Please note: The terms “applicant”, “proposer”, “contractor”, “consultant,” and others are used interchangeably throughout the RFQ document and all refer to the entity applying to provide services to the City of Oakland.

Summary

The City of Oakland is soliciting submissions from qualified agencies, institutions, individuals, or combinations thereof, in accordance with the specifications contained in this Request for Qualifications (RFQ). The services requested herein and to be provided under contract awarded as a result of this RFQ are for an external evaluation of the effectiveness of Department of Violence Prevention community-focused violence prevention and intervention services and Oakland Police Department geographic and community policing services funded through the Oakland Public Safety and Services Violence Prevention Act of 2014, also known as Measure Z.

Proposers should submit a detailed proposal for a process evaluation and an outcome evaluation of either or both of the following during the contract period of April 1, 2022 to March 31, 2025 (3 years):

- 1) **Department of Violence Prevention (DVP) Evaluation:** All strategies and activities outlined in the DVP’s FY22-24 Strategic Spending Plan, which are grouped into the following categories: (1) gun, group, and gang violence response, (2) gender-based violence response, and (3) community healing and restoration
- 2) **Oakland Police Department (OPD) Evaluation:** OPD Geographic and Community Policing Services

Please Note: The City reserves the right to award services in combinations that best serve all service needs.

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Background

On November 4, 2014, Oakland voters approved the Oakland Public Safety and Services Violence Prevention Act (Measure Z). Measure Z provides approximately \$24 million every year for ten years to fund violence prevention and intervention programs, community policing, and fire services. Measure Z funds are generated through a parcel tax along with a parking surcharge in commercial lots in order to support the following objectives:

- Reduce homicides, robberies, burglaries and gun-related violence;
- Improve police and fire emergency 911 response times and other police services; and
- Invest in violence intervention and prevention strategies that provide support for at-risk youth and young adults to interrupt the cycle of violence and recidivism.

In addition to supporting citywide prevention and intervention efforts, Measure Z supported the creation of a Public Safety and Services Violence Prevention Oversight Commission (hereinafter “Safety and Services Oversight Commission” or “SSOC”). The SSOC evaluates, inquires, and reviews the administration, coordination, and evaluation of strategies and practices mandated by Measure Z. Accordingly, the SSOC is responsible for reviewing the evaluation produced by the chosen evaluation firm and providing comments to the City Administration and City Council. Measure Z specifies that the SSOC consists of nine (9) members with specific backgrounds in order to balance the overall expertise of the commission. II. BUDGET

Applicants should submit a proposed budget for one or both evaluation components that is reasonable based on the requested services. The combined cost of the DVP Evaluation and the OPD Evaluation for the contract period of April 1, 2022 to March 31, 2025 should not exceed \$1,820,000. Furthermore, the maximum total amount that can be allocated to the OPD Evaluation is \$410,000. It is possible that additional funding will be secured to extend evaluation services beyond March 31, 2025.

III. SCOPE OF SERVICES

DEPARTMENT OF VIOLENCE PREVENTION (DVP) EVALUATION

The City of Oakland’s Department of Violence Prevention (hereafter “DVP”) applies a public health approach to violence prevention and intervention. The DVP currently funds violence prevention programs aimed at reducing gun violence, intimate partner violence,

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commercial sexual exploitation, and associated trauma experienced in the community. In July 2021, City Council adopted a strategic spending plan that outlined the DVP’s strategies and services for July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2024 (Fiscal Year 22-24). The strategic spending plan states that the DVP’s public health approach will focus on specific places in Oakland with underlying conditions that generate the highest rates of violence. The plan also outlines the DVP’s efforts to implement interventions at the individual, family, school, and community levels for those who are at the center of violence, at risk for violence, or exposed to violence. To do this effectively, the DVP will fund interventions in three strategy areas: gun/group/gang violence response, gender-based violence response, and community healing and restoration. In accordance with the DVP’s FY22-24 Strategic Spending Plan, the DVP is in the process of releasing a request for qualifications that will solicit proposals from community-based organizations (CBOs) to deliver services related to each of the strategies, sub-strategies, and activities outlined in Table 1 during FY22-24. Contracts with CBOs selected to provide services in each sub-strategy will begin on July 1, 2022 and are expected to end on December 31, 2024 (the current sunset date for Measure Z).

Overview

Qualified candidates will be responsible for conducting a process and outcome evaluation that helps the City of Oakland determine whether Measure Z funds are being used effectively by the DVP to achieve Measure Z objectives, fulfill the DVP’s mandates, and make progress towards violence reduction. This evaluation does NOT include an evaluation of the Ceasefire program. The evaluation should inform the City of Oakland and stakeholders about the impact of Measure Z-funded strategies and inform decision-makers about how to properly allocate Measure Z’s resources and efforts to reduce

violence in Oakland. The selected contractor(s) will work with designated stakeholders to plan and conduct the evaluation, produce evaluation reports, and present reports and evaluation findings to DVP staff and grantees, the Safety and Services Oversight Commission, the Oakland City Council Public Safety Committee, and the full Oakland City Council.

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The DVP will work with the selected contractor to determine the best research design and metrics to use in evaluating each of the DVP's strategies. Not all programs can be evaluated in terms of recidivism, but if this metric is chosen for some portion of the evaluation, please note that the City prefers the use of the Chief Probation Officers of California (CPOC) definition, which can be found in *Section V (Definitions)* of this RFQ. Additionally, the City prefers for an evaluator to use a Results-Based Accountability (RBA) structure, if possible. The RBA definition is also in *Section V (Definitions)*.

Required Services

The contracted evaluation will consist of a process evaluation and an outcome evaluation of the sub-strategies from the DVP's FY22-24 Strategic Spending Plan (Table 1), which are grouped into the following categories: (1) gun, group, and gang violence response, (2) gender-based violence response, and (3) community healing and restoration. These strategies will be implemented through contracts with 30+ CBOs.

Candidates will be expected to conduct an evaluation that uses mixed qualitative and quantitative methods to fully assess the implementation of each activity and the impact on individual, family, school, and community outcomes. The evaluation must also assess how program activities are carried out in accordance with Measure Z's goals and objectives. Randomization and control groups should be employed whenever possible to strengthen confidence around evaluation outcomes.

Evaluation deliverables should be usable and accessible by the public, government stakeholders, and funded program providers. Deliverables will include:

- Annual process evaluation reports for each of the DVP's 11 sub-strategies (anticipated Oct 2023 and 2024)
- Annual program feedback reports for each of the DVP's 30+ contracted providers (anticipated Nov 2023 and 2024)
- FY22-23 outcome evaluation report for all DVP sub-strategies (anticipated Dec 2023)
- FY22-24 comprehensive outcome evaluation report for all DVP sub-strategies (anticipated March 2025)
- PowerPoint presentation slides that accompany each process and outcome evaluation report to use in communicating findings to community and professional audiences
- Presentations of findings from each process and outcome evaluation report to community and professional audiences

Specific activities of the evaluation partner will include:

- Development of all aspects of evaluation design, including the selection of metrics and the development of data collection tools and protocols, in collaboration with the DVP.
- Implementation and oversight of all evaluation activities, in coordination with the DVP and DVP-funded providers/grantees.

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- Development of memorandum(s) of understanding with city and county entities such as the Alameda County Probation Department, Oakland Police Department, and Oakland Unified School District to access administrative data.
- Development of the aforementioned contract deliverables.
- Presentation of evaluation reports to the SSOC, Public Safety Committee of the City Council, and grantees, as requested.

The DVP may contract with the list of qualified entities developed through this RFQ for agreements that start within the specified timeframe. The term of any agreements (and any approved amendments) entered into within the timeframe may extend beyond that timeframe.

Qualifications and Relevant Experience

Strong candidates for this evaluation contract include research firms, research firms with a college/university partnership, or college/university firms. The City will look favorably upon submittals with university partnerships or agencies that specialize in work related to one or more of the requested services. The lead agency may be a nonprofit, for-profit, university, or public agency or organization. Candidates should demonstrate the ability to meet required services and minimum and preferred qualifications.

Proposals may be submitted from a single organization that qualifies to carry out all the required services or from a collaborative of organizations that identifies a lead agency and includes partnering organizations to carry out different aspects of the required services. Partnerships designed to reflect experience in violence prevention/intervention or policing must be sustained throughout the project.

Minimum Qualifications

Applicants must have demonstrated experience in the following areas:

- Developing and implementing complex process and outcome evaluations related to justice systems, systems of care, and public service delivery.
- Evaluating community-focused violence prevention and intervention services.
- Deploying mixed-methods and quasi-experimental research designs to examine program individual, family, school, and community outcomes.
- Extracting, cleaning, and analyzing service data from web-based data systems that track participant-level data, including participant demographics, service delivery, and performance indicators associated with program implementation.
- Designing evaluation measures and tools to track participant risk and changes in participant attitudes and experience.
- Establishing data agreements and memoranda of understanding with government partners.
- Accessing state-level data related to recidivism, employment, and other individual-level outcomes.
- Obtaining institutional review board (IRB) approvals.

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- Effectively communicating findings to a range of professional and community audiences.

Preferred/Specific Qualifications

Applicants are encouraged to describe any additional preferred qualifications, including the following:

- Experience providing technical assistance and guidance to government entities.
- Ability to work collaboratively with a wide range of community stakeholders and service providers.
- Cultural competency, especially as it relates to interacting with the various stakeholders and community-based organizations that serve Oakland's diverse community.
- Experience conducting cost-benefit analysis of violence prevention/intervention programs.
- Advanced methodical competence and training.

OAKLAND POLICE DEPARTMENT (OPD) EVALUATION

Background

Measure Z contains funding for the Oakland Police Department (hereafter "OPD") to augment existing staffing and crime reduction efforts. The funding is intended to maintain sufficient resources in OPD to implement comprehensive policing, community policing, and strategies that seek to reduce violence in Oakland with the City's limited resources. The geographic policing language in Measure Z requires that OPD hire, deploy, and maintain sworn police personnel assigned to specific geographic areas or neighborhoods, as described below:

- Crime Reduction Teams (CRTs): Sworn police personnel deployed geographically to investigate and respond to the commission of violent crimes in identified violence hot spots using intelligence-based policing.
- Community Resource Officers (CROs): Sworn police officers who engage in problem solving projects, attend Neighborhood Crime Prevention Council meetings, serve as liaisons with city services teams, provide foot/bike patrols, answer calls for service if needed, lead targeted enforcement projects, and coordinate these projects with CRTs.
- Patrol units and other sworn police personnel: Sworn officers who conduct intelligence-based violence suppression operations such as field interviews, surveillance, undercover operations, high visibility patrol, probation/parole compliance checks, search warrants, and violent crime investigation and assist with CRO projects.
- Domestic violence and child abuse intervention: Sworn police officers who work with social service providers to intervene in situations of domestic violence and child abuse, including sexual exploitation of children.

