Covid-19 Update

While the Alameda County face mask order remains in effect, the County has mplemented some changes outlined below. Please consider exploring the Alameda County COVID-19 page for additional information: https://covid-leacgov.org/index. There are a few particular updates with which we want to nake sure you are familiar:

Make Plans for a Healthy Holiday Season:

Alameda County has released recommendations for the holiday season ncluding:

Get vaccinated, including a booster when eligible

Stay home if you are sick

Get tested before and after travel or gathering

Wear a mask when gathering indoors

If gathering with unvaccinated people, keep gatherings small, short and outdoors

Remember to get your flu shot.

Proof of Vaccination Policy

n an effort to help stop the spread of COVID-19, I am introducing an emergency ordinance that will require patrons 12 years and older to show **proof of** raccination to enter indoor food and beverage establishments, entertainment and recreational locations, gyms and fitness venues, senior adult care facilities and senior adult day programs, public libraries, dental offices, City Hall, the Dakland Convention Center, and at large indoor events. As a part of this egislation, the City will create downloadable flyers for businesses to post to nake patrons aware of this new law. This policy would be enforced via Code inforcement, not OPD; although other cities have found this to be a self-enforcing law with businesses happily complying.

City of Oakland is extending its free Vaccination and Testing Clinic:

In response to high demand, the City of Oakland is extending its free, walk-up COVID-19 vaccination and testing clinic through the end of December, and possibly through early 2022 if demand continues. The COVID Clinic operates 7 days/week and offers all three vaccines, booster shots, and COVID-19 testing. No appointment is needed.

What: Free COVID testing AND vaccinations

Where: 250 Frank H. Ogawa Plaza (next to City Hall)

Days: 7 days/week, except holidays

Hours: Open from 9 am - 5 pm (through end of December)

Public Safety and Gun Violence

There have been numerous shootings in Oakland this year and more recently vell-organized, armed caravans have engaged in burglaries and violent robberies n several East Bay cities including Oakland. The Oakland Police Department OPD) has reiterated that it's committed to the full investigation of these violent neidents and they're working in close coordination with nearby jurisdictions also experiencing an upsurge in violence. Many of these violent acts are heart-vrenching and we have to work together to address this the best we can. Louncilmember Gallo has joined with me in calling for recommendations from DPD, Department of Violence Prevention, our Measure Z Safety & Services Diversight Commission, CeaseFire, and the Community Policing Advisory Board on Reducing Gun Violence in Oakland. These presentations will occur at the City Council's long-planned Council meeting on public safety on Tuesday, Dec. 7 at 5:30PM.

While OPD is using overtime and strategic redeployment to address the potential or additional violent crime, our Department of Violence Prevention (DVP) and our Ceasefire partners also are working on how best to stop this serious upswing n gun violence.

Over the holiday season, in order to keep residents and visitors safe, OPD will leploy tactical teams to support the patrol officers who are responding to the irmed caravans, dangerous sideshows, and various violent crimes. The teams are righly skilled in de-escalation and using less-lethal options. OPD already had lirected uniformed officers from non-patrol units to spend time assisting with prioritized hotspots and patrols to increase the number of officers visible and vorking on the street.

Ay staff and I meet regularly with the OPD Area Captain for North Oakland as vell as DVP senior staff to discuss recent crime trends in North Oakland, OPD esponse and investigation, and implementation of DVP short and long-term strategies.

am continuing to advocate for robust staffing for OPD's Criminal Investigations Division and for our well-regarded Cease Fire program, filling budgeted racancies including from possible lateral hiring of experienced law enforcement officers, an increased focus on intelligence gathering and greater emphasis on what is known as problem-oriented policing. At the same time, I will continue to support meaningful investments in violence prevention, rehabilitation and job readiness.

Ghost Gun Legislation

am working on legislation that will prohibit the possession, sale, purchasing, eceiving or manufacturing of an unfinished firearm frame or firearm receiver, he parts that are used to make privately manufactured firearms commonly eferred to as "ghost guns." Councilmember Gallo and vice-mayor Kaplan are co-ponsoring this legislation with me. This is an important effort to remove these intraceable, dangerous firearms from our streets in order to help fight the courge of gun violence that is ripping apart the fabric of our communities.

