# 6A. REQUEST FOR THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION TO APPROVE LOCATION AND INSTALLATION OF PUBLIC ART MURAL IN CELEBRATION OF OAKLAND FUKUOKA SISTER CITY 60TH ANNIVERSARY AND COMMUNITY BUILDING.

Jennifer Valles, Acting Park Supervisor 1, Parks and Trees Services Division with the Public Works Department (OPW), presented the report. OPW fully supports the project and approves the request for installation of a public mosaic art mural at the Gardens of Lake Merritt. The mural commemorates the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Oakland's relationship with Oakland Fukuoka Sister City Association (OFSCA). The OFSCA project is fully funded and does not require financial or maintenance obligations. Ms. Valles introduced JJ Kotler, OFSCA, Board of Director, who made a presentation with exhibits about the roles and responsibilities of the team members and design details of the mural. One of the artists, Rachel Rodi, spoke about the materials and methods of the mosaic. Peter Bowyer, OFSCA's Garden Lead, spoke about the lattice work of the design and location of the mosaic in the Gardens.

There were no public speakers.

6B. REQUEST FOR THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION RECOMMEND THE RENAMING OF MADISON SQUARE PARK IN HONOR OF ALAMEDA COUNTY SUPERVISOR WILMA CHAN'S LEGACY, AND APPROVE THE INSTALLATION OF A BENCH OR PLAQUE MEMORIALIZING THE NAME CHANGE.

Tiffany Kang, from the Office of City Council President Nikki Fortunato Bas, District 2, made the presentation along with Mike Loc, Asian Health Services. In honor of Supervisor Wilma Chan's legacy, the Office of Council President Fortunato Bas respectfully requests the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission to recommend renaming Madison Square Park to Wilma Chan Park. Renaming the park would unite the community. Supervisor Chan was a great champion of the community as well as other communities. Some of the issues that Supervisor Chan worked on was homelessness, women's empowerment, and criminal justice reform. Residents and the community and hope the values will be reflective of the park.

## 8. <u>UPDATE FROM THE DIRECTOR, COMMITTEES, RECREATION ADVISORY COUNCILS, COMMUNICATIONS & ANNOUNCEMENTS:</u>

#### **Director's Report:**

o Director Williams attending Parks and Recreation conference this week.

#### **PRAC Committees:**

- Priority & Goals Ad Hoc Committee: Vice Chair Tran reported that they are
  putting together an on-boarding packet, a Commissioner handbook. Vice Chair
  was thinking about some type of strategic plan of goals or objectives for
  themselves. What do they want to achieve? What does success look like?
  Want to get the Commissioners together to have a session to put the
  information together.
- o Park Rules & Regulations Committee: No update. Commissioner Kos-Read commented that they may need some help from staff.
- o Tree Advisory Committee: No formal update. Commissioner Ha highlighted the Urban Forest Resource Analysis which is the latest report from the Urban Forest Master Plan effort. The report included the comparative cost of replacing the existing tree canopy with the equivalent size, species, and condition, which is about \$192 million dollars. Currently, the City invests \$3.5 million dollars into the management of these trees. Approximately 90% of trees are considered to be in overall fair or better condition. Commissioner Ha also highlighted the Land Cover Assessment that looks at the number of tree canopy covers. Oakland's tree canopy covers approximately 21.5 % and the report looks over the different neighborhoods and Council districts and assesses where they are in comparison to each other.
- o Lake Merritt: No update. Will contact Greg Minor to come back with a report.

#### **Recreation Advisory Councils (RAC):**

#### Commissioner Ha:

O Spoke to some members of the Friends of San Antonio Park (FoSAP). They put out their finalized community report that can be viewed on their website, <a href="https://www.friendsofsapark.org">www.friendsofsapark.org</a>. The community desires to expand programming by partnering with non-profits. From the last budget cycle, there's going to be two new staff members at the Recreation Center and believes Human Resources is going through the process of creating eligible candidates. Other recommendations from the FoSAP include a future new recreation community center and potential library and sports facility, repairing existing infrastructure and strengthen park stewardship through different programs and partnerships.

#### Chair Allen:

Mosswood: Chair Allen was not able to attend the March meeting. A report was provided about what PRAC has been doing in Measure Q. They are working with a non-profit and moving forward with painting the murals on the

Field House. The non-profit, the Bay Area Mural Project, has gifted \$2000 to Mosswood Park to go towards the garden beautification located on the back side near MacArthur and Webster.

#### **Announcements:**

#### Chair Allen:

- Measure Q update from Sean Maher: The City applied for and won a significant grant from CalTrans to improve maintenance projects in mini parks.
- Watershed group received a CalTrans grant to help with the storm drainage system and other things. Five percent of Measure Q is allocated to watershed and clean water efforts.

- O Thanks to former Commissioner Coire Reilly. The PRAC Annual Report was completed and covers the years 2020 and 2021. Coire Reilly worked on most of the report. Chair Allen provided a few additional pieces and forwarded completed report to Assistant Director Dana Riley. Staff will create a cover memo and schedule the item on the Life Enrichment Committee in April.

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 2021-03**

ADOPT A RESOLUTION DETERMINING THAT CONDUCTING IN-PERSON MEETINGS OF THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION AND ITS COMMITTEES WOULD PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO ATTENDEES' HEALTH, AND ELECTING TO CONTINUE CONDUCTING MEETINGS USING TELECONFERENCING IN ACCORDANCE WITH CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 54953(e), A PROVISION OF AB-361.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency related to COVID-19, pursuant to Government Code Section 8625, and such declaration has not been lifted or rescinded. *See* <a href="https://www.gov.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/2020/03/3.4.20-Coronavirus-SOE-Proclamation.pdf">https://www.gov.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/2020/03/3.4.20-Coronavirus-SOE-Proclamation.pdf</a>; and

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, the City Administrator in their capacity as the Director of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), issued a proclamation of local emergency due to the spread of COVID-19 in Oakland, and on March 12, 2020, the City Council passed Resolution No. 88075 C.M.S. ratifying the proclamation of local emergency pursuant to Oakland Municipal Code (O.M.C.) section 8.50.050(C); and

WHEREAS, City Council Resolution No. 88075 remains in full force and effect to date; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends physical distancing of at least six (6) feet whenever possible, avoiding crowds, and avoiding spaces that do not offer fresh air from the outdoors, particularly for people who are not fully vaccinated or who are at higher risk of getting very sick from COVID-19. See <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html">https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html</a>; and

**WHEREAS**, the CDC recommends that people who live with unvaccinated people avoid activities that make physical distancing hard. *See https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/about-covid-19/caring-for-children/families.html*; and

**WHEREAS**, the CDC recommends that older adults limit in-person interactions as much as possible, particularly when indoors. *See* <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/aging/covid19/covid19-older-adults.html">https://www.cdc.gov/aging/covid19/covid19-older-adults.html</a>; and

**WHEREAS**, the CDC, the California Department of Public Health, and the Alameda County Public Health Department all recommend that people experiencing COVID-19

symptoms stay home. *See* <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/if-you-are-sick/steps-when-sick.html">https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/if-you-are-sick/steps-when-sick.html</a>; and

**WHEREAS**, persons without symptoms may be able to spread the COVID-19 virus. *See* <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html">https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html</a>; and

WHEREAS, fully vaccinated persons who become infected with the COVID-19 Delta variant can spread the virus to others. *See* <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/fully-vaccinated.html">https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/fully-vaccinated.html</a>; and

WHEREAS, the City's public-meeting facilities are indoor facilities that do not ensure circulation of fresh / outdoor air, particularly during periods of cold and/or rainy weather, and were not designed to ensure that attendees can remain six (6) feet apart; and

WHEREAS, holding in-person meetings would encourage community members to come to City facilities to participate in local government, and some of them would be at high risk of getting very sick from COVID-19 and/or would live with someone who is at high risk; and

WHEREAS, in-person meetings would tempt community members who are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms to leave their homes in order to come to City facilities and participate in local government; and

WHEREAS, attendees would use ride-share services and/or public transit to travel to inperson meetings, thereby putting them in close and prolonged contact with additional people outside of their households; and

WHEREAS, on October 13, 2021, year the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission adopted a resolution determining that conducting in-person meetings would present imminent risks to attendees' health, and electing to continue conducting meetings using teleconferencing in accordance with California Government Code Section 54953(e), a provision of AB-361; now therefore be it:

**RESOLVED:** that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission finds and determines that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and hereby adopts and incorporates them into this resolution; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission will renew these (or similar) findings at least every thirty (30) days in accordance with California Government Code section 54953(e) until the state of emergency related to COVID-19 has been lifted, or the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission finds that in-person meetings no longer pose imminent risks to the health of attendees, whichever occurs first.



