RESOLUTION:

- 1. AWARDING GRANT AGREEMENTS AND PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENTS TO THE HOMELESS SERVICE PROVIDERS IDENTIFIED IN TABLES 1 AND 2 FOR FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2022-2023 USING STATE OF CALIFORNIA HOMELESS, HOUSING, ASSISTANCE AND PREVENTION (HHAP) FUNDS AND LOCAL MEASURE Q FUNDING; AND
- 2. AWARDING PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENTS TO TWO CONSULTANTS IDENTIFIED IN TABLES 1 AND 2 TO SUPPORT HOMELESS SERVICES PROVIDERS FOR FY 2022-2024 USING HHAP FUNDS AND LOCAL MEASURE Q FUNDS; AND
- 3. AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO MOVE MEASURE Q AND HHAP FUNDING BETWEEN THE ABOVE AGREEMENTS, IF NEEDED, TO ENSURE TIMELY SPEND DOWN OF TIME LIMITED FUNDS, SUBJECT TO ANY APPLICABLE FUNDING REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS; AND
- 4. AUTHORIZING PAYMENTS IN THE AMOUNT OF UP TO \$40,000 PER YEAR FOR FY 2022-2023 AND FY 2023-2024 TO LEASE THE MATILDA CLEVELAND FAMILY TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM BUILDING, LOCATED AT 8314 MACARTHUR BLVD, FROM HOPE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION AND MAKING CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT FINDINGS

WHEREAS, on April 20, 2021, the City Council passed Resolution No. 88603 C.M.S., which, among other things, awarded grant agreements and professional services agreements to homeless service providers for a term through June 30, 2022 using Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP), Homeless, Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) funds, and Emergency Solutions Grant-COVID (ESG-CV) funds; and

WHEREAS, on March 20, 2021, the City Council passed Resolution No. 88451 C.M.S., which, among other things, awarded grant agreements and professional services agreements to homeless service providers for a term through June 30, 2022 using appropriated Measure Q funds; and

WHEREAS, on December 21, 2021, the City Council passed Resolution No. 88949 C.M.S.,

which, among other things, accepted and appropriated HHAP Round 2 and HHAP Round 3 funds for the provision of emergency homeless interventions; and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland Fiscal Year 2021-2023 Biennial Budget includes Measure Q funding for homelessness programs and services; and

WHEREAS, staff now seeks authorization to enter into agreements for new and existing services with homeless intervention service providers from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023 using accepted and appropriated HHAP and Measure Q funds as stated in Tables 1 and 2 below;

WHEREAS, the State of California, Interagency Council on Homelessness (Cal ICH) is strongly encouraging the use of HHAP and other funds for capacity building and professional development for service providers within the jurisdiction, including removing barriers to contracting with culturally specific service providers and building capacity of providers to administer culturally specific services; and

WHEREAS, staff now seek authorization to enter into two agreements for consulting services which will provide professional development to homeless services providers on anti-racist and culturally responsive services and which will support small BIPOC led agencies to contract with the City for homeless services work; and

WHEREAS, The Matilda Cleveland Family Transitional Housing Program is located at 8314 MacArthur Boulevard in Oakland and is the property is leased by the City from Hope Housing Development Corporation; and

WHEREAS, staff may need to shift HHAP and Measure Q funds between the agreements in Table 1 and Table 2 to ensure that all funds are timely expended and align with regulatory requirements; and

WHEREAS, funding for the HHAP Programs is appropriated in the State of California Fund (2159), Community Homelessness Organization (78411), Projects (1006326 and 1006126), Fostering Safe and Healthy Communities Program (SC22) and allocated towards the awards set forth in Table 1 below; and

WHEREAS, funding for Measure Q is appropriated in Fund (2244) Community Homelessness Organization (78411), Projects (1005349), Fostering Safe and Healthy Communities Program (SC22) and allocated towards the awards set forth in Table 2 below; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council awards the following grants and professional services agreements for homeless intervention services in an amount not to exceed the specified amount for July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023 in Table 1a below using accepted and appropriated HHAP funds, subject to any applicable funding regulations and requirements; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Council awards a professional services agreement to Jewled Legacy for Capacity Building services in an amount not to exceed the specified amount for July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2024 in Table 1b below using accepted and appropriated HHAP funds, subject to any applicable funding regulations and requirements:
