







E. Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance:

3400 Broadway stands as a striking example of Gothic Revival-Beaux Arts architecture in the heart of the Upper Broadway Auto Row district of Oakland, California. This five-story steel-reinforced and masonry warehouse building, characterized by its 100'x50' rectangular footprint and formerly a distinctive tower standing 95' in height, establishes a prominent presence in the neighborhood. Historically, the building housed various businesses, including the Lyon Moving and Storage Co., whose founder, Harvey Lyon, originally specified a three-story clock tower atop the building.

The building's Broadway facade showcases intricate cast concrete detailing, featuring arches, rosettes, and pilaster caps, which contribute to its Gothic Revival-Beaux Arts aesthetic. The facade is divided into three sections: the ground floor, which is double-height and includes a mezzanine floor, features single large storefront windows on the side bays and Gothic-arched doorways flanking the wider center section. Two niches adorned with lion statues stand guard on either side of a large sign panel at the second-floor level, adding a touch of grandeur to the four-story middle (shaft) section. The top level (capital) has a Gothic-arched crenelated parapet and peaked caps atop the four full-height concrete stone-patterned pilaster sections of the facade.

The rear facade facing Piedmont Avenue, across a large parking lot, employs a simplified version of the Broadway front, with loading doors at the ground level and simpler fire escapes.

The building's side walls are built to the lot lines and are solid and largely unadorned, and were once patterned brickwork like the Piedmont and Broadway facing elevations of the building. However, the Saw Mill later underwent a major exterior renovation. As stated in the 1999 Oakland Tribune article by Annalee Allen, "Lions Still on Guard at Award-winning Rehab," these walls were stuccoed with tones of taupe and cream, and with window and door openings trimmed in black and cranberry. The black and cranberry trim is still present today, an example being the storefront doors & windows on the building's Broadway frontage.




Constructed with a concrete foundation and exterior walls made of brick and cast concrete, 3400 Broadway exhibits a harmonious blend of materials, with the brickwork and concrete elements designed to match. The building's interior consists of concrete columns and poured-in-place concrete walls, as well as brick walls. The building's structural integrity is evident in the Oakland Building Department records dated October 18, 1991, which note that Sanborn maps once described the building as "fireproof construction with 12-inch thick curtain walls." This description implies that the building was not only structurally sound but also capable of withstanding seismic events, a crucial consideration in California. However, the iconic pyramid-roofed stucco clock tower, which was originally designed by Harvey Lyon, the building's original owner, had to be demolished due to damage caused by the Loma Prieta earthquake of 1989. Although the clock tower's stucco exterior is no longer present, the steel skeleton of the tower still stands. Currently, it is leased by various cellular companies to mount their antennas and panels.

Today, 3400 Broadway maintains its original architectural charm and significance as a testament to the era's craftsmanship and attention to detail. The combination of Gothic Revival and Beaux-Arts elements, coupled with its robust construction and fireproof features, makes this warehouse a unique and valuable historical landmark in Oakland, California.

G. Statement of Significance (include summary statement of significance as first paragraph):

According to Harvey Lyon's *Port of Oakland Compass* article, before the Civil War, the concept of a household goods warehouse was virtually non-existent. It wasn't until a Philadelphia store owner offered his friends a place to store their belongings during the war that the idea of a home goods warehouse was born. In the subsequent 20 years, the store owner went on to create the first official home goods store, a non-fireproof building designed to offer a dry space for storing furniture and other household items.

In response to the growing industry and the lessons learned from disastrous fire events that demonstrated the flammability of household goods, 3400 Broadway emerged as part of a groundbreaking development when renowned Oakland Architect, Clay Burrell, took on the design of the Lyon building. By the end of Burrell's career, he had designed at least 49 hotels, apartments, and mid-sized commercial buildings of masonry construction throughout the East Bay. His style was known for his Beaux Arts themes, utilizing newer structural methods, and brick and terra cotta facades - all of which are apparent when looking at the then Lyon Moving and Storage Warehouse, or Saw Mill today. Burrell partnered with F.A. Muller in 1916 to construct the building.