#### **SUMMARY**

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

Since this report is informational only, no fiscal impacts are included.

#### BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Measure Q, approved by Oakland voters in March 2020, provides funding for City of Oakland services related to parks maintenance, homelessness services, and water quality, subject to civilian oversight. The Oakland City Council assigned PRAC the oversight role regarding the Measure Q expenditures related to parks maintenance and water quality services.

As a component of this oversight function, OPW routinely submits to PRAC updates on hiring of positions related to Measure Q-funded park maintenance services. This report provides an update for the PRAC's meeting of February 9, 2022. For the first time, this report now also includes a chart representing hiring trends, so that PRAC and the public can see how hiring and staffing of Measure Q positions is changing over time.

Additionally, Measure Q includes service performance requirements. OPW has been working with the PRAC Measure Q ad hoc committee and with community members to develop a reporting template for measuring and tracking performance of those services. The department's goal is a routine report that is clear, simple, and accessible to the community to provide transparent and accessible reporting on service delivery. This will be an iterative process, and OPW welcomes feedback from PRAC on how the department can continue honing that reporting template.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

OPW recommends that PRAC accept this informational report.







Midcycle Budget Process

Dear Oakland Public Works,

As Chair of PRAC, which is assigned by City Council, the community oversight of Measure Q funding expenditure related to parks services and water quality services, I am writing this memo to request OPW include the following information from PRAC as part of its department submittal for the Department Proposal phase of the FY 2022-23 Midcycle Budget Process.

In PRAC's March 9, 2022 meeting, the Commission heard and unanimously accepted the below informational report. In particular, PRAC would like to emphasize the information regarding parks and parks facilities projects that are unfunded, and eligible for Measure Q funding, as well as the mapping data staff provided. At the request of the PRAC, OPW produced an interactive map representing project data overlaid on the OakDOT Geographic Equity Toolbox mapping data. The OakDOT Geographic Equity Toolbox was created as a data-driven way for the City of Oakland to recognize and prioritize neighborhoods based on concentrations of people with demographic factors determined to have experienced historic, and current disparities. The project data overlaid against this information is available at this ink: https://arcg.is/1W18af0.

As reflected in the Commission's discussion of this item and in the unanimous vote to accept the report, PRAC recommends that any fund balances and/or carry forward funds from Measure Q that are identified in this midcycle process and are eligible for project spending be prioritized through the process described in the report, as well as through an equitable lens prioritizing projects in equity priority neighborhoods, as identified by data in this mapping. PRAC also requests in advance that when the draft midcycle budget is released later this spring, the Commission be briefed in writing on how the draft responds to this recommendation.

# **SUMMARY**

This report provides OPW's routine updates to PRAC regarding the hiring of staff related to Measure Q-funded park maintenance services. For reference, this report includes the draft reporting of OPW's performance measures in the delivery of Measure Q-funded services, as presented at the February 9, 2022 PRAC meeting – however, staff are still implementing new improvements to that reporting and incorporating stakeholder input, so that reporting here is unchanged from the February report.

This report also includes the OPW Park and Facility Maintenance/Project List, for projects that are eligible to be Measure Q, 4400-Deferred Maintenance and CDBG funded, as well as spreadsheets and mapping of that information.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

Since this report is informational only, no fiscal impacts are included.

#### BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Measure Q, approved by Oakland voters in March 2020, provides funding for City of Oakland services related to parks maintenance, homelessness services, and water quality, subject to civilian oversight. The Oakland City Council assigned PRAC the oversight role regarding the Measure Q expenditures related to parks maintenance and water quality services.

As a component of this oversight function, OPW routinely submits to PRAC updates on hiring of positions related to Measure Q-funded park maintenance services. This report provides an update for the PRAC's meeting of February 9, 2022. For the first time, this report now also includes a chart representing hiring trends, so that PRAC and the public can see how hiring and staffing of Measure Q positions is changing over time.

Additionally, Measure Q includes service performance requirements. OPW has been working with the PRAC Measure Q ad hoc committee and with community members to develop a reporting template for measuring and tracking performance of those services. The department's goal is a routine report that is clear, simple, and accessible to the community to provide transparent and accessible reporting on service delivery. This will be an iterative process, and OPW welcomes feedback from PRAC on how the department can continue honing that reporting template.

