during periods of cold and/or rainy weather, and were not designed to ensure that attendees can remain six (6) feet apart; now therefore be it:
- WHEREAS, holding in-person meetings would encourage community members to come to City facilities to participate in local government, and some of them would be at high risk of getting very sick from COVID-19 and/or would live with someone who is at high risk; and
- WHEREAS, in-person meetings would tempt community members who are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms to leave their homes in order to come to City facilities and participate in local government; and
- WHEREAS, attendees would use ride-share services and/or public transit to travel to inperson meetings, thereby putting them in close and prolonged contact with additional people outside of their households; now therefore be it:
- **RESOLVED:** that the Community Policing Advisory Board finds and determines that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and hereby adopts and incorporates them into this Resolution; and be it
- **FURTHER RESOLVED:** that, based on these determinations and consistent with federal, state and local health guidance, the Community Policing Advisory Board determines that conducting in-person meetings would pose imminent risks to the health of attendees; and be it
- **FURTHER RESOLVED:** that the Community Policing Advisory Board firmly believes that the community's health and safety seriously and the community's right to participate in local government, are both critically important, and is committed to balancing the two by continuing to use teleconferencing to conduct public meetings, in accordance with California Government Code Section 54953(e), a provision of AB-361; and be it
- **FURTHER RESOLVED:** that the Community Policing Advisory Board will renew these (or similar) findings at least every thirty (30) days in accordance with California Government Code section 54953(e) until the state of emergency related to COVID-19 has been lifted, or the

OUSD - CPAB - Neighborhood Council Partnership

As embedded institutions in our neighborhoods and communities, schools are often the epicenter for many activities that involve a broad array of members from the community -- children, parents, grandparents, to name a few.

On one hand, in respect to OUSD schools, a partnership among OUSD, the CPAB and Neighborhood Councils could create opportunities for principals, teachers, and staff to (i) build deeper ties to the community and (ii) develop a better understanding of the issues affecting their school's community. It may also create educational opportunities for their students to work with teachers on in-classroom and out-of-classroom projects aimed at addressing community issues and challenges while empowering students to begin building the community of which they dream for themselves.

On the other hand, in respect to Neighborhood Councils, building relationships with schools could create other ways to engage a broader segment of the community while offering opportunities to work with young people and school leaders in community-building and neighborhood projects. Further, Neighborhood Councils (and the CPAB) can serve as a space for young voices to be heard and as an organizing platform for ideas to be shared and advocacy to occur.

By setting the foundation for civic engagement at a young age, it is our hope that our young people today, with the guidance of our teachers, parents and community members, can become the community leaders of tomorrow.

Action Plan

- Organize meetings between NC leaders and the school sites in their respective neighborhoods
- Plan a project between the NC and neighborhood school
- Implement the project

Neighborhood Kickbacks

What is a Kickback? It is a low-key, informal gathering among neighbors and residents of nearby blocks. It is an opportunity for neighbors to connect and build relationships while also bringing attention to, or organizing around, issues and collaborating on projects.

Who might attend? Anyone who lives or works on the block or nearby neighborhood. This might include business owners, public safety personnel such as OPD and OFD, community organizations and City employees, such as Neighborhood Services, whose jurisdiction is specifically the block or neighborhood. These are intimate gatherings that are hyper-local.

What is the format? It is relaxed! It can be an opportunity for folks to share some food or drinks, connect and talk. It may include a speaker such as Chief Armstrong or it may be attended by NSCs, CROs or OFD personnel who mix with the group and have 1:1 conversations. It also might include a Collaborative Neighborhood Gathering (CoNeeG) where neighbors come together, and those that are interested, give stuff, get stuff and meet others (more on this aspect to come – Jenny Z. of 22x has spearheaded this project).

What is the purpose? Building a tight-knit neighborhood and developing stronger relationships among neighbors and community members! Attendees should feel comfortable and open to share things about themselves such as personal interests or passions. Attendees should also be encouraged to discuss ideas on how to collaborate on projects and impact issues.

What is the desired outcome? Closer relationships, a better understanding of issues or constraints and the start of increased neighborhood collaboration and connection.