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Measure Z also contains language about a required minimum number of budgeted and maintained officers in order to continue to collect the tax. The current OPD Spending Plan budget is included below in Table 2. Note, although the Ceasefire strategy is included here, this evaluation RFQ **will not include** the Ceasefire evaluation.

Overview

Qualified candidates will be responsible for conducting a process and outcome evaluation that helps the City of Oakland determine whether Measure Z funds are being used effectively by OPD to achieve Measure Z objectives and make progress towards violence reduction. This evaluation does NOT include an evaluation of the Ceasefire program. The evaluation should inform the City of Oakland and stakeholders about the impact of Measure Z-funded strategies and inform decision-makers about how to properly allocate Measure Z's resources and efforts to reduce violence in Oakland. The selected contractor(s) will work with designated stakeholders to plan and conduct the evaluation, produce evaluation reports, and present reports and evaluation findings to OPD staff, the Safety and Services and Oversight Commission, City Council Public Safety Committee, and the full City Council.

The purpose of the independent external evaluation is to ensure that the City of Oakland effectively uses Measure Z funds on permitted activities which have the greatest impact in helping Oakland progress towards violence reduction and the three Measure Z

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objectives. Additionally, Measure Z requires a third-party independent evaluator to ensure service delivery as stated in the legislation.

The evaluation should inform the City of Oakland and stakeholders about the impact of Measure Z-funded strategies and inform decision-makers about how to properly allocate Measure Z's resources and efforts to reduce violence in Oakland.

The evaluation is **not** a financial audit. It is a performance evaluation connected to the funding spent on different activities funded under Measure Z. The separate financial audit is performed by a third-party independent auditor on an annual basis and is managed by the City Controller's Bureau.

Required Services

The applicant will be contracted to conduct a process and outcome evaluation of Oakland Police Department (OPD) services funded by Measure Z (excluding the Ceasefire strategy). These services are divided into the following three categories:

- Geographic policing and crime reduction teams
- Community policing services
- Special victims' services

Evaluation deliverables should be usable and accessible by the public, government stakeholders, and particularly to the funded program providers. Deliverables will include:

- Annual process and outcome evaluation report on geographic policing and crime reduction teams (due Nov 2023 and 2024)
- Annual process and outcome evaluation report on community policing services (due Nov 2023 and 2024)
- Annual process and outcome evaluation report on special victims' services (due Nov 2023 and 2024)
- PowerPoint presentation slides that accompany each evaluation report to use in communicating findings to community and professional audiences
- Presentations of findings from each evaluation report to community and professional audiences

The contractor(s) will propose the evaluation design based on their expertise in what is most effective to provide the most useful data to local decision makers. The City will work with the contractor to determine the best metrics to evaluate for the design of each evaluation category. The police evaluation should include interviews with community members about the officers and their interactions with the community. This evaluation should also make recommendations for changes which could be made to improve the programs. Before applying to evaluate Measure Z community-focused geographic and community policing services, it is essential that proposers understand the legislative intention and requirements to be evaluated. The [Measure Z legislation](#) provides a description of the intended services of the core area.

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A description of the service area and *suggested* examples of narrative questions are provided below. These questions were used in the last evaluation of Geographic and Community Policing Services. Additional questions may be added by the selected evaluator.

- Geographic policing and crime reduction team evaluation
 - How are Community Resource Officers (CROs) chosen? How does OPD train CRO officers for their work?
 - How are Crime Reduction Team (CRT) members chosen? How does OPD train CRT officers for their work?
 - What work are the CRTs performing and how is it determined and prioritized?
 - What is the success rate of the CRTs projects? Are some CRTs doing a better job than others in implementing violence reduction efforts?
 - How do CRTs compare to national best practice standards?
 - How do Area-based CRTS interact with the Ceasefire strategy CRT teams?
 - How much does interdepartmental collaboration affect the CRT and CRO project outcomes? Does that affect the violence reduction outcomes?
 - How does the CRT model compare to national targeted, crime reduction team models?
 - How many officers participate in procedural justice training and what are the outcomes after the training?
 - Evaluate client satisfaction with the police department to assess community policing. This could be a survey or another tool.

- Community policing services evaluation
 - How successful has the community policing program been at reducing violent crime? Increasing public trust of the police department? Can the information in the community policing database (SARAnet) be linked to decreases in violent crime or other improved community outcomes?
 - Are the Community Resource Officers (CROs) implementing the SARA problem solving model in alignment with recognized best practices? If not the SARA model, what model is being used?
 - Can the SARAnet database be used to draw conclusions about: A) whether there is a link between quality beat project completion to crime and violence reductions; and B) whether some beats/CROs are doing a better job than others of implementing a quality community policing model?
 - To what degree do CRO activities reduce violent crime? What proportion of CRO time or project volume is spent on quality-of-life issues? Does addressing quality of life issues reduce violent crime?

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- How much time are CROs spending on their beats compared to other OPD duties? What proportion of CRO time is spent in on neighborhood projects versus general presence in the neighborhood? If the average CRO spends over 40 percent of their time doing non-area-specific work, what does that mean?
- Does the performance of Measure Z-funded CROs differ from CROs funded from other funding sources?
- How do CROs under Measure Z differ from PSOs under Measure Y?
- How is the community policing program holding to national best practice models?
- Special Victims Section evaluation
 - What work are the Special Victims officers performing and how is their work determined and prioritized?
 - How does the Special Victims section compare to national best practice standards?
 - How successful has Special Victims section been at reducing violent crime? Increasing public trust of the police department?

The City strongly encourages proposers to integrate the following methodology guidelines wherever possible:

- Use quantitative metrics for evaluating officer (CRO) activity.
- Use quantitative metrics for evaluating CRT activity.
- Use quantitative metrics for evaluating Special Victims Section activity.
- Interview and/or survey the community about police interactions related to community policing.

Qualifications and Relevant Experience

The City of Oakland is seeking qualified consultants to evaluate the performance of the OPD Geographic and Community Policing services funded by Measure Z. The selected contractor will work with designated stakeholders to plan and conduct the evaluation, produce evaluation reports, and present reports and evaluation findings to the SSOC, City Council Public Safety Committee, and the full City Council. Candidates must have cultural competency, especially for interacting with stakeholders. Strong candidates for this series of evaluation contracts would include research firms, research firms with a college/university partnership, or college/university firms. The ideal candidate would bring expertise in best practices and evidence expertise in law enforcement policies and practices especially related to crime prevention and community policing.

Applications may include a partnership of two or more entities. The lead agency may be a non-profit, for-profit, university, or public agency or organization. The City will look favorably upon submittals with university partnerships or agencies that specialize in work related to one or more of the aforementioned services.

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If contractors are interested in partnering with subcontractors, the lead agency must have expertise in one or both of the aforementioned services and can partner with other agencies to cover other necessary aspects of the evaluation. Agencies may bid on the whole contract alone or bid on the whole contract with subcontractors. Partnerships designed to reflect experience in violence prevention/intervention or policing must be sustained throughout the project and may only be modified or revised with the express prior authority of the City of Oakland and upon evidence that qualifications and project goals and deadlines will be satisfied.

- Proposal considered not fully responsive to this RFQ.

F. CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS AND AWARD- SUBJECT TO CHANGE

1. The completion of this evaluation process will result in the contractor being numerically ranked. The contractor ranked first will be invited to participate in contract negotiations. Should the City and the first ranked contractor not be able to reach an agreement as to the contract terms within a reasonable timeframe, the City may terminate the negotiations and begin negotiations with the contractor that is next in line.
2. The contract amount (including reimbursements) shall be a not to exceed amount, to be established based upon a mutually agreeable Scope of Services and fee schedule.
3. The City will withhold the final 10% of contract amount pending successful completion of work.
4. Upon successful completion of the negotiations, the City Administrator will award the contract to the selected contractor.

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5. A sample City standard professional services agreement is included in the RFQ as referenced as Attachment A “Sample Agreement”. The selected contractor will be required to enter into a contract that contains similar terms and conditions as in the standard agreement. Please note that the City Attorney’s Office is typically not inclined to make any modifications to the standard agreement terms and provisions.
6. Upon award the City will issue a Notice to proceed.
7. The selected contractor and its other members will be required to maintain auditable records, documents, and papers for inspection by authorized local, state and federal representatives. Therefore, the contractor and its other members may be required to undergo an evaluation to demonstrate that the contractor uses recognized accounting and financial procedures.

G. GENERAL INFORMATION

1. The successful proposer selected for this service shall obtain or provide proof of having a current City of Oakland Business tax Certificate.
2. The City Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
3. Local and Small Local Business Enterprise Program (L/SLBE)

The City of Oakland has adopted a Local and Small Local Business Enterprise Program (L/SLBE). The City’s current L/SLBE Program guidelines may be accessed via the following link:

Contractor understands and agrees to the following:

- a. Preference Points – Preference points are awarded based on the level of local, small local and very small local business participation that is proposed by contractors during the competitive solicitation process.
- b. Maintaining Participation – As a condition of award of this Contract, Contractor must achieve and maintain the levels of local, small local or very small local business participation for which preference points were earned during the competitive solicitation process or the levels of participation agreed upon by the Parties during negotiation of this Agreement.
- c. Failure to achieve and maintain the proposed levels of participation may result in the imposition of penalties as set forth in the above-reference Local and Small Local Business Enterprise Program guidelines.

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- d. Contractor shall submit information concerning the ownership and workforce composition of Contractor's firm as well as its subcontractors and suppliers, by completing **Schedule D, Ownership, Ethnicity, and Gender Questionnaire**, and **Schedule E, Project Consultant Team**, which shall be attached hereto and incorporated herein.

