

Fire safety: How East Bay MUD is preparing for Public Safety Power Shutoffs

During the 2019 and 2020 wildfire seasons, PG&E may turn off electricity in designated areas when multiple extreme fire danger conditions are forecasted (such as Red Flag Warnings, low humidity, high winds, and dry conditions). These precautions are called Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) and are authroized by the State Public Utilities Commission (PUC).

While PSPS is focused on high fire-threat areas, outages may affect almost <u>any</u> EBMUD water facility. To learn more about EBMUD's action plan in the case of a PSPS, and for tips on preparing for the possibility, please <u>download the flyer</u> or visit <u>ebmud.com/psps</u>.

Prevention: Vegetation Abatement of City Property - Update

This season the Oakland Vegetation Management Unit, under the leadership of the incomparable Vince Crudele, has managed significant vegetation abatement of city and public roadside properties. As of mid-August, here are the numbers:



Completed May 1 - June 30:

- Broadway Terrace and City lots 4.10 acres 1.32 Miles of roadway
- Grizzly Peak Blvd. to G Peak Estates 4.47 acres 4.0 Miles of roadway
- Keller Avenue, Elysian Fields 12.89 acres 2.08 Miles of roadway
- Montclair RR Trail, Shepherd Cyn. Rd. 6.56 acres 0.26 Miles of roadway
- Oak Knoll, Fontaine St, Golf Links Rd. 4.6 acres 0.5 Miles of roadway
- Redwood Road and Lots, Campus Dr 6.88 acres 0.85 Miles of roadway
- Shepherd Canyon and Snake Road 2.83 acres 1.63 Miles of roadway
- Skyline Blvd, JM road to Redwood Rd 8.40 acres 3.7 Miles of roadway
- Skyline Blvd, Keller to Grass Valley 6.10 acres 1.75 Miles of roadway
- Skyline Blvd, Redwood to Keller Ave 50.34 acres 13.30 miles of roadway
- Tunnel Road, Hiller Drive 3.75 acres 1.20 Miles of roadway

Completed since July 1

- Clarewood Dr / Broadway 3.0 acres 1.5 Miles of roadway
- Girvin Drive 4.86 acres 0.29 Miles of roadway In progress (as of 8.14)
- Golf Links Road 2.13 acres 1.67 Miles of roadway
- Joaquin Miller Road 1.79 acres 0.68 Miles of roadway
- Panoramic Way 1.15 acres 0.25 Miles of roadway In progress (as of 8.14)
- Park Blvd, Monterey Bl 4.75 acres 2.75 Miles of roadway
- Skyline Blvd 7000 Blk 4.47 acres 2.1 Miles of roadway
- Skyline Blvd 7300 Blk. 1.42 acres 0.32 Miles of roadway -In progress (as of 8.14)
- Skyline Blvd 7800 Blk lots 2.28 acres 0.16 miles of roadway
- Skyline Blvd 8000 Blk lots 2.96 acres 0.31 Miles of roadway
- Skyline Blvd 9000 Blk lots 2.32 acres 0.24 Miles of roadway

Season totals to date: 146.55 Acres cleared, 42.96 Miles of roadside vegetation abated.

In addition, 3400 goats have been deployed - 400 at Shepherd Canyon, 1600 at Knowland Park, 700 at Dunsmuir/Sheffield Village, and 700 near the North Oakland sports field. Goats have grazed 800 plus acres of City parcels.

My office also is requesting a summary of private property inspections, which will be reported in a forthcoming newsletter.

Oakland Creek to Bay Day \ Battle for the Bay

Battle for the Bay/Oakland Creek-to-Bay Day is part of California and International Coastal Cleanup Day, the largest volunteer day in our state and the world. On this day, hundreds of thousands of volunteers remove litter from waterways and shorelines across California, the nation, and in about 100 participating countries.

This year the mayors and cities of Oakland and San Francisco have challenged each other to a friendly competition for the biggest, best, and most impactful cleanup. Cleaning and greening projects in Oakland keep litter from going downstream through Oakland's creeks to San Francisco Bay and the oceans and beaches beyond.

In 2018, more than 1,700 Oakland volunteers removed over 250 cubic yards of trash and cleared over 230 cubic yards of invasive plants and weeds from creeks, parks, shoreline and medians at 55 Oakland locations. These local activities add up to large-scale positive environmental impacts, especially when taken together with coinciding cleanups throughout the Bay Area, California and in about 100 countries participating in Coastal Cleanup Days.

Habitat restoration and litter removal at Oakland's creeks improves wildlife habitat and helps filter pollutants before they reach the San Francisco Bay. Keeping trash out of streets and waterways also helps prevent flooding by allowing storm water to flow through unobstructed storm drains. Oakland Creek-to-Bay Day raises awareness about sources of water pollution, and is a fun, community-building event for participants of all ages and abilities.

Volunteers of all ages and abilities are invited to Battle for the Bay/Creek-to-Bay Day! Projects include trash removal, habitat restoration, tree planting, and beautification. All tools are provided. Turn the tide on trash and dumping and keep our cities and Bay clean, healthy and beautiful!

In District One, volunteers are needed at Dover Street Edible Park, Garber Park, Glen Echo Park, FROG Park, Rockridge Temescal Greenbelt (near DMV), and Mosswood Park Recreation Center (District One adjacent). Legislative Projects

I have been leading the development of several new city legislative efforts that will be considered for adoption later this year.

- · Cannabis business tax fairness
- Business tax reduction for very small landlords
- Condo conversion reform to reduce displacement
- Exotic & wild performing animals ban to discourage torture of animals
- Ban on gas-powered leaf blowers and string trimmers
- Building de-carbonization (ban on natural gas in new building construction)

In addition. I am continuing to work on increasing resources for public safety and violence reduction in District 1, and to facilitate the creation of additional, much-needed affordable housing units in our city.