Village of Love

Raising Funds and Providing Services for Oakland's Jnsheltered Residents

On Saturday, November 13 the <u>Village of Love</u> - a nonprofit organization that provides services and support to North Oakland's and the City of Alameda's insheltered population - celebrated its second anniversary and launched an effort to raise funds for a homeless day center in Oakland. A homeless day, or Irop-in, center would provide a safe, sanitary, secure and welcoming place for nomeless individuals to relax, get information, meals, showers, computers, connect to services, and be supported by staff and peers.

/illage of Love Founder and Executive Director Joey Harrison brings vital perspective to this work: Seven years ago, Joey himself was living on the streets of Oakland. Then, with the support of local organizations such as Options Recovery Services, he moved into transitional housing and began independent iving four years ago. It was then he got a job as operations manager of the Temescal Telegraph Business Improvement District. In that role, he saw a need to build bridges between residents, businesses, mental health and insheltered communities. So he launched a successful homeless outreach refort in Temescal and developed quarterly training sessions for Temescal nerchants, their employees and nearby residents on how to de-escalate tense nteractions with homeless people or those having a mental crisis or substance abuse problems.


'My personal experience taught me what helped and what didn't help. And the people who helped are part of Village of Love today," said Joey. loey's efforts in North Oakland made such a difference in the community that the organization was tapped to open a day center and safe parking site in alameda in Spring of 2020, and is in discussions with Berkeley to open a nomeless drop-in center next year at the People's Park site. At the VOL Alameda Day Center, unsheltered residents have a friendly place to rest safely, use the

pathroom, get clothes, hygiene kits, PPE, breakfast, lunch, and snacks. mportantly, VOL staff build relationships with their clients, potentially breaking lown barriers and connect them to support services, assistance with housing, nealthcare, career development and job placement.

'The aim is to get to know the people coming in and better understand what they are going through to build trust," said Joey. "Not because it's my job, but because I care about you. That's what we're about here."

Given that Oakland has the largest homeless population in Alameda County, but has no day center for unsheltered residents, VOL is looking to open a day center somewhere between downtown and North Oakland.

"Neighborhood Voices" Grant Program Grant Applications Open December 1

The Neighborhood Voices for Festivals grant program seeks to bring Oaklanders together o create and support a sense of belonging through festival culture. The program will listribute \$234,500 in grants of up to \$20,000 to help nurture festival culture. Applicants must be Oakland-based and all festival activities must be presented in Dakland between January 1, 2022 and June 30, 2022.

The Neighborhood Voices for Festivals grant program aims to bring Oaklanders ogether to create and support a sense of belonging within a community, foster ocial connections that lift our spirts, feed our community well-being and offer risions for our collective future through festival culture. The program will award grants of up to \$20,000 to Oakland-based non-profits organizing festivals in Oakland. Grantees must demonstrate a funding match of 1:1 for the City unding.

'This grant opportunity seeks to affirm the expression, recognition and inderstanding of the array of diverse communities that make Oakland unique and vibrant," said Alexa Jeffress, Director of the Economic & Workforce Development Department.

Testivals are defined as in-person events that are free and open to the public, ncluding small-scale and first-time events to large-scale and established estivals. Events to be supported may include, but are not limited to cultural neritage practices, performances in dance, music or theater, visual art and public arts exhibitions/events, and literary presentations that are rooted in a sense of place.

Bulky Waste Pick Up

Effective November 15, all Oakland residents can choose to manage the disposal of their bulky items with new or improved resources and services:

All Oakland residents may now schedule appointments with WMAC to drop off their bulky items at no charge at WMAC's Davis Street Resource

Recovery Complex and Transfer Station (located at 2615 Davis Street in San Leandro).

Residents in Multi-Family Dwellings (buildings more than four residential units) can now schedule a curbside appointment once a year <u>directly</u> with WMAC instead of requesting appointments through their landlords as they formerly had to.

Residents in Single-Family Dwellings (buildings with up to four residential units) can schedule an appointment for bulky items collection at the curbside, increased from once per year to twice per year.

Residents can now set out 4 cubic yards of items, plus recyclable items including mattresses, tires, TVs and computers, up from 3 cubic yards for Single-Family and 1.5 cubic yards for Multi-Family.