4. The City's Living Wage Ordinance

This Agreement is subject to the Oakland Living Wage Ordinance. The Living Wage Ordinance requires that nothing less than a prescribed minimum level of compensation (a living wage) be paid to employees of service Contractors (contractors) of the City and employees of CFARs (Ord. 12050 § 1, 1998). Oakland employers are also subject to the City of Oakland Minimum Wage law (see Section 5, below), and must pay employees wages and provide benefits consistent with the Minimum Wage law or Oakland Living Wage Ordinance, whichever are greater.

The Ordinance also requires submission of the Declaration of Compliance attached and incorporated herein as Declaration of Compliance – Living Wage Form; and made part of this Agreement, and, unless specific exemptions apply or a waiver is granted, the contractor must provide the following to its employees who perform services under or related to this Agreement:

- a. Minimum compensation – Said employees shall be paid an initial **hourly wage rate of \$15.30 with health benefits or \$17.56 without health benefits**. These initial rates shall be upwardly adjusted each year no later than April 1 in proportion to the increase at the immediately preceding December 31 over the year earlier level of the Bay Region Consumer Price Index as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Department of Labor. Effective July 1st of each year, Contract shall pay adjusted wage rates.
- b. Health benefits – Said full-time and part-time employees paid at the lower living wage rate shall be provided health benefits of at least **\$2.26 per hour**. Contractor shall provide proof that health benefits are in effect for those employees no later than 30 days after execution of the contract or receipt of City financial assistance.
- c. Compensated days off – Said employees shall be entitled to twelve compensated days off per year for sick leave, vacation or personal necessity at the employee's request, and ten uncompensated days off per year for sick leave. Employees shall accrue one compensated day off per month of full-time employment. Part-time employees shall accrue compensated days off in increments proportional to that

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accrued by full-time employees. The employees shall be eligible to use accrued days off after the first six months of employment or consistent with company policy, whichever is sooner. Paid holidays, consistent with established employer policy, may be counted toward provision of the required 12 compensated days off. Ten uncompensated days off shall be made available, as needed, for personal or immediate family illness after the employee has exhausted his or her accrued compensated days off for that year.

- d. Federal Earned Income Credit (EIC) - To inform employees that he or she may be eligible for Earned Income Credit (EIC) and shall provide forms to apply for advance EIC payments to eligible employees. For more information, web sites include but are not limited to: (1) <https://www.irs.gov/> and <https://www.irs.gov/credits-deductions/individuals/earned-income-tax-credit>
 - e. Contractor shall provide to all employees and to Contracts and Compliance, written notice of its obligation to eligible employees under the City's Living Wage requirements. Said notice shall be posted prominently in communal areas of the work site(s) and shall include the above-referenced information.
 - f. Contractor shall provide all written notices and forms required above in English, Spanish or other languages spoken by a significant number of employees within 30 days of employment under this Agreement.
 - g. Reporting – Contractor shall maintain a listing of the name, address, hire date, occupation classification, rate of pay and benefits for each of its employees. Contractor shall provide a copy of said list to the Office of the City Administrator, Contracts and Compliance Unit, on a quarterly basis, by March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31 for the applicable compliance period.
 - h. Failure to provide said list within five days of the due date will result in liquidated damages of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each day that the list remains outstanding. Contractor shall maintain employee payroll and related records for a period of four (4) years after expiration of the compliance period.
 - i. Contractor shall require subcontractors that provide services under or related to this Agreement to comply with the above Living Wage provisions. Contractor shall include the above-referenced sections in its subcontracts. Copies of said subcontracts shall be submitted to Contracts and Compliance.
5. Minimum Wage Ordinance

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Oakland employers are subject to Oakland's Minimum Wage Law, whereby Oakland employees must be paid the current Minimum Wage rate. Employers must notify employees of the annually adjusted rates by each December 15th and prominently display notices at the job site. The law requires paid sick leave for employees and payment of service charges collected for their services. This contract is also subject to Oakland's Living Wage Ordinance (see Section 4, above), and must pay employees wages and provide benefits consistent with the Living Wage Ordinance, whichever are greater.

6. Equal Benefits Ordinance

This Agreement is subject to the Equal Benefits Ordinance of Chapter 2.32 of the Oakland Municipal Code and its implementing regulations. The purpose of this Ordinance is to protect and further the public, health, safety, convenience, comfort, property and general welfare by requiring that public funds be expended in a manner so as to prohibit discrimination in the provision of employee benefits by City Contractors (contractors) between employees with spouses and employees with domestic partners, and/or between domestic partners and spouses of such employees. (Ord. 12394 (part), 2001)

The following contractors are subject to the Equal Benefits Ordinance: Entities which enter into a "contract" with the City for an amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) or more for public works or improvements to be performed, or for goods or services to be purchased or grants to be provided at the expense of the City or to be paid out of moneys deposited in the treasury or out of trust moneys under the control

of or collected by the city; and Entities which enter into a "property contract" pursuant to Section 2.32.020(D) with the City in an amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) or more for the exclusive use of or occupancy (1) of real property owned or controlled by the city or (2) of real property owned by others for the city's use or occupancy, for a term exceeding twenty-nine (29) days in any calendar year.

The Ordinance shall only apply to those portions of a Contractor's operations that occur (1) within the City; (2) on real property outside the City if the property is owned by the City or if the City has a right to occupy the property, and if the contract's presence at that location is connected to a contract with the City; and (3) elsewhere in the United States where work related to a City contract is being performed. The

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requirements of this chapter shall not apply to subcontracts or sub-contractors.

The Equal Benefits Ordinance requires among other things, submission of the attached and incorporated herein as **Schedule N-1**, Equal Benefits-Declaration of Nondiscrimination form. For more information, see http://library.municode.com/HTML/16308/level2/TIT2ADPE_CH2.32EQ_BEOR.html#TOPTITLE

7. Prompt Payment Ordinance OMC Section 2.06.070 Prompt Payment Terms Required in Notices Inviting Bids, Requests for Proposals/Qualifications and Purchase Contracts

This Agreement is subject to the Prompt Payment Ordinance of Oakland Municipal Code, Title 2, Chapter 2.06. The Ordinance requires that, unless specific exemptions apply. Contractor and its subcontractors shall pay undisputed invoices of their subcontractors for goods and/or services within twenty (20) business days of submission of invoices unless the Contractor or its subcontractors notify the Liaison in writing within five (5) business days that there is a bona fide dispute between the Contractor or its subcontractor and claimant, in which case the Contractor or its subcontractor may withhold the disputed amount but shall pay the undisputed amount.

Disputed payments are subject to investigation by the City of Oakland Liaison upon the filing of a compliant. Contractor or its subcontractors

opposing payment shall provide security in the form of cash, certified check or bond to cover the disputed amount and penalty during the investigation.

If Contractor or its subcontractor fails or refuses to deposit security, the City will withhold an amount sufficient to cover the claim from the next Contractor progress payment. The City, upon a determination that an undisputed invoice or payment is late, will release security deposits or withholds directly to claimants for valid claims.

Contractor and its subcontractors shall not be allowed to retain monies from subcontractor payments for goods as project retention, and are required to release subcontractor project retention in proportion to the subcontractor services rendered, for which payment is due and undisputed, within five (5) business days of payment. Contractor and its subcontractors shall be required to pass on to and pay subcontractors mobilization fees within five (5) business days of being paid such fees by the City. For the purpose of posting on the City's website, Contractor and

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its subcontractors, are required to file notice with the City of release of retention and payment of mobilization fees, within five (5) business days of such payment or release; and, Contractors are required to file an affidavit, under penalty of perjury, that he or she has paid all subcontractors, within five (5) business days following receipt of payment from the City, The affidavit shall provide the names and address of all subcontractors and the amount paid to each.

Contractor and its subcontractors shall include the same or similar provisions as those set forth above in this section in any contract with a contractor or subcontractor that delivers goods and/or services pursuant to or in connection with a City of Oakland purchase contract.

8. Non-Discrimination/Equal Employment Practices

Contractor shall not discriminate or permit discrimination against any person or group of persons in any manner prohibited by federal, state or local laws. During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor agrees as follows:

- a. Contractor and Contractor's sub-contractors, if any, shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of age, marital status, religion, gender, sexual preference, race, creed, color, national origin, Acquired-Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), AIDS-Related Complex (ARC) or disability.
- b. This nondiscrimination policy shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, failure to promote, demotion or transfer, recruitment advertising, layoffs, termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship.
- c. Contractor and Contractor's Sub-contractors shall state in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of Contractor that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment

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without regard to age, marital status, religion, gender, sexual preference, race, creed, color, national origin, Acquired-Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), AIDS-Related Complex (ARC) or disability.

- d. Contractor shall make its goods, services, and facilities accessible to people with disabilities and shall verify compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act by executing Declaration of Compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, attached hereto and incorporated herein.
- e. If applicable, Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with whom Contractor has a collective bargaining agreement or contract or understanding, a notice advising the labor union or workers' representative of Contractor's commitments under this nondiscrimination clause and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- f. Contractor shall submit information concerning the ownership and workforce composition of Contractor's firm as well as its sub-Contractors and suppliers, by completing the Ownership, Ethnicity and Gender Questionnaire.
- g. The Project Contractor Team attached and incorporated herein and made a part of this Agreement, Exit Report and Affidavit, attached and incorporated herein and made a part of this Agreement.
- h. All affirmative action efforts of Contractors are subject to tracking by the City. This information or data shall be used for statistical purposes only.
- i. All Contractors are required to provide data regarding the make-up of their sub-Contractors and agents who will perform City contracts, including the race and gender of each employee and/or Contractor and his or her job title or function and the methodology used by Contractor to hire and/or contract with the individual or entity in question.
- j. The City will immediately report evidence or instances of apparent discrimination in City or Agency contracts to the appropriate State and Federal agencies, and will take action against Contractors who are found to be engaging in discriminatory acts or practices by an appropriate State or Federal agency or court of law, up to and including termination or debarment.
- k. In the recruitment of sub-Contractors, the City of Oakland requires all

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Contractors to undertake nondiscriminatory and equal outreach efforts, which include outreach to minorities and women-owned businesses as well as other segments of Oakland's business community. The City Administrator will track the City's MBE/WBE utilization to ensure the absence of unlawful discrimination on the basis of age, marital status, religion, gender, sexual preference, race, creed, color, national origin, Acquired-Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), AIDS-Related Complex (ARC) or disability.