Although the construction materials and methods used for 3400 Broadway may now be seen as outdated, the building exemplified the state-of-the-art technology of its time. One of its standout features was the Reichel automatic fire alarm system, which demonstrated a commitment to safety in an era when many new constructions lacked essential features like fire alarms and sprinkler systems. Today, fireproof construction is a standard in the industry, and the importance of protecting building occupants and stored goods from fire hazards is further emphasized by the widespread adoption of automatic sprinkler and fire alarm systems. 3400 Broadway encapsulates this evolution in warehouse safety standards.

The building also housed a time lock silver vault and a special cyanide gas chamber, the latter of which was used to exterminate moths and similar pests. This gas chamber functioned as a sideline business, offering clients fumigation services. Moreover, 3400 Broadway included a piano, chesterfield, drapery, and rug rooms, showcasing its commitment to modernity during its time. The below photo is of the Lyon Co.'s transport vehicles, used for its clients delivering fumigated furniture and the like, to and from 3400 Broadway.

Harvey Lyon brought attention to the building in his promotional article "Household Goods Warehousing" in the Port of Oakland Compass. He marketed the Lyon Moving and Storage Co., stating that 3400 Broadway marked a significant milestone in household goods warehousing in Oakland, as the building employed novel and state-of-the-art construction practices and safety measures in response to a growing industry demand. This early 20th-century building provided a secure and protected environment for valuable items, which is evident in how the building performed during the 1989 earthquake, as well as how the building's current tenants enjoy the quality and functionality of its 100-year-old architecture.

Harvey Lyon owned and operated The Lyon Moving and Storage Co. until the 1950's, when he sold his business and the building to Neptune Moving. Later it was bought by Ronnie Sherman, who then used the building to operate his Saw Mill furniture chain. Present day, the building is used by various tenants – from home goods store showrooms, woodworking studios, to photography and digital arts.

Household Goods Warehousing

A Moving Tale With Many An Interesting and Human Sidelight

EFORE the Civil War there was no such thing as a household roods warchouse. If one wished to store is home furnishings, he rented a space in the livery stable loft or arranged with the upholsterer to care for all his ods in return for an order to make over the mattresses. In 1861, however when so many homes were rapidly broken up with the men folk at the front, the owner of a certain vacant store in Philadelphia offered to allow friends to place their household goods n his store until he could rent it. The store filled immediately, and the owner envisioned a new industry. In 1863, he wilt the first household goods wareouse, non-fireproof, and during the acceeding twenty years, several others of similar construction were erected. In 1883, however, a disastrous wareouse fire brought to the attention of tertain Eastern capitalists the fact hat a non-fireproof warehouse full of bousehold goods is an ideal bonfire. They decided that personal belongings worthy of being stored are worthy of protection from fire, and in that year there were built the first two fire-proof warehouses in the country—the Lincoln and the Manhattan, in New




York City, Today, only fireproof construction is thought of in the industry, and protection against fire is rein-forced by the installation of automatic fire alarms, until one's household goods are now safer in a modern warehouse

Progress Outlined

The Lyon Storage & Moving Co. is an outgrowth of the furniture business conducted by the father of the present manager, in the early days of Oakland. Customers of the furniture store asked the elder Lyon from time to time to care for their goods while they were out of the city, and as a conse quence, in the early 90's, he erected the first household goods warehouse in the Bay area, a small, iron building on Twenty-eighth Street near Grove, story, twenty-five by one hundred feet. A couple of years later, the ware was lengthened by forty feet, and a letter was sent out to the public proclaiming that the firm was now pre-pared to care for the storage needs of Oakland for many years to come. The humor of this notice was appreciated, however, in 1911 when the Lyon Com-pany built their first reinforced conwarehouse, containing twenty

Despite renovations over the years, the building's original facade still exudes its aesthetic charm, standing proudly much like it did over a century ago. It carries the rich history of the Upper Broadway Auto Row District, preserving the legacy of the area.




