

Our Communities Deserve to Dream




- ★ We can do better than "not dead" or "less poor"


1968 Poor People's March

Demands from 1968

- A meaningful job at a living wage
- A secure and adequate income for all those unable to find or do a job
- Access to land for economic uses.
- Access to capital for poor people and minorities to promote their own businesses
- Ability for ordinary people to play a truly significant role in the government

Not very different from our communities' demands today.

A VERY Brief History of Modern **Policing**



Wasn't Juneteenth the abolition of slavery?

First go watch 13th on Netflix!

No. Emancipation freed only enslaved people in 11 Confederate states, including Texas.

Post Emancipation Proclamation: 13th Amendment ratified the abolition of slavery and repackaged/reformed slavery into policing and prison culture.

13th Amendment

13th Amendment Adoption on January 31,1865, stated:

Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction."

Freedom from enslavement meant new laws and policies meant to suppress black communities seeking to thrive, and that threatened White prosperity.

Movement for Black Lives Demand 1:

Defund Police

Police budgets account for 44% of Oakland's general fund. Given that we're in the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression now is the time to scrutinize police budgets; rethink the role of the police; and center our health, safety, and well-being. We need bold, visionary action right now.

Rooted in History

Policing as an extension of slavery and Whiteness:

1704: First slave patrols in the south; created to preserve slavery, chase down runaways (think sheriff departments, bounty hunters and probation officers) and preventing slave uprisings/revolts Policing for property:

1838: first organized police dept. Formed in Boston; result of Boston being a large commercial center and businesses eating the costs of protecting their property.

Transferred those costs to the public.

M4BL Demand 2:

Invest in Black Communities

The record unemployment our nation is currently experiencing comes at the tail end of decades of disinvestment in Black communities and Black people. It is time to make real investments in our communities. That means diverting wasteful spending on militarized police and investing in community-based programs like healthcare, education, and housing that we know keep us safer, allow us to thrive, and preserve our dignity.




Criminalization and Punishment over Safe and Thriving communities

2013: Chicago closes 49 elementary schools and one high school to close a \$1 billion deficit; that same year, the city's federal litigation budget to defend police shootings, use of force etc. was funded at \$4.6 million.

Total police budget for Fy 2013 was over \$300 million





Source: Fiscal Year 2015-17 Adopted Policy Budget, City of Oakland




Reimagining Public Safety





Acknowledge the Legacy & Set the New Culture

- The disparities in the criminal legal system didn't happen by accident. They are the result of intentional policies, and undoing them requires the same level of intentionality
- Start divestment right away focusing first on proven ways to limit community interaction with the police
 & well tested harm reduction strategies (Decriminalize all ordinances, safe injection sites, housing)
- Increase direct citizen oversight, as well as limit police authorities





Imagineering with Our People


- ★ How do we care for the vulnerable