1. In the use of such recruitment, hiring and retention of employees or sub-Contractors, the City of Oakland requires all Contractors to undertake nondiscriminatory and equal outreach efforts which include outreach to minorities and women as well as other segments of Oakland's business community.

9. Arizona and Arizona-Based Businesses

Contractor agrees that in accordance with Resolution No. 82727 C.M.S., neither it nor any of its subsidiaries, affiliates or agents that will provide services under this agreement is currently headquartered in the State of Arizona, and shall not establish an Arizona business headquarters for the duration of this agreement with the City of Oakland or until Arizona rescinds SB 1070.

Contractor acknowledges its duty to notify Contracts and Compliance Division, Office of the City Administrator if it's Business Entity or any of its subsidiaries affiliates or agents subsequently relocates its headquarters to the State of Arizona. Such relocation shall be a basis for termination of this agreement.

10. Sanctuary City Contracting and Investment Ordinance

Ordinance N.O. 13540 CMS was adopted by the Oakland City Council on June 4th, 2019 and prohibits the City from contracting with any person or entity that provides the United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) services or goods for data collection or with the United States Customs and Border Protection (CBP) Customs and Border Protection (CBP), or the Department of Health and Human Services Office of Refugee Resettlement (HHS/ORR) to support immigration detention facilities. These contractors are not to be used unless the City Council makes a specific determination that no reasonable alternative exists. The ordinance also prohibits the City from investing in any of these companies and requires the City to include notice of these prohibitions in any Requests for Proposals (RFPs), Requests for Qualifications (RFQs), and any construction or other contracting bids. The ordinance also requires

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that the City provide an annual report to the Privacy Advisory Commission on its enforcement.

11. Border Wall Ordinance

This contract is subject to the Border Wall Ordinance of Oakland Municipal Code (Ordinance 13459 C.M.S, passed November 28, 2017) and effective immediately upon adoption. The purpose of the ordinance is to mandate and direct the City Administrator- in instances where there is no significant additional cost, to be defined in regulations, or conflict with law- to refrain from entering into new or amended contracts to purchase professional, technical, scientific or financial services, goods, construction labor and materials or other services, or supplies from businesses that enter into contracts to provide such services, goods, materials or supplies to build the U.S.- Mexico border wall;

The City of Oakland shall be prohibited from entering into any contractual agreement for the purchase of services, goods, equipment, *cyber network or cloud computing, internet, or cloud-based computer technology or services* with any "**BORDER WALL ENTITY**" individual, firm, or financial institution who provides any services, goods, equipment or information technology or cloud-based technology or services, to construction of the a wall along any part of the United States – Mexico border.

All vendors seeking to do business with the City of Oakland must are complete and sign "Schedule W" as a statement of compliance with Ordinance 13459 C.M.S,

12. Pending Dispute Disclosure Policy:

Contractors are required to disclose pending disputes with the City of Oakland when they are involved in submitting bids, proposals or

applications for a City contract or transaction involving professional services. This includes contract amendments. Contractor agrees to disclose, and has disclosed, any and all pending disputes to the City prior to execution of this agreement. The City will provide a form for such disclosure upon Contractor's request. Failure to disclose pending disputes prior to execution of this amendment shall be a basis for termination of this agreement.

13. City of Oakland Campaign Contribution Limits

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This Agreement is subject to the City of Oakland Campaign Reform Act of Chapter 3.12 of the Oakland Municipal Code and its implementing regulations if it requires Council approval. The City of Oakland Campaign Reform Act prohibits Contractors that are doing business or seeking to do business with the City of Oakland from making campaign contributions to Oakland candidates between commencement of negotiations and either 180 days after completion of, or termination of, contract negotiations. If this Agreement requires Council approval, Contractor must sign and date an Acknowledgment of Campaign Contribution Limits Form.

14. Nuclear Free Zone Disclosure

Contractor represents, pursuant to the combined form Nuclear Free Zone Disclosure Form that Contractor is in compliance with the City of Oakland's restrictions on doing business with service providers considered nuclear weapons makers. Prior to execution of this agreement, Contractor shall complete the combined form, attached hereto.

15. Sample Professional Service Agreement

This Agreement is subject to the attached Sample Professional Service Agreement.

16. Insurance Requirements

The Contractor will be required to provide proof of all insurance required for the work prior to execution of the contract, including copies of the Contractor's insurance policies if and when requested.

Failure to provide the insurance proof requested or failure to do so in a timely manner shall constitute grounds for rescission of the contract award.

The Contractor shall name the City of Oakland, its Council members, directors, officers, agents, employees and volunteers as additional insured in its Comprehensive Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability policies. If Contractor submits the ACORD Insurance Certificate, the additional insured endorsement must be set forth on a CG20 10 11 85 form and/or CA 20 48 - Designated Insured Form (for business auto insurance).

Please Note: A statement of additional insured endorsement on the ACORD insurance certificate is insufficient and will be rejected as proof of the additional insured requirement.

Unless a written waiver is obtained from the City's Risk Manager, Contractors must provide the insurance as found at:

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<https://www.oaklandca.gov/documents/contracts-and-compliance-forms-and-schedules> (Schedule Q). A copy of the requirements is attached and incorporated herein by reference. Liability insurance shall be provided in accordance with the requirements specified.

When providing the insurance, include the Project Name and Project Number on the ACORD form in the section marked Description of Operations/Locations. When providing the insurance, the “Certificate Holder” should be listed as: City of Oakland, Contracts and Compliance, 250 Frank H. Ogawa Plaza, Suite 3341, Oakland, CA 94612.

17. City Contractor Performance Evaluation

At the end of the project, the Project Manager will evaluate the Contractor’s Performance in accordance with the City Contractor Performance Evaluation program.

18. Violation Of Federal, State, City/Agency Laws, Programs Or Policies:

The City or Agency may, in their sole discretion, consider violations of any programs and policies described or referenced in this Request for Proposal, a material breach and may take enforcement action provided under the law, programs or policies, and/or terminate the contract, debar contractors from further contracts with City and Agency and/or take any other action or invoke any other remedy available under law or equity.

19. Contractor’s Qualifications

Contractor represents that Contractor has the qualifications and skills necessary to perform the services under this Agreement in a competent and professional manner without the advice or direction of the City. Contractor’s services will be performed in accordance with the generally accepted principles and practices applicable to Contractor’s trade or profession. The Contractor warrants that the Contractor, and the Contractor’s employees and sub-contractors are properly licensed, registered, and/or certified as may be required under any applicable federal, state and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules and regulations relating to Contractor’s performance of the Services. All Services provided pursuant to this Agreement shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations. Contractor will promptly advise City of any change in the applicable laws, regulations, or other conditions that may affect City’s program. This means Contractor is able to fulfill the requirements of this Agreement. Failure to perform all of the services required under this Agreement will constitute a material breach of the Agreement and may be cause for termination of the Agreement. Contractor has complete and sole discretion for the manner in which the work under this Agreement is

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performed. Prior to execution of this agreement, Contractor shall complete the Independent Contractor Questionnaire, Part A, attached hereto.

21. All responses to the RFQ become the property of the City.
22. The RFQ does not commit the City to award a contract or to pay any cost incurred in the preparation of the proposal.
23. The City reserves the sole right to evaluate each proposal and to accept or reject any or all proposals received as a result of the RFQ process.
24. The City reserves the unqualified right to modify, suspend, or terminate at its sole discretion any and all aspects of the RFQ and/or RFQ process, to obtain further information from any and all Contractor teams and to waive any defects as to form or content of the RFQ or any responses by any contractor teams
25. The City may require a service provider to participate in negotiations and submit technical information or other revisions to the service provider's qualifications as may result from negotiations.
26. All documents and information submitted to the City of Oakland in response to an RFP are public records pursuant to California Government Code, Sections 6254, et seq. and City of Oakland Sunshine Ordinance, Oakland Municipal Code Chapter 2.20. The City shall disclose such documents and information upon request by any member of the public, absent a mandatory duty to withhold or a discretionary exemption that the City may choose to exercise. The City shall not in any way be liable or

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responsible for any disclosures of documents or information made pursuant to a request under the Public Records Act or the City of Oakland Sunshine Ordinance.

27. The Fair Political Practices Act and/or California Government Code Section 1090, among other statutes and regulations may prohibit the City from contracting with a service provider if the service provider or an employee, officer or director of the service providers' firm, or any immediate family of the preceding, or any sub-contractor or contractor of the service provider, is serving as a public official, elected official, employee, board or commission member of the City who will award or influence the awarding of the contract or otherwise participate in the making of the contract. The making of a contract includes actions that are preliminary or preparatory to the selection of a contractor such as, but not limited to, involvement in the reasoning, planning and/or drafting of solicitations for bids and RFQs, feasibility studies, master plans or preliminary discussions or negotiations.

V. DEFINITIONS

Definitions are provided below for terms commonly used in the RFQ.

- **Recidivism:** A subsequent criminal adjudication/conviction while on probation or parole supervision. (source: based on the CPOC definition). (The City will discuss this definition further with the chosen evaluator).
- **Results-based Accountability:** implies that expected results (also known as goals) are clearly articulated, and that data are regularly collected and reported to address questions of whether results have been achieved. (source: Harvard Family Research Project).
- **Highest risk:** Cohorts of youth and young adults who are 1) Directly impacted by violence, and/or 2) Most likely to be involved in perpetuating violence. (source: Human Services Department).
- **Procedural justice:** the idea that how individuals regard the justice system is tied more to the perceived fairness of the *process* and how they were treated rather than to the perceived fairness of the *outcome*. (source: U.S. Department of Justice).
- **Cultural competency:** A set of congruent behaviors, attitudes, and policies that come together in a system, agency, or among professionals that enables effective work in cross-cultural situations. (source: HRSA).

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- VOC: This is a benefits application for victims of crime. It is managed through California Victim Compensation Program which is a program of the Victim Compensation and Government Claims Board. More information available online at: <https://online.victims.ca.gov/>

BETWEEN THE CITY OF OAKLAND

Whereas, the City Council has authorized the City Administrator to enter into contracts for professional or specialized services if the mandates of Oakland City Charter Section 902(e) have been met.

