Initial Scope - Councilmember Fife's Office will work with cultural strategist Rashida Chase in District 3 to support the development of a process and template for establishing cultural districts that reflect and honor the legacy and new contributions of West Oakland communities. This process, which may also be interwoven into a relaunching of the Mosaics program, will activate public spaces and increase public safety in District 3 via cultural exchange through food, music, art, fashion an d more. The Cultural Strategist will be responsible for engaging West Oakland's diverse communities, activating public space, and contributing to a culturally resonant process around establishing cultural districts. A successful project will include a road - map of how to create cultural districts in Oakland that advance equity and strengthen belonging in a pluralist and yet polarized society.

## District 7 - Office of Councilm ember Treva Reid



Producer, entrepreneur, activist, hip-hop curator, and community lead er Charles "Chuck" Johnson is a man of many talents and interests. As the CEO and driving force behind the Soul Beat Entertainment Network, Johnson has become the steward of the first Black - owned television network's storied legacy. As an organizer, Johnso n has developed community health and youth engagement initiatives and public safety campaigns with municipalities and community organizations.

As an activist, Johnson has worked alongside elected officials to develop policy platforms and led youth developm ent and voter registration campaigns. In 2007, Johnson co - founded Town Business Network, an Oakland nonprofit that mobilized the Bay Area hip community around non - violence, education and economic empowerment. In 2009, Johnson served as the Co - Chair of the Mayor's Community Task Force for Sports and Entertainment, developing recommendations for cultivating Oakland as a growing entertainment destination, expanding public safety and bridging barriers to communication with urban youth. In 2021, Johnson beca me the owner of the Soul Beat trademark, and began the Herculean task of reestablishing the beloved network in today's cluttered media landscape. Efforts to date have included producing a Mayoral candidates forum in 2022, producing annual "Soul Beat Day" I ive events, developing a website and social media assets, and relaunching a line of classic Soul Beat - branded merchandise. Johnson is a multi generational homeowner in Sobrante Park. (he/him)

Kristal Raheem (Communications and Public Relations Manager), Kristal is an ethnographic researcher, educator, and consultant from Oakland, CA. She earned a B.A. in Sociology and a master's in Education Policy, Organization and Leadership. Her work calls attention to health and educational disparities among Black, Qu eer, and other systematically oppressed communities around the world. Her professional experience spans multiple sectors including academia, journalism, non - profits, and more. She specializes in community - based program design and implementation, strategic planning, curriculum development, workshop facilitation, and marketing. Initial Scope: CM Reid's o ffice is working with cultural strategist Chuck Johnson and Soulbeat TV to support the development and implementation of a District 7 Belonging Strategy called 'Legacies' (working title). The purpose of the Cultural Strategist project is to archive the int ergenerational legacies of District 7 while highlighting the present day initiatives of cultural, social, and economic preservation and empowerment for the future generations of Deep East Oakland. The project seeks to build multigenerational trust and conn ectivity in and among District 7 residents in ways that honor the particular legacy and culture of D7 neighborhoods, while contributing to workforce development in media for young people. The District 7 rooted cultural anchor, Soul Beat TV and cultural str ategist Chuck Johnson will work with CM Reid's office and other local partners to equip youth and adults with the tools to preserve the history of D7 while providing a platform for them to engage the community in storytelling, cultural expression, and comm unal education. The office will work with the cultural strategist to broadcast and share these stories throughout Oakland (and beyond) in an effort to contribute to the overall belonging in the city of Oakland and D7's important legacy and ongoing role in fostering this.

Initial Scope - Mayor Thao's office will work with cultural strategist Corey Johnson to address chronic absenteeism of students living in District 6 and 7, especially in the neighborhoods of Havenscourt, Lockwood Gardens, Eastmont and Elmhurst. Absenteeism and tardiness have increased dramatically since the pandemic and have multiple, ripple impacts. The cultural strategist will work as a thought partner and practitioner with the Mayor's office to develop replicable strategies to encourage school attendance in ways that honor and reflect the cultural heritage and legacy of these neighborhoods and residents. The strategies - whether they be entrepreneurial, education-based, or engagement-based - will address the specific barriers and challenges faced by parents, families and caregivers. The cultural strategist will bring fresh, curious and locally resonant ideas and an organizing skillset to address this issue. The work will support a ctivities that can continue to be carried out by communities, schools and families in these areas after the culmination of Corey Johnson's time with the Mayor's office in this role.

