City Workers, Get Your Taxes Done Fast and Free- The Alameda County – Oakland Community Action Partnership (AC-OCAP) in the Human Services Department, is pleased to announce the opening of the City of Oakland's Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site located at 270 Frank H. Ogawa Plaza in the Business Assistance Center. Low-wage earners whose household income was \$55,000 or less in 2018 can get their taxes prepared by certified IRS volunteers for FREE. The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and CalEITC is a federal and state refundable tax credit available to working low-income individuals and families. Depending on family size and income, you may qualify to receive a tax credit check of up to \$6,000!

30-day Comment Period on OWDB Draft Local Plan Modifications – Through **Monday, March 11**, the Oakland Workforce Development Board (OWDB) is asking for public comment on the Draft 2017-2020 Local Plan Biennial Modifications. The Modifications focus on enhancing workforce opportunities for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities; Child Support clients; CalFresh Employment and Training recipients; and English Language Learners, Foreign Born and Refugees clients. The Draft Plan Modifications were informed by insight gained at stakeholder meetings held in November 2018 by OWDB, with the Alameda County Workforce Development Board and EastBay Works Coordinator. At these November meetings, the Alameda County Social Services Agency, Alameda County Department of Child Support Services and the California Department of Rehabilitation each provided an overview of their respective workforce programs that support the target populations. Approximately \$10 million in funding, primarily from the Oakland Public Safety and Services Violence Prevention Act, will be available through the RFP for the period from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2021. City Seeks Proposals from Organizations to Provide Career Development, Job Training Services – Through Wednesday, March 6, the City of Oakland's Workforce Development Board (OWDB) is accepting proposals from organizations to provide workforce development services for adults and youth using approximately \$2 million in federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) funds under its purview. The goal of these investments is to help individuals to build skills and acquire credentials for employment, and assist businesses with finding and retaining a qualified workforce. Contracts resulting from this Request for Proposals (RFP) process are anticipated to run from July 2019 through June 2022. The OWDB has issued two separate RFPs: one for services for low and very-low income youth and young adults, ages 16-24, and a second to operate career centers and provide direct services for adult job seekers and workers, 18 and older. Through each of these RFP processes, the OWDB seeks to resource a network of qualified providers to make WIOA services more accessible to priority populations and geographical areas (East Oakland, Central/Fruitvale and West Oakland) and advance the economic security and resilience of Oakland's most vulnerable residents so they can secure quality jobs and careers in high growth pathways and industries.
