Mark Romoser begins the meeting with a reminder of rules for in-person meetings:

Chair Baroudi called the meeting to order at 5:36.

 At roll call, quorum was established with eight of ten commissioners present.

Open Forum:

Sheela Gunn mentioned that cold, a frost advisory, and rain were in the forecast, so it's time to clean gutters and make other preparations. They also noted that TheCIL and WID have a report on disabled and seniors being sheltered in disasters, which will be out soon.

Mark Romoser read a statement from Ruth Meza of OakDOT about the Undercrossing Improvement Project (see appendix).

Vice Chair Bartu arrived at 5:40.

Approval Of Minutes

• Comm. Roh made a motion to approve the October 2024 minutes. Comm. Wilson seconded. Motion was approved 9-0.

Commissioner's Announcements

 Chair Baroudi noted that bond sales under Measure U are important for safety projects, but there was no bond sale in October as

scheduled. He asked if budget cuts would impact aging or disability services.

Regional Center of the East Bay

- Ronke Sodipo gave her presentation.
- Comm. Cloyd asked how many participated in RCEB programs, whether the transport provided was accessible, and what RCEB needed from MCPD. Ms. Sodipo replied that there were over 26,000 participants in the two counties RCEB serves, that both paratransit and contracted transportation were accessible, and that the greatest needs of RCEB consumers were transportation and housing.
- Comm. Roh asked about waitlists or wait times for assessments and housing. Ms. Sodipo replied that there has been a post-COVID bottleneck in assessments. She added that RCEB funds but does not provide services and that they need vendors to provide the services. Because of this, programs with too few vendors have waitlists. Also, group homes are not located in all areas.
- Comm. Roh asked what the highest-need areas and types were. Ms. Sodipo replied that Oakland is a high-need area due to safety concerns, and that day programs, behavioral services, and autism programs with individualized support were in high demand.
- Comm. Foote noted that she has a sibling in a regional center, and asked if there were any upcoming changes to policies. Ms. Sodipo replied that the state is moving toward transparency and consistency across regions, with a state template available next year. She added that RCEB is trying to raise rates for vendors.
- Comm. Aure asked if RCEB was in contact with The Kelsey. Ms. Sodipo replied that they were.
- Comm. Stevens thanked Ms. Sodipo for her presentation, noted that a planned rise in rates paid to vendors scheduled for Jan. put off for six months, and asked if it would be put off again. Ms. Sodipo replied that it would not, but that it would be on a rolling timeline, possibly in March.
- Chair Baroudi asked if there were best practices for assessments.
 Ms. Sodipo replied that RCEB has an intake and assessment team including physicians, psychologists, occupational therapists, and others, and that IQ testing is used. Chair Baroudi wondered how to develop a public space that is disability-friendly.

- Member of the public Sheela Gunn mentioned that they have a friend in his 50s, that they and their friend may have autism, but have no records from schools to support that. They asked if there was assessment for those diagnosed later in life. Ms. Sodipo replied that that could be done.
- Anh Nguyen asked about the housing needs price range. Ms. Sodipo replied that funding was not available to subsidize housing but that supports to live independently were available. She added that living on SSI is difficult.
- Mr. Nguyen asked how a vendor would sign up. Ms. Sodipo replied that that is done through RCEB's community services dept, and that the process begins with a letter of intent including category of service provided and so forth.

State Council on Developmental Disabilities

- Sheraden Nicholau gave her presentation.
- Comm. Wilson asked if SCDD had resources for best practices in intellectual disability, such as The Kelsey. Ms. Nicholau replied that SCDD has done training on best practices, and has funded The Kelsey.
- Comm. Wilson asked if there were any resources she could access.
 Ms. Nicholau replied that there were some on SCDD's website.
- Chair Baroudi asked about SCDD's regional advisory committee meeting in December. Ms. Nicholau replied that it would be held on December 4 from 5:30 to 8, at a location in Contra Costa County using a hybrid format, and added that County DD councils participate.
- Member of the public James Carter noted that CalAIM stands for advancing and innovating MediCal.
- Mr. Nguyen asked if SCDD had any representatives from state housing agencies. Ms. Nicholau replied that they did not, because most housing decisions are made at the municipal and county levels.
- Mr. Nguyen asked if SCDD had a partnership with county housing authorities. Ms. Nicholau replied that SCDD provides training and technical assistance to these agencies.
- Mx. Gunn pointed out cross-disability issues facing people with multiple disabilities, and that most application processes are inaccessible. Ms. Nicholau agreed that there is a widespread lack of access, and that most people with intellectual/developmental

disabilities also have other needs. She suggested fair housing training with the Office of Civil Rights.