OPD Monthly Report

2) Relevant OPD Crime Statistics with Explanation

Please see Citywide and Police Area 3 Year-To-Date Crime Reports for the last available period. There was a significant increase in shootings, robberies, carjackings and homicides in Area 3. Area 3 Community Resource Officers met with community members both in community meetings and through regular day to day interactions. These meetings subsequently provided officers with information regarding illicit activity occurring in illegal gambling establishments in District 3. Historically, there has been violence associated to these illegal gambling shacks. There have been several shootings and homicides at and around these illegal gambling shacks.

3) Community Policing Projects and Updates

Projects: 19x-21-002 Illegal Casinos

CRO: Ofc. G. Aranda 8453

Supervisor: Sgt. E. Kim

Background:

This project was opened due to community concern, complaints and the increased violence in Area 3. There has been a pattern of violence associated to illegal gambling establishments. It has been CRO 3's focus to solve the issues regarding the illegal gambling establishments to reduce violent crime. The issues were identified as:

- Illegal Gambling
- Narcotics use and sales
- Armed guards
- Illegally owned firearms to include assault weapons
- Violent crimes such as shootings and murders
- Stolen vehicles located outside of these establishments

Service were provided in the following ways:

- Officers gathered intelligence on the illegal gambling establishments that were typically located in business or residences. Some of the ways intelligence was gathered was by conducting surveillance, reading prior reports associated with these locations, and listening to community members who had voiced their concerns.
- Once enough intelligence was gathered Officers in CRO 3 authored warrants for the illegal gambling establishments. Officers then executed the search warrants. The items that were recovered included but were not limited to:
 - Illegal gambling machines
 - US Currency
 - o Firearms
 - Narcotics
 - o Pay/Owe Sheets
- Once a search warrant was executed CRO 3 officers would contact the City Attorney's office, who would then contact the tenants and/or the property owner with the hope that the owner would find new tenants for the property. The City Attorney's office advises the owners of the property that if the illegal activity continues at their property, legal action will be taken against them.
- CRO 3 officers would also contacted OFD and request the Fire Inspector conduct a fire inspection at the property, as several of these properties are modified for the purposes of the illegal gambling establishment.
- Officers conduct regular patrols in the area after search warrants have been executed to ensure that the illegal gambling establishment does not open back up. Officers will also keep in touch with community members to ensure that the gambling establishment does not open again.
- So far in 2021 CRO 3 has conducted 3 search warrants at illegal gambling establishments some of the recoveries they have had are:
 - o 14 firearms
 - o Firearm parts
 - Ammunition
 - o Ballistic Vest
 - Large amounts of US currency
 - Illegal gambling machines
 - Large amounts of narcotics
- 4) Please provide data on the number of non-emergency 911 calls that were successfully diverted to community partners or alternative first responders.

Diversion programs are not yet in place.

5) Please indicate areas in which the CPAB can support, and engage NCPCs and block level ambassadors in supporting, community policing strategies and initiatives.

The relationship between NCPC's and like groups, block ambassadors, etc. could be improved upon by continuing to promote transparency and by improving upon the way we communicate and collaborate as a department. Open forums where uniformed officers can provide answers to real questions asked by community members and representatives. These forums could be created to build a bridge between the women and men of the police department and those who are distrustful. An emphasis would be placed on providing details on how and why certain things are done the way they are by OPD as well as reasons that they need to be done in this manner. This would be an opportunity to have the difficult conversations that everyone could benefit from if they are willing to have the conversation in a constructive manner.

Mr. Ubell expressd concern about the proposed mediation and conflict resolution session and suggested discussing the types of conflicts community members should try and resolve.

Ms. Stage explained that she thought all the topics on the survey are important. She was particularly interested in outreach coupled with equity and diversity as it relates to the census data. Her Neighborhood Council is focused this year on increasing both ethnic and racial diversity, in addition to encouraging participation of community members of various ages and family structures.

Vice Chair Ettlinger thanked the attendees for making some great points. He discussed conflict resolution and when to engage. Encouraged the Board to be mindful about what exactly attendees will get out of the trainings.