Now therefore the parties to this Agreement covenant as follows:

1. Parties and Effective Date

This Agreement is made and entered into as of **Month, date, year** between the City of Oakland, a municipal corporation, (“City”), One Frank H. Ogawa Plaza, Oakland, California 94612, and **Name of Contractor** (“Contractor”)

2. Scope of Services

Contractor agrees to perform the services specified in **Schedule A, Scope of Services** attached to this Agreement and incorporated herein by reference. Contractor shall designate an individual who shall be responsible for communications with the City for the duration of this Agreement. **Schedule A** includes the manner of payment. The Project Manager for the City shall be **Project Manager**.

3. Time of Performance

Contractor’s services shall begin on **Month, Date, Year** and shall be completed **Month, Date, Year**.

4. Compensation and Method of Payment

Contractor will be paid for performance of the scope of services an amount that will be based upon actual costs but that will be “Capped” so as not to exceed **\$Amount**, based upon the scope of services in **Schedule A** and the budget by deliverable task and billing rates in **Schedule B**. The maximum that will be charged for the entire scope of work will not exceed the Capped amount, even if the Contractor’s actual costs exceed the Capped amount. Invoices shall state a description of the **deliverable** completed and the amount due. Payment will be due upon completion and acceptance of the deliverables as specified in the Scope of Services.

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In the aggregate, progress payments will not exceed ninety percent (90%) of the total amount of the contract, with the balance to be paid upon satisfactory completion of the

contract. Progress, or other payments, will be based on at least equivalent services rendered, and will not be made in advance of services rendered.

In computing the amount of any progress payment (this includes any partial payment of the contract price during the progress of the work, even though the work is broken down into clearly identifiable stages, or separate tasks), the City will determine the amount that the contractor has earned during the period for which payment is being made, based on the contract terms. The City will retain out of such earnings an amount at least equal to ten percent (10%), pending satisfactory completion of the entire contract.

5. Independent Contractor

a. Rights and Responsibilities

It is expressly agreed that in the performance of the services necessary to carry out this Agreement, Contractor shall be, and is, an independent contractor, and is not an employee of the City. Contractor has and shall retain the right to exercise full control and supervision of the services, and full control over the employment, direction, compensation and discharge of all persons assisting Contractor in the performance of Contractor's services hereunder. Contractor shall be solely responsible for all matters relating to the payment of his/her employees, including compliance with social security, withholding and all other regulations governing such matters, and shall be solely responsible for Contractor's own acts and those of Contractor's subordinates and employees. Contractor will determine the method, details and means of performing the services described in **Schedule A**.

b. Contractor's Qualifications

Contractor represents that Contractor has the qualifications and skills necessary to perform the services under this Agreement in a competent and professional manner without the advice or direction of The City. The Contractor warrants that the Contractor, and the Contractor's employees and sub-consultants are properly licensed, registered, and/or certified as may be required under any applicable federal, state and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules and regulations relating to Contractor's performance of the Services. All Services provided pursuant to this Agreement shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations. Contractor will promptly advise City of any change in the applicable laws, regulations, or other conditions that may affect City's program. This means Contractor can fulfill the requirements of this Agreement. Failure to perform all the services required under this Agreement will constitute a material breach of the

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Agreement and may be cause for termination of the Agreement. Contractor has complete and sole discretion for the manner in which the work under this

Agreement is performed. Prior to execution of this agreement, Contractor shall complete **Schedule M, Independent Contractor Questionnaire**, attached hereto.

c. Payment of Income Taxes

Contractor is responsible for paying, when due, all income taxes, including estimated taxes, incurred because of the compensation paid by the City to Contractor for services under this Agreement. On request, Contractor will provide the City with proof of timely payment. Contractor agrees to indemnify the City for any claims, costs, losses, fees, penalties, interest or damages suffered by the City resulting from Contractor's failure to comply with this provision.

d. Non-Exclusive Relationship

Contractor may perform services for, and contract with, as many additional clients, persons or companies as Contractor, in his or her sole discretion, sees fit.

e. Tools, Materials and Equipment

Contractor will supply all tools, materials and equipment required to perform the services under this Agreement.

f. Cooperation of the City

The City agrees to comply with all reasonable requests of Contractor necessary to the performance of Contractor's duties under this Agreement.

g. Extra Work

Contractor will do no extra work under this Agreement without first receiving prior written authorization from the City.

6. Proprietary or Confidential Information of the City

Contractor understands and agrees that, in the performance of the work or services under this Agreement or in contemplation thereof, Contractor may have access to private or confidential information which may be owned or controlled by the City and

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that such information may contain proprietary or confidential details, the disclosure of which to third parties may be damaging to the City. Contractor agrees that all information disclosed by the City to Contractor shall be held in confidence and used

only in performance of the Agreement. Contractor shall exercise the same standard of care to protect such information as a reasonably prudent contractor would use to protect its own proprietary data.

7. Ownership of Results

Any interest of Contractor or its Subcontractors, in specifications, studies, reports, memoranda, computation documents prepared by Contractor or its Subcontractors in drawings, plans, sheets or other connection with services to be performed under this Agreement shall be assigned and transmitted to the City. However, Contractor may retain and use copies for reference and as documentation of its experience and capabilities.

8. Copyright

Contractor shall execute appropriate documents to assign to the City the copyright to works created pursuant to this Agreement.

9. Audit

Contractor shall maintain (a) a full set of accounting records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures for all funds received under this Agreement; and (b) full and complete documentation of performance related matters such as benchmarks and deliverables associated with this Agreement.

Contractor shall (a) permit the City to have access to those records for making an audit, examination or review of financial and performance data pertaining to this Agreement; and (b) maintain such records for a period of four years following the last fiscal year during which the City paid an invoice to Contractor under this Agreement.

In addition to the above, Contractor agrees to comply with all audit, inspection, recordkeeping and fiscal reporting requirements incorporated by reference.

10. Agents/Brokers

Contractor warrants that Contractor has not employed or retained any subcontractor, agent, company or person other than bona fide, full-time employees of Contractor working solely for Contractor, to solicit or secure this Agreement, and that Contractor has not paid or agreed to pay any subcontractor, agent, company or persons other than bona fide

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employees any fee, commission, percentage, gifts or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award of this Agreement. For breach or violation of this warranty, the City shall have the right to rescind this Agreement without liability or, in its

discretion, to deduct from the Agreement price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage or gift.

11. Assignment

Contractor shall not assign or otherwise transfer any rights, duties, obligations or interest in this Agreement or arising hereunder to any person, persons, entity or entities whatsoever without the prior written consent of the City and any attempt to assign or transfer without such prior written consent shall be void. Consent to any single assignment or transfer shall not constitute consent to any further assignment or transfer.

12. Publicity

Any publicity generated by Contractor for the project funded pursuant to this Agreement, during the term of this Agreement or for one year thereafter, will refer to the contribution of the City of Oakland in making the project possible. The words "City of Oakland" will be explicitly stated in all pieces of publicity, including but not limited to flyers, press releases, posters, brochures, public service announcements, interviews and newspaper articles.

City staff will be available whenever possible at the request of Contractor to assist Contractor in generating publicity for the project funded pursuant to this Agreement. Contractor further agrees to cooperate with authorized City officials and staff in any City-generated publicity or promotional activities undertaken with respect to this project.

13. Title of Property

Title to all property, real and personal, acquired by the Contractor from City funds shall vest in the name of the City of Oakland and shall be accounted for by means of a formal set of property records. Contractor acknowledges it is responsible for the protection, maintenance and preservation of all such property held in custody for the City during the term of the Agreement. The Contractor shall, upon expiration or termination of this Agreement, deliver to the City all of said property and documents evidencing title to same. In the case of lost or stolen items or equipment, the Contractor shall immediately notify the Police Department, obtain a written police report and notify the City in accordance with "Notice" section of this Agreement.

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Contractor shall provide to the City Auditor all property-related audit and other reports required under this Agreement. In the case of lost or stolen items or equipment, the Contractor shall immediately notify the Police Department, obtain a written police report and notify the City in accordance with the “Notice” section of this Agreement.

Prior to the disposition or sale of any real or personal property acquired with City funds, Contractor shall obtain approval by the City Council and City Administrator in accord with the requirements for disposal or sale of real or personal surplus property set forth in the Oakland City Charter and/or Oakland Municipal Code Title 2.04, Chapter 2.04.120. Surplus supplies and equipment – Disposal or Destruction.

14. Insurance

Unless a written waiver is obtained from the City’s Risk Manager, Contractor must provide the insurance listed in **Schedule Q, Insurance Requirements**. **Schedule Q** is attached at the end of this sample agreement and incorporated herein by reference.

15. Indemnification

- a. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless (and at City’s request, defend) City, and each of their respective Councilmembers, officers, partners, agents, and employees (each of which persons and organizations are referred to collectively herein as "Indemnitees" or individually as "Indemnitee") from and against any and all liabilities, claims, lawsuits, losses, damages, demands, debts, liens, costs, judgments, obligations, administrative or regulatory fines or penalties, actions or causes of action, and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) caused by or arising out of any:
 - (i) Breach of Contractor's obligations, representations or warranties under this Agreement;
 - (ii) Act or failure to act in the course of performance by Contractor under this Agreement;
 - (iii) Negligent or willful acts or omissions in the course of performance by Contractor under this Agreement;
 - (iv) Claim for personal injury (including death) or property damage to the extent based on the strict liability or caused by any negligent act, error or omission of Contractor;

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- (v) Unauthorized use or disclosure by Contractor of Confidential Information as provided in Section 6 Proprietary of Confidential Information of the City above; and
 - (vi) Claim of infringement or alleged violation of any United States patent right or copyright, trade secret, trademark, or service mark or other proprietary or intellectual property rights of any third party.
- b. For purposes of the preceding Subsections (i) through (vi), the term “Contractor” includes Contractor, its officers, directors, employees, representatives, agents, servants, sub-consultants and subcontractors.
- c. City shall give Contractor prompt written notice of any such claim of loss or damage and shall cooperate with Contractor, in the defense and all related settlement negotiations to the extent that cooperation does not conflict with City's interests.
- d. Notwithstanding the foregoing, City shall have the right if Contractor fails or refuses to defend City with Counsel acceptable to City to engage its own counsel for the purposes of participating in the defense. In addition, City shall have the right to withhold any payments due Contractor in the amount of anticipated defense costs plus additional reasonable amounts as security for Contractor's obligations under this Section 15. In no event shall Contractor agree to the settlement of any claim described herein without the prior written consent of City.
- e. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that it has an immediate and independent obligation to indemnify and defend Indemnitees from any action or claim which potentially falls within this indemnification provision, which obligation shall arise at the time any action or claim is tendered to Contractor by City and continues at all times thereafter, without regard to any alleged or actual contributory negligence of any Indemnitee. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, Contractor’s liability under this Agreement shall not apply to any action or claim arising from the sole negligence, active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnitee.
- f. All of Contractor’s obligations under this Section 15 are intended to apply to the fullest extent permitted by law (including, without limitation, California Civil Code Section 2782) and shall survive the expiration or sooner termination of this Agreement.
- g. The indemnity set forth in this Section 15 shall not be limited by the City’s insurance requirements contained in Schedule Q hereof, or by any other provision of this Agreement. City’s liability under this Agreement shall be limited to payment of Contractor in accord to the terms and conditions under this Agreement

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and shall exclude any liability whatsoever for consequential or indirect damages even if such damages are foreseeable.