In part the work is guided by questions like, who are the people who work in City government and what is their relationship to O akland? How does a City show it loves its residents? How can we create a government based in care that reflects this motto? The primary activities should focus on services and residents in the following neighborhoods: Chinatown, Little Saigon, EastLake, S an Antonio, West Lake, Acorn, McClymonds, Prescott, Lower Bottoms, Fruitvale, Havenscourt, Lockwood Gardens, Eastmont and Elmhurst. The partnership will support public stories and new ways of engaging young people that reflect dimensions of LoveLife that h elp us better understand where we are as a City and how to reflect the motto in the services the City provides.

# Business Development - Economic and Workforce Development



YaVette Holts has a long history of supporting small business. Her Bay Area based independent talent agency helped self employed musicians find work all through the 1990's. Economic justice emerged as the focus of her work in the early 2000's, when she served on the executive production team for conferences like The Global Summit, BALLE and Living the Next Economy. In 2015, she founded the Bay Area Organization of Black Owned Businesses (BAOBOB) which not only supports individual businesses, but advocates broadly fo r equitable policy and budget initiatives beneficial to small and micro enterprises in Oakland and throughout the Bay Area.. YaVette earned her English Literature/Creative Writing degree from UC Santa Cruz where she had the good fortune to work closely

with revolutionaries Lucille Clifton, Al Gates, Rob Brezsny and others. YaVette is also a graduate of both the Women's Initiative for Self Employment and Uptima Entrepreneur llage, Barter Cooperative. She is founder of several social impact projects including Cowrie Vi to The People and Rootical Gathering all of which were first seeded during her fellowship with the People's Grocery Growing Justice Institute. YaVette is also a learner and practitioner of acupressure. She believes firmly that effective (r)e volutionary work requires a healing balance, and that the practice of healing is truly and still a radical act. (she/her)



Cristy Johnston Limón is the Deputy Director/Business Development Manager in the Department of Economic and Workforce Development. Cristy brings to this role more than 20 years' experience in commercial corridor revitalization, nonprofit leadership, and organization capacity building, as well as a deep knowledge of Oakland and its communities. Cristy previously led two of the Bay Are a's most beloved arts and cultural organizations, developing the organizational infrastructure and leadership to ensure their long - term

Leveraging her background in community and economic development, Cristy secured and built out a permanent home for Oakland's Destiny Arts Center, a cultural and community hub that revita lized the surrounding neighborhood and ignited businesses, civic leaders and funders to invest in Oakland's arts and culture. Cristy was also the founding Executive Director of Excelsior Action Group in San Francisco, where she piloted a commercial corridor revita lization initiative. (she/her)

Initial Scope - The Business Development (BizDev) Division of the Department of Economic and Workforce Development will work with cultural strategist YaVette Holts of BAOBOB Directory in the Little Saigon, Fruitvale and/or 7th Street commercial corridors. Small businesses have a unique role in supporting the robust and diverse cultural identity of Oakland, as well as addressing issues such as economic inequality and safety. The Cultural Strategist will work with BizDev to support small businesses in building relationships across and within cultural communities, understanding civic processes that shape their neighborhoods, and map strategies that strengthen racial equity and belonging via their commercial corridors. This work and intercultural connection ahead will strengthen small business owners' readiness of the City's update to the Economic Development Strategy and General Plan processes.

## Cultural Affairs Division Team - City of Oakland



Roberto Bedoya is the Cultural Affairs Manager for the City of Oakland, where he s hepherded its Cultural Plan, Belonging in Oakland: a Cultural Development Plan and the creation of the Cultural Strategists in Government program.
