Now that the Alameda County mask mandate has ended, it's more important than ever to receive

your COVID booster. The FDA and CDC released new recommendations that allow certain immunocompromised individuals and people over 50 years of age who received a booster shot at least four months ago to receive an additional COVID-19 booster. Please read the updated recommendations <u>here</u>. Those eligible can schedule their booster at the White House's new centralized website <u>COVID.gov</u> or at California's MyTurn.

I have been actively supporting our city's efforts to lobby for and access additional funds at the state level for affordable housing, including housing and related services for our homeless population. COVID-19 Updates

The Alameda County face mask order has changed, and the County has implemented some changes highlighted below. Please consider exploring

the Alameda County COVID-19 page for additional information: <u>https://covid-19.acgov.org/index</u>. There are a few particular updates we want to make sure you are familiar with:

Proof of Vaccination Policy Amended

On May 3rd, I presented legislation to the Council amending the emergency ordinance I sponsored in December 2021 that require patrons to show proof of vaccination at various locations including food and drink establishments, gyms, theaters and at large indoor events.

This modification removes the citywide requirement that patrons entering a number of indoor locations must show proof of vaccination including at restaurants, bars and coffee shops, gyms, fitness venues, yoga centers and dance studios, entertainment venues such as movie theaters, concert venues, live performance venues, sports areas and museums.

Visitors to senior adult care facilities and City-run senior centers must still show proof of vaccination. And patrons at indoor events in Oakland with more than 2,500 people will now be required to wear masks. We strongly recommend N95, KN95, and KF94 masks to ensure adequate protection.

BART Now Requires Masks

on April 28, 2022, the BART Board of Directors voted to require face masks on BART trains and all paid areas of the system. This mask mandate is effective through July 18, 2022 unless it is extended. Read more <u>here</u>.

Getting vaccinated and boosted, wearing high quality masks (N95/KN95/KF94 recommended), get tested if you are exposed or ill and stay at home if you feel sick. 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MACRO Soft Launch

The Mobile Assistance Community Responders of Oakland (MACRO) made its 'soft launch' into the community at the end of April. Mostly made up of Oakland natives, MACRO staff are EMTs and community intervention specialists, some of whom were formerly unhoused or incarcerated. Initially focused in East and West Oakland, MACRO teams will respond to calls for service where a police officer may not be needed: Calls for noise complaints, public intoxication, and wellness checks for instance. They'll work to de-escalate nonviolent, nonemergency situations, provide basic medical and emotional support, offer services such as shelter beds and build relationships with community members in need.

Councilmember Kalb prioritized the creation and funding for MACRO over the past two years. Now, Oakland's holistic approach to public safety means we innovate. MACRO is designed to make sure that we are meeting Oaklanders where they are, with empathy and compassion. And it's already having an impact. On their first day on the job, the San Francisco Chronicle's Sarah Ravani reports, they may have <u>saved the life of an East</u> <u>Oakland man</u>.

OPD Making Strides

A recent <u>CalMatters article</u> shows the evidence and impact of reform efforts within the Oakland Police Department, particularly in its response to community complaints. <u>The numbers show</u> that the Oakland police department holds its officers more accountable at far higher rates than other law enforcement agencies in the state.

Negotiated Settlement Agreement Coming to an End

Eighteen years ago, the Oakland Police Department entered into a negotiated settlement agreement (NSA) with plaintiffs who had suffered abuse and mistreatment at the hands of officers. On Thursday, Judge Orrick stated that Oakland will soon enter into a one-year "sustainability"

period" that reflects compliance with all 52 reforms outlined in the NSA as the final step before ending federal oversight. Although our work to deliver fair and equitable policing to Oaklanders must continue, this milestone symbolizes the incredible progress OPD has made.

We're proud of the progress OPD is making, and am looking forward to continued progress within the Department.

LoveLife Foundation Celebrates its 25th Anniversary

The LoveLife Foundation is an Oakland-based organization committed to providing a supportive and empowering environment for at-risk youth, and mobilizing community support to change the economic and social conditions that lead to violence.

The LoveLife Foundation was founded in November of 1997 by Donald Lacy, in memory of his daughter, LoEshe Adanma Lacy, who was an innocent bystander when she was senselessly murdered at the age of 16.

In the 25 years since, the organization has reached tens of thousands of youth and their families, working with at-risk Black youth at or below the poverty line in Oakland — who for the most part have been ignored and unvalued by our society.

The LoveLife Foundation aims to help youth discover positive and lifeaffirming alternatives to the destructive influences of drugs, gangs, and the dangers of life on the streets. They are promoting life and saving lives through community revitalization, leadership, and development. And they do all of this on a micro budget, with no full-time paid staff and some volunteers. The money they raise from charitable contributions goes directly to servicing young people and their families.