16. Right to Offset Claims for Money

All claims for money due or to become due from City shall be subject to deduction or offset by City from any monies due Contractor because of any claim or counterclaim arising out of: i) this Agreement, or ii) any purchase order, or iii) any other transaction with Contractor.

17. Prompt Payment Ordinance

This contract is subject to the Prompt Payment Ordinance of Oakland Municipal Code, Title 2, Chapter 2.06 (Ordinance 12857 C.M.S, passed January 15, 2008 and effective February 1, 2008). The Ordinance requires that, unless specific exemptions apply, the Contractor and its subcontractors shall pay undisputed invoices of their subcontractors for goods and/or services within twenty (20) business days of submission of invoices unless the Contractor or its subcontractors notify the Liaison in writing within five (5) business days that there is a bona fide dispute between the Contractor or its subcontractor and claimant, in which case the Contractor or its subcontractor may withhold the disputed amount but shall pay the undisputed amount.

Disputed late payments are subject to investigation by the City of Oakland Liaison, Division of Contracts and Compliance upon the filing of a complaint. Contractor or its subcontractors opposing payment shall provide security in the form of cash, certified check or bond to cover the disputed amount and penalty during the investigation. If Contractor or its subcontractor fails or refuses to deposit security, the City will withhold an amount sufficient to cover the claim from the next Contractor progress payment. The City, upon a determination that an undisputed invoice or payment is late, will release security deposits or withholds directly to claimants for valid claims.

Contractor and its subcontractors shall not be allowed to retain monies from subcontractor payments for goods as project retention, and are required to release subcontractor project retention in proportion to the subcontractor services rendered, for which payment is due and undisputed, within five (5) business days of payment. Contractor and its subcontractors shall be required to pass on to and pay subcontractors mobilization fees within five (5) business days of being paid such fees by the City. For the purpose of posting on the City's website, Contractor and its subcontractors, are required to file notice with the City of release of retention and payment of mobilization fees, within five (5) business days of such payment or release; and, Contractor is required to file an affidavit, under penalty of perjury, that he or she has paid all subcontractors, within five (5) business days following receipt of payment from the City. The affidavit shall provide the names and address of all subcontractors and the amount paid to each.

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If any amount due by a prime contractor or subcontractor to any claimant for goods and/or services rendered in connection with a purchase contract is not timely paid in accordance the Prompt Payment ordinance, the prime Contractor or subcontractor shall

owe and pay to the claimant interest penalty in the amount of ten percent (10%) of the improperly withheld amount per year for every month that payment is not made, provided the claimant agrees to release the prime contractor or subcontractor from any and all further interest penalty that may be claimed or collected on the amount paid. Claimants that receive interest payments for late payment Prompt Payment ordinance may not seek further interest penalties on the same late payment in law or equity.

Contractor and its subcontractors shall include the same or similar provisions as those set forth above in this section in any contract with another contractor or subcontractor that delivers goods and/or services pursuant to or in connection with this City of Oakland purchase contract.

18. Arizona and Arizona-Based Businesses

Contractor agrees that in accordance with Resolution No. 82727 C.M.S., neither it nor any of its subsidiaries, affiliates or agents that will provide services under this agreement is currently headquartered in the State of Arizona, and shall not establish an Arizona business headquarters for the duration of this agreement with the City of Oakland or until Arizona rescinds SB 1070.

Contractor acknowledges its duty to notify the Purchasing Department if it's Business Entity or any of its subsidiaries affiliates or agents subsequently relocates its headquarters to the State of Arizona. Such relocation shall be a basis for termination of this agreement.

19. Dispute Disclosure

Contractors are required to disclose pending disputes with the City of Oakland when they are involved in submitting bids, proposals or applications for a City or Agency contract or transaction involving professional services. This includes contract amendments. Contractor agrees to disclose, and has disclosed, any and all pending disputes to the City prior to execution of this agreement. The City will provide a form for such disclosure upon Contractor's request. Failure to disclose pending disputes prior to execution of this amendment shall be a basis for termination of this agreement.

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20. Termination on Notice

The City may terminate this Agreement immediately for cause or without cause upon giving (30) calendar days' written notice to Contractor. Unless otherwise terminated as provided in this Agreement, this Agreement will terminate on **month date year**.

21. Conflict of Interest

a. Contractor

The following protections against conflict of interest will be upheld:

- i. Contractor certifies that no member of, or delegate to the Congress of the United States shall be permitted to share or take part in this Agreement or in any benefit arising therefrom.
- ii. Contractor certifies that no member, officer, or employee of the City or its designees or agents, and no other public official of the City who exercises any functions or responsibilities with respect to the programs or projects covered by this Agreement, shall have any interest, direct or indirect in this Agreement, or in its proceeds during his/her tenure or for one year thereafter.
- iii. Contractor shall immediately notify the City of any real or possible conflict of interest between work performed for the City and for other clients served by Contractor.
- iv. Contractor warrants and represents, to the best of its present knowledge, that no public official or employee of City who has been involved in the making of this Agreement, or who is a member of a City board or commission which has been involved in the making of this Agreement whether in an advisory or decision-making capacity, has or will receive a direct or indirect financial interest in this Agreement in violation of the rules contained in California Government Code Section 1090 et seq., pertaining to conflicts of interest in public contracting. Contractor shall exercise due diligence to ensure that no such official will receive such an interest.
- v. Contractor further warrants and represents, to the best of its present knowledge and excepting any written disclosures as to these matters already made by Contractor to City, that (1) no public official of City who has participated in decision-making concerning this Agreement or

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has used his or her official position to influence decisions regarding this Agreement, has an economic interest in Contractor or this Agreement, and (2) this Agreement will not have a direct or indirect financial effect on said official, the official's spouse or dependent children, or any of the official's economic interests. For purposes of this paragraph, an official is deemed to have an "economic interest" in any (a) for-profit business entity in which the official has a direct or indirect investment worth \$2,000 or more, (b) any real property in which the official has a direct or indirect interest worth \$2,000 or more, (c) any for-profit business entity in which the official is a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee or manager, or (d) any source of income or donors of gifts to the official (including nonprofit entities) if the income or value of the gift totaled more than \$500 the previous year. Contractor agrees to promptly disclose to City in writing any information it may receive concerning any such potential conflict of interest. Contractor's attention is directed to the conflict of interest rules applicable to governmental decision-making contained in the Political Reform Act (California Government Code Section 87100 et seq.) and its implementing regulations (California Code of Regulations, Title 2, Section 18700 et seq.).

- vi. Contractor understands that in some cases Contractor or persons associated with Contractor may be deemed a "city officer" or "public official" for purposes of the conflict of interest provisions of Government Code Section 1090 and/or the Political Reform Act. Contractor further understands that, as a public officer or official, Contractor or persons associated with Contractor may be disqualified from future City contracts to the extent that Contractor is involved in any aspect of the making of that future contract (including preparing plans and specifications or performing design work or feasibility studies for that contract) through its work under this Agreement.
- vii. Contractor shall incorporate or cause to be incorporated into all subcontracts for work to be performed under this Agreement a provision governing conflict of interest in substantially the same form set forth herein.

b. No Waiver

Nothing herein is intended to waive any applicable federal, state or local conflict of interest law or regulation

c. Remedies and Sanctions

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In addition to the rights and remedies otherwise available to the City under this Agreement and under federal, state and local law, Contractor understands and agrees that, if the City reasonably determines that Contractor has failed to make

a good faith effort to avoid an improper conflict of interest situation or is responsible for the conflict situation, the City may (1) suspend payments under this Agreement, (2) terminate this Agreement, (3) require reimbursement by Contractor to the City of any amounts disbursed under this Agreement. In addition, the City may suspend payments or terminate this Agreement whether or not Contractor is responsible for the conflict of interest situation.

22. Non-Discrimination/Equal Employment Practices

Contractor shall not discriminate or permit discrimination against any person or group of persons in any manner prohibited by federal, state or local laws. During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor agrees as follows:

- a. Contractor and Contractor's subcontractors, if any, shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of age, marital status, religion, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, race, creed, color, national origin, Acquired-Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), AIDS-Related Complex (ARC) or disability. This nondiscrimination policy shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, failure to promote, demotion or transfer, recruitment advertising, layoffs, termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship.
- b. Contractor and Contractor's Subcontractors shall state in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of Contractor that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to age, marital status, religion, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, race, creed, color, national origin, Acquired-Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), AIDS-Related Complex (ARC) or disability.
- c. Contractor shall make its goods, services, and facilities accessible to people with disabilities and shall verify compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act by executing **Schedule C-1, Declaration of Compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act**, attached hereto and incorporated herein.
- d. If applicable, Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with whom Contractor has a collective bargaining agreement or contract or understanding, a notice advising the labor union or workers' representative of Contractor's commitments under this nondiscrimination clause and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

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23. Local and Small Local Business Enterprise Program (L/SLBE)

The City of Oakland has adopted a Local and Small Local Business Enterprise Program (L/SLBE). The City's current L/SLBE Program guidelines may be accessed via the following link:

Contractor understands and agrees to the following:

- a. Preference Points – Preference points are awarded based on the level of local, small local and very small local business participation that is proposed by contractors during the competitive solicitation process.
- b. Maintaining Participation – As a condition of award of this Contract, Contractor must achieve and maintain the levels of local, small local or very small local business participation for which preference points were earned during the competitive solicitation process or the levels of participation agreed upon by the Parties during negotiation of this Agreement. Failure to achieve and maintain the proposed levels of participation may result in the imposition of penalties as set forth in the above-reference Local and Small Local Business Enterprise Program guidelines.
- c. Contractor shall submit information concerning the ownership and workforce composition of Contractor's firm as well as its subcontractors and suppliers, by completing **Schedule D, Ownership, Ethnicity, and Gender Questionnaire**, and **Schedule E, Project Consultant Team**, which shall be attached hereto and incorporated herein.