General Plan Phase 2

- Joanna Winter gave her presentation. An updated version of her presentation is attached as an appendix.
- Chair Baroudi asked if capital projects like streetscapes fell under the LUTE, infrastructure, or OSCAR elements of the plan. Ms. Winter replied that the policies would be in all elements and would be crossreferenced.
- Chair Baroudi noted that the housing element had already been passed, and asked how much room that left for future planning. Ms.
 Winter replied that the policies in housing element are meant to work with the LUTE element in the general plan, and added that there are conflicts between housing and industrial land.
- Comm. Stevens asked if the mayoral race would affect the plan. Ms, Winter replied that it would not, because the city already has a contract with a consultant.
- Comm. Cloyd pointed out that walkability or rollability is important, as is street condition.
- Comm. Wilson mentioned that funding exists for new projects but not for maintenance, added that this is an access issue, and called for dedicated funding for maintenance.
- Chair Baroudi noted that pedestrians competing with cars is not ideal, and can be confusing for those with low vision He called for a dedicated pedestrian and bicycle network.
- Comm. Roh emphasized the importance of reliability and timeliness of services, especially paratransit.
- Comm. Cloyd called for education on available accessible services, and noted that remote work has increased employment for people with disabilities.
- Chair Baroudi noted that the city's maintenance and paving plan is subject to bond sales that aren't happening, and that other cities use their general fund for paving.
- Comm. Cloyd noted that many people with disabilities are sensitive to temperature range, and thus that heat is needed.
- Chair Baroudi called for shade benches, shelters, and so forth.
- Comm. Roh addressed the issue of remote jobs by pointing out that there can be no dead zones for broadband.

- Vice Chair Bartu called for clean air spaces.
- Comm. Cloyd noted that parks can be more accessible than gyms, and suggested placing fitness equipment in these spaces.
- Comm. Roh noted that children with disabilities need safe spaces that are fenced in.
- Comm. Wilson pointed out that green spaces can lead to gentrification, and called for community-based parks.
- Comm. Stevens mentioned maintenance and access issues, specifically the Lake Merritt colonnade, which has people driving on it
- Comm. Roh pointed out the connection between housing affordability and proximity to noise pollution, since some people with disabilities have noise sensitivity.
- Comm. Wilson mentioned that noise abatement on Interstate 580, which runs through relatively affluent neighborhoods, increases noise on Interstate 880, which runs through poorer ones.
- Mx. Gunn pointed out that they can't hear traffic when loud music is playing, called for buses to go directly to parks. They also mentioned that most signs are flat with no Braille, and called for Braille at bus stops as well as large print signs. They noted that they can't point at QR codes and that many BART stations have noisy plazas, and called for ramps rather than stairs.

Staff Updates and Announcements

 Mark Romoser announced a transit safety survey from AC Transit (see appendix).

Future Agenda Items

 Anh Nguyen noted that the December and January meetings would be devoted to MCPD's strategic planning process, facilitated by Jasmine Pomar.

Chair Baroudi made a motion to adjourn. Vice Chair Bartu seconded. The meeting was adjourned at 7:29.

Public Comment from Ruth Meza

The City of Oakland, Department of Transportation, would like to provide news about the **Undercrossing Improvements Project.**

Streets that pass under freeways are called undercrossings. In many places in Oakland, undercrossings are dark, loud, and feel unsafe. The goal of this project is to improve undercrossings for people walking, biking, and rolling. Four locations were chosen because there will be new improvements along the same streets.

