Public Ethics Reform in Oakland

For the first time since the creation of the Oakland **Public Ethics Commission** (PEC), we have a chance to create a stronger watchdog over Oakland government. With the assistance of an expert working group over the past several months, I have introduced a PEC Charter Amendment ballot measure for consideration by the Council. The Charter Amendment would improve the PEC by:

- ✓ Increasing its independence;
- ✓ Providing it with stronger enforcement authority;
- ✓ Giving it greater responsibilities and oversight over local ethics and campaign finance laws; and
- ✓ Increasing its staff resources so it can be an effective watchdog.

The overarching goal of an independent and empowered PEC is restoring and safeguarding the public's trust and confidence in city government. Since its inception in 1996, the PEC has never been sufficiently funded to perform its duties ordained by the Council and desired by the public. There is an inherent structural conflict of interest in having the budget of a government ethics agency or watchdog set by the officials it regulates. Read my *Tribune-Montclarion* OpEd here.

At our July 15 meeting, the Oakland City Council will vote on whether or not to place the Charter reform measure on the November 2014 ballot. <u>City Council Adopts Mid-cycle Budget Revisions—Including Dan's Proposed</u> Library Funding

Because the City has a bi-annual budget process, we have an opportunity every other year to make necessary and helpful revisions to the current two-year budget. This opportunity is called the midcycle budget. On July 1st, the City Council adopted the 2014-15 mid-cycle budget.

With the improvement of our local economy, the City realized more than \$25 million in additional revenue over the amount that was projected last year. Though this is a relatively small amount of funding compared to the City budget as a whole, it is a positive sign that the City is improving. I was pleased to support the Mayor's proposed mid-cycle budget, with some modifications as outlined below. The budget proposal incorporated allocations for police and public safety—including funding additional police academies and our Ceasefire crime reduction outreach program—as well as the city's animal shelter, an improved City website, additional IT staff, and more.

I am thrilled to report that the Mayor incorporated, and a majority of my colleagues supported, my proposal to shore up our Oakland Public Library system by setting aside \$500,000 in the Library reserve. This was critical due to anticipated future deficiencies in Measure Q library funding starting in July of 2015.

Furthermore, I proposed that the City address an anticipated \$35,000 shortfall in the Hunger Relief Program. The Council voted to use surplus Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for the shortfall and make up any modest difference if the surplus is inadequate.

Finally, I and three of my colleagues—Councilmembers Gallo, Kaplan, and Schaaf—proposed additional investments for the mid-cycle budget, including: (1) funds for road improvements, (2) infrastructure mitigation funding related to the Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) improvement project, (3) removal of litter, illegally dumped trash, and graffiti, and (4) the placement of over \$2 million into a new Vital Services Stabilization Fund. The latter proposal is a step in the direction of the City adopting a true Rainy Day Fund, as has been done in other cities. Councilmembers McElhaney and Kernighan joined the four of us to adopt these allocations with the Mayor's proposed budget.