24. Living Wage Ordinance

If the contract amount of this Agreement is equal to or greater than \$25,000 annually, then Contractor must comply with the Oakland Living Wage Ordinance. The Living Wage Ordinance requires that nothing less than a prescribed minimum level of compensation (a living wage) be paid to employees of service contractors (consultants) of the City and employees of CFARs (Ord. 12050 § 1, 1998). Oakland employers are also subject to the City of Oakland Minimum Wage law (see Section 25, below), and must pay employees wages and provide benefits consistent with the Minimum Wage law or Oakland Living Wage Ordinance, whichever are greater. The Ordinance also requires submission of the Declaration of Compliance attached and incorporated herein as **Schedule N** and made part of this Agreement, and, unless specific exemptions apply or a waiver is granted, the consultant must provide the following to its employees who perform services under or related to this Agreement:

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- a. Minimum compensation – Said employees shall be paid an initial **hourly wage rate of \$15.30 with health benefits or \$17.56 without health benefits.** These initial rates shall be upwardly adjusted each year no later than April 1 in proportion to the increase at the immediately preceding December 31 over the year earlier level of the Bay Region Consumer Price Index as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Department of Labor. **Effective July 1st of each year, contractor shall pay adjusted wage rate.**
- b. Health benefits – Said full-time and part-time employees paid at the lower living wage rate shall be provided health benefits of at least \$2.26 per hour. Contractor shall provide proof that health benefits are in effect for those employees no later than 30 days after execution of the contract or receipt of City financial assistance.
- c. Compensated days off – Said employees shall be entitled to twelve compensated days off per year for sick leave, vacation or personal necessity at the employee's request, and ten uncompensated days off per year for sick leave. Employees shall accrue one compensated day off per month of full-time employment. Part-time employees shall accrue compensated days off in increments proportional to that accrued by full-time employees. The employees shall be eligible to use accrued days off after the first six months of employment or consistent with company policy, whichever is sooner. Paid holidays, consistent with established employer policy, may be counted toward provision of the required 12 compensated days off. Ten uncompensated days off shall be made available, as needed, for personal or immediate family illness after the employee has exhausted his or her accrued compensated days off for that year.
- d. Federal Earned Income Credit (EIC) - To inform employees that he or she may be eligible for Earned Income Credit (EIC) and shall provide forms to apply for advance EIC payments to eligible employees. There are several websites and other sources available to assist you. Web sites include but are not limited to: (1) <http://www.irs.gov> for current guidelines as prescribed by the Internal Revenue Service.
- e. Contractor shall provide to all employees and to the Division of Contracts and Compliance, written notice of its obligation to eligible employees under the City's Living Wage requirements. Said notice shall be posted prominently in communal areas of the work site(s) and shall include the above-referenced information.
- f. Contractor shall provide all written notices and forms required above in English, Spanish or other languages spoken by a significant number of employees within 30 days of employment under this Agreement.
- g. Reporting – Contractor shall maintain a listing of the name, address, hire date, occupation classification, rate of pay and benefits for each of its employees.

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Contractor shall provide a copy of said list to the Division of Contracts and Compliance, on a quarterly basis, by March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31 for the applicable compliance period. Failure to provide said list within five days of the due date will result in liquidated damages of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each day that the list remains outstanding. Contractor shall maintain employee payroll and related records for a period of four (4) years after expiration of the compliance period.

- h. Contractor shall require subcontractors that provide services under or related to this Agreement to comply with the above Living Wage provisions. Contractor shall include the above-referenced sections in its subcontracts. Copies of said subcontracts shall be submitted to the Division of Contracts and Compliance.

25. Minimum Wage Ordinance

Oakland employers are subject to Oakland's Minimum Wage Law, whereby Oakland employees must be paid the current Minimum Wage rate. Employers must notify employees of the annually adjusted rates by each December 15th and prominently display notices at the job site.

The law requires paid sick leave for employees and payment of service charges collected for their services.

This contract is also subject to Oakland's Living Wage Ordinance (see Section 24, above), and must pay employees wages and provide benefits consistent with the Living Wage Ordinance, whichever are greater.

26. Equal Benefits Ordinance

This Agreement is subject to the Equal Benefits Ordinance of Chapter 2.32 of the Oakland Municipal Code and its implementing regulations. The purpose of this Ordinance is to protect and further the public, health, safety, convenience, comfort, property and general welfare by requiring that public funds be expended in a manner to prohibit discrimination in the provision of employee benefits by City contractors (consultants) between employees with spouses and employees with domestic partners, and/or between domestic partners and spouses of such employees. (Ord. 12394 (part), 2001)

The following contractors are subject to the Equal Benefits Ordinance: Entities which enter into a "contract" with the City for an amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) or more for public works or improvements to be performed, or for goods or services to be purchased or grants to be provided at the expense of the City or to be paid out of moneys deposited in the treasury or out of trust moneys under the control of

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or collected by the city; and Entities which enter into a "property contract" pursuant to Section 2.32.020(D) with the City in an amount of twenty-five thousand dollars

(\$25,000.00) or more for the exclusive use of or occupancy (1) of real property owned or controlled by the city or (2) of real property owned by others for the city's use or occupancy, for a term exceeding twenty-nine (29) days in any calendar year.

The Ordinance shall only apply to those portions of a contractor's operations that occur (1) within the city; (2) on real property outside the city if the property is owned by the city or if the city has a right to occupy the property, and if the contract's presence at that location is connected to a contract with the city; and (3) elsewhere in the United States where work related to a city contract is being performed. The requirements of this chapter shall not apply to subcontracts or subcontractors of any contract or contractor

The Equal Benefits Ordinance requires among other things, submission of the attached and incorporated herein as **Schedule N-1, Equal Benefits-Declaration of Nondiscrimination**.

27. City of Oakland Campaign Contribution Limits

This Agreement is subject to the City of Oakland Campaign Reform Act of Chapter 3.12 of the Oakland Municipal Code and its implementing regulations if it requires Council approval. The City of Oakland Campaign Reform Act prohibits contractors that are doing business or seeking to do business with the City of Oakland from making campaign contributions to Oakland candidates between commencement of negotiations and either 180 days after completion of, or termination of, contract negotiations.

If this Agreement requires Council approval, Contractor must sign and date an Acknowledgment of Campaign Contribution Limits Form attached hereto and incorporated herein as **Schedule O**.

28. Nuclear Free Zone Disclosure

Contractor represents, pursuant to **Schedule P, Nuclear Free Zone Disclosure Form**, that Contractor follows the City of Oakland's restrictions on doing business with service providers considered nuclear weapons makers. Prior to execution of this agreement, Contractor shall complete **Schedule P**, attached hereto.

29. Political Prohibition

Subject to applicable State and Federal laws, moneys paid pursuant to this Agreement shall not be used for political purposes, sponsoring or conducting candidate's meetings,

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engaging in voter registration activity, nor for publicity or propaganda purposes designed to support or defeat legislation pending before federal, state or local government.

30. Religious Prohibition

There shall be no religious worship, instruction, or proselytization as part of, or in connection with the performance of the Agreement.

31. Business Tax Certificate

Contractor shall obtain and provide proof of a valid City business tax certificate. Said certificate must remain valid during the duration of this Agreement.

32. Abandonment of Project

The City may abandon or indefinitely postpone the project or the services for any or all the project at any time. In such event, the City shall give thirty (30) days written notice of such abandonment. In the event of abandonment prior to completion of the final drawings, if applicable, and cost estimates, Contractor shall have the right to expend a reasonable amount of additional time to assemble work in progress for the purpose of proper filing and closing the job. Prior to expending said time, Contractor shall present to the City a complete report of said proposed job closure and its costs, and the City may approve all or any part of said expense. Such additional time shall not exceed ten percent (10%) of the total time expended to the date of notice of termination. All charges thus incurred and approved by the City, together with any other charges outstanding at the time of termination, shall be payable by the City within thirty (30) days following submission of a final statement by Contractor.

Should the project or any portion thereof be abandoned, the City shall pay the Contractor for all services performed thereto in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

33. Validity of Contracts

This Agreement shall not be binding or of any force or effect until it is: i) approved by resolution of the City Council as required by the Oakland City Charter, Oakland Municipal Code Title 2.04 and Oakland City Council Rules of Procedure, ii) approved for form and legality by the Office of the City Attorney, and iii) signed by the City Administrator or his or her designee.

34. Governing Law

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This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California.

35. Notice

If either party shall desire or be required to give notice to the other, such notice shall be given in writing, via facsimile and concurrently by prepaid U.S. certified or registered postage, addressed to recipient as follows:

Any party to this Agreement may change the name or address of representatives for purpose of this Notice paragraph by providing written notice to all other parties ten (10) business days before the change is effective.

36. Entire Agreement of the Parties

This Agreement supersedes all agreements, either oral or written, between the parties with respect to the rendering of services by Contractor for the City and contains all the representations, covenants and agreements between the parties with respect to the rendering of those services. Each party to this Agreement acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises or agreements, orally or otherwise, have been made by any party, or anyone acting on behalf of any party, which are not contained in this Agreement, and that no other agreement, statement or promise not contained in this Agreement will be valid or binding.

37. Modification

Any modification of this Agreement will be effective only if it is in a writing signed by all parties to this Agreement.

38. Severability/Partial Invalidity

If any term or provision of this Agreement, or the application of any term or provision of this Agreement to a particular situation, shall be finally found to be void, invalid, illegal or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, then notwithstanding such determination, such term or provision shall remain in force and effect to the extent allowed by such ruling and all other terms and provisions of this Agreement or the application of this Agreement to other situation shall remain in full force and effect.