- MLK Jr Way at I-880
- 7th St at I-980







Which Phase 2 General Plan topics are you most interested in?

- Transportation: Build a transportation system where everyone has access to safe and reliable options
 to get them where they need to go
- Neighborhood Land Use: Create more livable and walkable neighborhoods where folks have access to the things they want and need, like grocery stores, arts & entertainment, retail, libraries, and parks
- Employment: Support a strong economic base in the city, including future industries and small businesses
- Parks and Recreation: Develop parks and recreational spaces, focusing on the most underserved neighborhoods, so that everyone can access and enjoy natural spaces
- Noise: Protect neighborhoods adjacent to freeways, airports, and industrial activities from excessive noise
- Infrastructure: Improve our city's infrastructure, from roads, bridges, and sidewalks to facilities such as public restrooms and fire stations

Land Use and Transportation Element (LUTE)

Land Use: How Oakland will grow and change, and what will be preserved and maintained

- Population, housing, and economic development/jobs
- Kinds, locations, and intensities of land uses
- Intentional focus on neighborhood needs and social equity
- Arts, history, and culture

Transportation: How destinations in Oakland and beyond will be linked and connected

- Movement of people and goods
- All types of transportation systems
- Transportation system safety, comfort, convenience, and accessibility
- Reducing greenhouse gases










Infrastructure and Public Facilities Element

Infrastructure: plan for well-maintained, resilient, and high-quality critical systems that serve the city and its people

- Water + Sewage
- Storm drainage and flood control
- Solid waste & recycling
- Gas and electricity
- Communications (including Internet)
- Roadway improvements

Public Facilities: Support an equitably distributed, responsive, well-maintained network of public facilities that support Oaklanders' health and well-being.

- Libraries
- Educational facilities
- Recreation and community centers
- Fire and police stations

Open Space, Conservation, and Recreation (OSCAR) Element

Open Space and Conservation: Maintain, preserve, & strengthen Oakland's network of open spaces and conserve important natural resources Kinds, locations, and intensities of land uses

Land Use - Big Picture Questions

- Which types of neighborhood land uses should be prioritized (e.g., cultural and community centers, manufacturing spaces, etc.?)
- 2. How can land use planning and policies create more equitable distribution of opportunity in our neighborhoods?
- 3. How can the plan build upon existing work and community planning efforts and priorities?
- 4. What are land uses that people with disabilities are most concerned about?
- 5. What planning documents or reports that address land use and disability should we be aware of?

Transportation – Big Picture Questions

- 1. In a recent City survey of people with disabilities, transportation and physical barriers ranked as the highest barriers with financial next.
 - 1. The LUTE will focus on improvements to streets, transit and transportation networks. How does the City improve streets other than street condition, connectivity, lighting and safety? What are the most significant transit and transportation barriers for people with disabilities?
 - 2. What **future jobs** should the City focus on? What are other **economic factors** the General Plan should be considering with regards to people with disabilities (separate from housing)?

Infrastructure & Public Facilities – Big Picture Questions

- 1. How can the city meet existing and future infrastructure and service needs?
- 2. What **specific infrastructure improvements** are needed to support the experience of the full range of people with disabilities?
- 3. How should these improvements be prioritized and funded?
- 4. How should the city address climate resilience in infrastructure and facilities planning?

OSCAR - Big Picture Questions

- 1. Because Oakland is mostly built out (not much vacant land left), how should the city provide more parkland in the future?
- 2. How can the city fund and more efficiently address parks maintenance?
- 3. How can we create **more connections** and build a more robust **network of green spaces**, parks, the shoreline, and other open space amenities throughout the city?
- 4. What kind of parks **improvements** and **maintenance priorities** are most critical for people with disabilities?

Noise - Big Picture Questions

- 1. How can the city **protect neighborhoods and sensitive uses** from major noise sources in operation (e.g., freeways, airports, and industrial uses)?
- 2. What specific noise **standards and criteria** should be developed or changed? How should these be monitored and enforced?
- 3. What are ways to support music and other sound-friendly policies?
- 4. How does noise particularly impact people with disabilities?