# **RECOMMENDATION**

OPW recommends that PRAC accept this informational report.





# OPW Park and Facility Maintenance/Project List Measure Q, 4400-Deferred Maintenance and CDBG funded

OPW's Facilities Services and Parks and Tree Services Divisions is responsible for maintenance at all City Facilities and Parks. The Facilities Services Division estimates a backlog of \$35-\$40M of deferred maintenance at City Facilities overall. This does not include replacement of building systems, HVAC upgrades, and mandatory upgrades including natural gas to electrical conversions at all City Facilities by year 2030.

OPW has compiled a prioritized deferred maintenance project list for City facilities, these projects are funded through various funding sources, including Facilities Fund 4400 - O&M, Facilities Fund 4400 - Deferred Maintenance, CDBG Funds and Measure Q Funds. These lists include many of the projects that we are currently working on but doesn't include all of the deferred maintenance required at City Facilities -- as that list is continually growing.


The deferred maintenance list and MQ list was forwarded to the committee for the purposes of this discussion. The lists show projects funded by MQ for FY21-22 total 3,235,564. It also shows that an additional \$3M in other repairs and projects that will utilize MQ and other funds to complete, these are either waiting for quotes, in progress or waiting for additional funding to complete. Lastly the lower section of the list includes additional projects/ repairs that are currently unfunded, this unfunded group is estimated to cost around \$8M-\$10M. This list continues to grow faster than the funds become available to complete them.

Due to the ramp-up time it took to hire all of the various positions associated with Measure Q, OPW realized a significant salary savings in the first year of the Measure and was able to utilize some of those funds to complete other critical projects included on the list. OPW has now completed the majority of hiring for the positions, there are several remaining custodial positions to be filled in the next 30-60 days which will reduce or eliminate any future salary savings.

OPW Facilities Division prioritizes the work on the list based on health and safety, prevention of injuries or accidents, ensuring the safe healthy operation of parks and facilities, preservation of city parks and facilities. The projects list is generated through service requests or reports from citizens, employees, customers and visitors through OAK311 and Cityworks. The list is also generated by staff performing inspections or repairs, preventative maintenance work and responding to service requests. Some work is generated through the CIP process or in coordination with the Mayor, City Administrator, Council offices, Department representatives and community groups.

The projects list is provided in PDF spreadsheet format, and will be posted to the Measure Q web page. At the request of the PRAC Measure Q Ad Hoc Committee, OPW has also produced an interactive map representing project data overlaid on the OakDOT Geographic Equity Toolbox mapping data. The OakDOT Geographic Equity Toolbox was created as a data-driven way for the City of Oakland to recognize and prioritize neighborhoods based on concentrations of people with demographic factors determined to have experienced historic and current disparities. 

Governed by a Board of Trustees, the Conservation Society of California manages and operates Oakland Zoo and is comprised of dedicated volunteers who provide oversight of the organization's mission, core values and policies.

#### Overview of the Event

Oakland Zoo's Centennial Celebration is set to be held on Sunday, June 5, 2022, from 11:00 a.m. -3:00 p.m. at Snow Park in downtown Oakland, where the Zoo began. This "birthday party" event will include live music, food, entertainment, and interactive fun and will no doubt be an event talked about long into the future. This birthday celebration event is free to all to attend.

At the event, Activities will be centered in the two-thirds of the park nearest Harrison Street, 20th Street and Lakeside Drive; the activities will be anchored in that half of the park, though the public is expected to use the full run of the park. Activities are set to include free-standing 10x10 pop-up tents with interactive activities and giveaways from community organizations and partners, with some items for sale, a stage

with live entertainment with space in front of the stage for the audience to watch and picnic, and an artsy photo backdrop wall for selfies. The stage will be located in the corner of the park nearest Lakeside Drive. The low stage will feature family-friendly entertainment from Oakland Zoo, Children's Fairyland, EarthCapades (juggling and clowning), and more, with a birthday sing-along and finale musical performance. Food vendors will be available to sell food to the public, with food trucks parked on Harrison (towards the corner of 20th Street) and 1-2 dessert vendors in the park.

The expected attendance is expected to have a high of approximately 1,000 people at any one time, with an all-day total of up to 2,000 people.