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Notwithstanding the foregoing, if any material term or provision of this Agreement or the application of such material term or condition to a situation is finally found to be void, invalid, illegal or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, then the Parties hereto agree to work in good faith and fully cooperate with each other to amend this Agreement to carry out its intent.

39. Time of the Essence

Time is of the essence in the performance of this Agreement.

40. Commencement, Completion and Close out

It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor to coordinate and schedule the work to be performed so that commencement and completion take place in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

Any time extension granted to Contractor to enable Contractor to complete the work must be in writing and shall not constitute a waiver of rights the City may have under this Agreement.

Should the Contractor not complete the work by the scheduled date or by an extended date, the City shall be released from all its obligations under this Agreement.

Within thirty (30) days of completion of the performance under this Agreement, the Contractor shall make a determination of any and all final costs due under this Agreement and shall submit a requisition for such final and complete payment (including without limitations any and all claims relating to or arising from this Agreement) to the City. Failure of the Contractor to timely submit a complete and accurate requisition for final payment shall relieve the City of any further obligations under this Agreement, including without limitation any obligation for payment of work performed or payment of claims by Contractor.

41. Approval

If the terms of this Agreement are acceptable to Contractor and the City, sign and date below.

42. Inconsistency

If there is any inconsistency between the main agreement and the attachments/exhibits, the text of the main agreement shall prevail.

Schedule Q

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

(Revised 09/12/2019)

a. General Liability, Automobile, Workers' Compensation and Professional Liability

Contractor shall procure, prior to commencement of service, and keep in force for the term of this contract, at Contractor's own cost and expense, the following policies of insurance or certificates or binders as necessary to represent that coverage as specified below is in place with companies doing business in California and acceptable to the City. If requested, Contractor shall provide the City with copies of all insurance policies. The insurance shall at a minimum include:

- i. **Commercial General Liability insurance** shall cover bodily injury, property damage and personal injury liability for premises operations, independent contractors, products-completed operations personal & advertising injury and contractual liability. Coverage shall be on an occurrence basis and at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability coverage (occurrence Form CG 00 01)

Limits of liability: Contractor shall maintain commercial general liability (CGL) and, if necessary, commercial umbrella insurance with a limit of not less than \$2,000,000 each occurrence. If such CGL insurance contains a general aggregate limit, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.

- ii. **Automobile Liability Insurance.** Contractor shall maintain automobile liability insurance for bodily injury and property damage liability with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each accident. Such insurance shall cover liability arising out of any auto (including owned, hired, and non-owned autos). Coverage shall be at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001.
- iii. **Workers' Compensation insurance** as required by the laws of the State of California, with statutory limits, and statutory coverage may include Employers' Liability coverage, with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each accident, \$1,000,000 policy limit bodily injury by disease, and \$1,000,000 each employee bodily injury by disease. The Contractor certifies that he/she is aware of the provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, which requires every employer to provide Workers' Compensation coverage, or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that Code. The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code before commencing performance of the work under this Agreement and thereafter as required by that code.

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- iv. **Professional Liability/ Errors and Omissions insurance, if determined to be required by HRM/RMD**, appropriate to the contractor's profession with limits not less than \$_____ each claim and \$_____ aggregate. If the professional liability/errors and omissions insurance is written on a claims- made form:
 - a. The retroactive date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of work.
 - b. Insurance must be maintained, and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least three (3) years after completion of the contract work.
 - c. If coverage is cancelled or non-renewed and not replaced with another claims made policy form with a retroactive date prior to the contract effective date, the contractor must purchase extended period coverage for a minimum of three (3) years after completion of work.

- v. **Contractor's Pollution Liability Insurance:** If the Contractor is engaged in: environmental remediation, emergency response, hazmat cleanup or pickup, liquid waste remediation, tank and pump cleaning, repair or installation, fire or water restoration or fuel storage dispensing, then for small jobs (projects less than \$500,000), the Contractor must maintain Contractor's Pollution Liability Insurance of at least \$500,000 for each occurrence and in the aggregate. If the Contractor is engaged in environmental sampling or underground testing, then Contractor must also maintain Errors and Omissions (Professional Liability) of \$500,000 per occurrence and in the aggregate.

- vi. **Sexual/Abuse insurance.** If Contractor will have contact with persons under the age of 18 years, or provides services to persons with Alzheimer's or Dementia, or provides Case Management services, or provides Housing services to vulnerable groups (i.e., homeless persons) Contractor shall maintain sexual/molestation/abuse insurance with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence and \$1,000,000 in the aggregate. Insurance must be maintained, and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least three (3) years after completion of the contract work.

- vii. **Technology Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) OR Cyber Liability Insurance, if determined to be required by HRM/RMD**, *appropriate to the Consultant's profession, with limits not less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate. Coverage shall be sufficiently broad to respond to the duties and obligations as is undertaken by Consultant in this agreement and shall include, but not be limited to, claims involving infringement of intellectual property, including but not limited to infringement of copyright, trademark, trade dress, invasion of privacy violations, information theft, damage to or destruction of electronic information, release of private information, alteration of electronic information,*

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extortion and network security. The policy shall provide coverage for breach response costs as well as regulatory fines and penalties as well as credit monitoring expenses with limits sufficient to respond to these obligations.

b. Terms Conditions and Endorsements

The aforementioned insurance shall be endorsed and have all the following conditions:

- i. Insured Status (Additional Insured): Contractor shall provide insured status naming the City of Oakland, its Councilmembers, directors, officers, agents, employees and volunteers as insureds under the Commercial General Liability policy. General Liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Contractor's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 (11/85) or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37 forms, if later revisions used). If Contractor submits the ACORD Insurance Certificate, the insured status endorsement must be set forth on an ISO form CG 20 10 (or equivalent). A STATEMENT OF ADDITIONAL INSURED STATUS ON THE ACORD INSURANCE CERTIFICATE FORM IS INSUFFICIENT AND WILL BE REJECTED AS PROOF OF MEETING THIS REQUIREMENT; and
- ii. Coverage afforded on behalf of the City, Councilmembers, directors, officers, agents, employees and volunteers shall be primary insurance. Any other insurance available to the City Councilmembers, directors, officers, agents, employees and volunteers under any other policies shall be excess insurance (over the insurance required by this Agreement); and
- iii. Cancellation Notice: Each insurance policy required by this clause shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the Entity; and
- iv. The Workers' Compensation policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City for all work performed by the contractor, its employees, agents and subcontractors; and
- v. Certificate holder is to be the same person and address as indicated in the "Notices" section of this Agreement; and
- vi. Insurer shall carry insurance from admitted companies with an A.M. Best Rating of A VII, or better.

c. Replacement of Coverage

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In the case of the breach of any of the insurance provisions of this Agreement, the City may, at the City's option, take out and maintain at the expense of Contractor, such insurance in the name of Contractor as is required pursuant to this Agreement, and may deduct the cost of taking out and maintaining such insurance from any sums which may be found or become due to Contractor under this Agreement.

d. Insurance Interpretation

All endorsements, certificates, forms, coverage and limits of liability referred to herein shall have the meaning given such terms by the Insurance Services Office as of the date of this Agreement.

e. Proof of Insurance

Contractor will be required to provide proof of all insurance required for the work prior to execution of the contract, including copies of Contractor's insurance policies if, and when, requested. Failure to provide the insurance proof requested or failure to do so in a timely manner shall constitute ground for rescission of the contract award.

f. Subcontractors

Should the Contractor subcontract out the work required under this agreement, they shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies or shall maintain separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. As an alternative, the Contractor may require all subcontractors to provide at their own expense evidence of all the required coverages listed in this Schedule. If this option is exercised, both the City of Oakland and the Contractor shall be named as additional insured under the subcontractor's General Liability policy. All coverages for subcontractors shall be subject to all the requirements stated herein. The City reserves the right to perform an insurance audit during the project to verify compliance with requirements.

g. Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions

Any deductible or self-insured retention must be declared to and approved by the City. At the option of the City, either: the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductible or self-insured retentions as respects the City, its Councilmembers, directors, officers, agents, employees and volunteers; or the Contractor shall provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to the City guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration and defense expenses.

h. Waiver of Subrogation

Contractor waives all rights against the City of Oakland and its Councilmembers, officers, directors, employees and volunteers for recovery of damages to the extent these damages are covered by the forms of insurance coverage required above.

i. Evaluation of Adequacy of Coverage

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The City of Oakland maintains the right to modify, delete, alter or change these requirements, with reasonable notice, upon not less than ninety (90) days prior written notice.

j. Higher Limits of Insurance

If the contractor maintains higher limits than the minimums shown above, The City shall be entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by the contractor.

The City of Oakland Campaign Reform Act prohibits Contractors that are doing business or seeking to do business with the City of Oakland from making campaign contributions to Oakland candidates between commencement of negotiations and either 180 days after completion of, or termination of, contract negotiations. 15. Schedule R – (Subcontractor, Supplier, Trucking Listing) – applies to Construction agreements only and is a “stand alone Schedule”.

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- ii. For establishing level of certified local Oakland for profit and not for profit participation and calculating compliance with council's 50% local participation policy.
- iii. In response to this Notice Inviting Bids (NIB) opportunity, the prime shall be a qualified for profit or not-for profit entity.
- iv. The contractor herewith must list all subcontractors and suppliers with values more than one-half of 1 percent of the prime contractor's total bid or ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) whichever is greater regardless of tier and all trucking and dollar amount regardless of tier to be used on the project. The contractor agrees that no changes will be made in this list without the approval of the City of Oakland. Provide the address, type of work, dollar amount and check all boxes that apply. Bidders that do not list all subcontractors and suppliers with values greater than one half of one percent and all truckers regardless of tier and dollar amount shall be deemed non-responsive.
- v. Identify if contractors are certified MBE, WBE, Local Business Enterprises (LBE) and Small Local Business Enterprise (SLBE), Locally Produced Goods or Very Small Local Business Enterprise.

16. Schedule V – (Affidavit of Non-Disciplinary or Investigatory Action) - Applies to all agreements is part of the “Combined Contract Schedules”.
