

30 years since Oakland Hills Firestorm

Last month, we remembered the devastating fire that raged through the Oaklan and Berkeley hills, taking the lives of 25 community-members, including two Cit of Oakland first responders. As a city, we are dedicated not only to rememberir all the beloved lives lost, but also to preventing another such disaster from ever occurring in our city and East Bay region.


Oakland to Re-House 1500 Unsheltered Residents

The City of Oakland is proudly partnering with U.S. Housing and Jrban Development Secretary Marcia Fudge to launch House America, a national effort to address homelessness that will re-house 1,500 Oaklanders and build lack lack units of permanent affordable housing in 16 months.

This month, U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Secretary Marcia L. Fud visited Oakland and San Francisco for Build Back Better events. Oakland Redistricting Process

The <u>Oakland Redistricting Commission</u> is in full swing developing plans for new district boundaries for the City Council and the School Board. On October 13th, the Commission voted to prioritize Draft Map B and Draft Map D; however, no decision have been made and commissioners are encouraging residents to weigh in. Please consider attending a Commission meeting and/or Workshop to learn more about this important process. The deadline for completing the process is December 31st four neighborhood could change districts if you don't make yourself heard.

The Commission meetings are as follows with all meetings starting at 5:00 pm; public testimony on the draft district maps will begin at 6:00 pm.

 - Monday, November 15, 2021
- Wednesday, December 1, 2021
 - Monday, December 6, 2021
- Wednesday, December 8, 2021 (anticipated map adoption, subject to change) There are five virtual workshops left where the public can learn more about the redistricting process in an informal setting, ask questions and engage with Commissioners. The workshops are scheduled for:

Vehicular Construction Innovation Ordinance

The City Council unanimously passed the Vehicular Construction Innovation Ordinance on November 2nd authored by Mayor Schaaf, and Councilmembers Kal and Thao.

The ordinance makes changes to the City's codes to set guidelines that allow the esidential occupancy of RV's and tiny homes on wheels on private property, with pecified rules. It is critical that we provide additional options for creating new

nomes--many of which are likely to be more affordable than much of the new narket rate housing stock in Oakland today. I'm happy to see that this updating cour planning and building code has such broad support. This ordinance was a collaborative effort amongst the Mayor and her staff, Councilmember Sheng That and myself, and interested residents.

2022-2027 Paving Plan

The time for deciding on the next Paving Plan has arrived. The Oakland Department of Transportation (OakDOT) has published it's <u>Draft Map of Proposed Streets</u> for the 2022-2027 Paving Plan. The City performs a citywide pavement condition survey every 2-4 years. The data for this plan was collected in the summer of 2021. OakDOT anticipates bringing this plan to Council for a vote with he next two months. We know that many of you have reported potholes and oth paving issues using <u>311</u>, so it's important that you continue to report these issues to the City, especially if your street is not included in this paving plan. Plan Bay Area 2050

The Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) and the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) adopted **Plan Bay Area 2050** and its associate Environmental Impact Report. The unanimous votes by both boards cap a nearly our-year process during which more than 20,000 Bay Area residents contributed the development of the new plan.

Defined by 35 strategies for housing, transportation, economic vitality and the environment, Plan Bay Area 2050 lays out a \$1.4 trillion vision for policies and investments to make the nine-county region more affordable, connected, divers healthy and economically vibrant for all its residents through 2050 and beyond From housing strategies that would produce more than 1 million new permanent affordable homes by 2050 to transit-fare reforms that would reduce cost burder

for riders with low incomes and paths to economic mobility through job training and a universal basic income, the goal of a more equitable Bay Area is interwove throughout the plan. With a groundbreaking focus on climate change, strategie are also crafted for resilience against future uncertainties, including protection from hazards such sea-level rise and wildfires.

Climate Action - Reducing VMTs

Fundamentally, we know that reducing Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMTs) must be seen and understood as a top priority for climate action at the local and regional lever languages, counties and even regional agencies have positive plans and goals; nowever, putting ideas into action is, excuse the expression, where the rubber has he road. This is why I am proposing that we put in place enforceable commitments and policies to:

- Build more Transit Oriented Development (TOD) housing—including below market housing and family-size housing—near established transit hubs and along major transit corridors, and reduce parking space requirements for these developments.
- Put greater focus on regional planning, cooperation and incentives to better address jobs-housing imbalances. Support and adhere to urban growth boundaries within many Bay Area cities in order to discourage sprawl development, which by definition is away from established job centers.
- Invest in expanding access to mass transit, creating more safe bicycling infrastructure, and providing alternative mobility options. Require large employers and developers of new projects to offer transit passes.
- Implement Transportation Demand Management (TDM) including parking case out programs by large employers and greatly expanded rideshare options.
 Include VMT mitigation in conditions of approval for new development projects—particularly non-TOD projects.

The City Administration has implemented a policy mandating vaccination for City Employees. Under the Policy, employees are required to be fully vaccinated by November 29th. City Administrator Update

Oakland Public Works is proud to announce major improvements to the City of Oakland's **bulky item collection** program. The City Administrator reached an agreement with Waste Management of Alameda County, Inc (WMAC) to dramatically improve Oaklanders' access to bulky item service at no additional cost. Effective November 15, single-family and multi-family residents can manage disposal of bulky items in the following ways:

- Schedule appointments with WMAC to drop off their bulky items at NO CHARG at WMAC's David Street Resource Recovery Complex and Transfer Station (2615 Davis Street in San Leandro)
- Each multi-family tenant can schedule a curbside appointment once a year wi WMAC

Single-family households can schedule an appointment TWICE per year, as opposed to once per year
