Mark Romoser begins the meeting with a reminder of rules for in-person meetings:

- No food or open drink allowed in Hearing Room 1 to maintain a clean and professional environment.

Chair Baroudi called the meeting to order at 5:39.

Open Forum:

- William Santley brought up elevator issues in his building downtown, and noted that his Section 8 inspection was impacted by the elevator permit having expired. Sheela Gunn added that the construction nearby was hazardous, and that Mr. Santley could be affected by rent abatement. They also noted that Mr. Santley has not received an accommodation under Section 504.
- Christine DiBella noted that the construction along 14th Street has affected her ability to use the 14 bus. About a month ago, she was stranded downtown, unable to find an accessible bus stop. She also pointed out that the design of the new bus stops is inaccessible, and that the new curbs make it impossible for someone to be dropped off along 14th, including by paratransit. She has asked to meet with the architects and planners, to no avail.

Agenda Modification

 Co-Vice Chair Bartu moved to add a 10-minute recess between items 7 and 8. Comm. Wilson seconded. Motion approved 8-0.

Approval Of Minutes

• Comm. Roh moved to approve the March minutes. Comm. Foote seconded. Motion approved 8-0.

Commissioner's Announcements

• Chair Baroudi noted that MCPD will be presenting its annual report to the City Council's Life Enrichment Committee at its May 13 meeting, and urged commissioners to attend.

TheCIL Overview

- Ms. Martin and Mx. Gunn made their presentation.
- Comm. Aure asked if there was an independent living center in San Francisco. Mx. Gunn replied that there is, Independent Living Resource Center of San Francisco. Ms. Martin added that all counties in California are served by an ILC, though it might be located elsewhere.
- Chair Baroudi asked if TheCIL served all of Alameda County. Ms. Martin replied that it served northern Alameda County, that is, Berkeley, Oakland, Alameda, Emeryville, Albany, and Piedmont, and that the rest of the county is served by Community Resources for Independent Living (CRIL) in Hayward, with which TheCIL works closely.
- Chair Baroudi asked if TheCIL had a policy platform. Ms. Martin replied that TheCIL's systems change advocate, Michai Freeman, was finalizing such a platform, and that it could be shared with the commissioners. Major issues are long-term supports and services (particularly with Medicaid under attack), affordable and accessible housing, transit justice, and disability justice as it relates to reproductive rights.
- Comm. Wilson asked if there was a way to get services across catchment areas. Mx. Gunn replied that the California Foundation of Independent Living Centers (CFILC) has a way to find your local ILC. They added that TheCIL works closely with CRIL, which serves the rest of Alameda County. Ms. Martin added that while they don't work as closely with other ILCs as they do with CRIL, they could easily provide referrals as needed.
- Comm. Foote asked about age and income requirements, and duration of services. Mx. Gunn noted that TheCIL's youth program serves people as young as 14, and up to any age. They added that TheCIL is also part of the Aging and Disability Resource Connection (ADRC), and that they don't ask for proof of disability except where needed. Ms. Martin added that all services are free of

charge, and that some consumers have been connected to TheCIL since its beginning.

Pedestrian Right of Way Program

- Sarah Fine gave her presentation.
- Comm. St. Julian asked how long it would take to get these projects underway. Ms. Fine replied that she had no knowledge of that, and that the topic had not been agendized.
- Chair Baroudi asked how the projects would be funded. He mentioned that Measure U was inactive for some reason. Ms. Fine replied that she had no presentation on funding, and noted that currently, funding for these projects comes from Measure KK, with Measure U funding to come in the future.
- Comm. St. Julian asked whether the program extended to streets as well as sidewalks. Ms. Fine replied that Measures KK and U were infrastructure bonds, which can include both sidewalks and streets.
- Chair Baroudi asked if there was interest in having an in-house crew rather than contracting the projects out. Ms. Fine replied that the city does have such crews doing concrete work, but that some positions have been difficult to fill. Chair Baroudi then asked if a streamlined hiring process would help. Ms. Fine replied that the workforce necessary would be too large for the city to handle.
- Comm. Roh asked about expanding the sidewalk assistance program to landlords who provide affordable housing such as Section 8. Ms. Fine replied that the programs are corridor-based, so all property owners receive a notice to repair, and the program allows property owners to participate without financial impact. Comm. Roh again asked about landlords who might not qualify and a potential spillover effect. Ms. Fine replied that there is no provision that allows the program to work with property and asked if there was a concern that the cost would be passed on to low-income tenants. Comm. Roh then asked about the proposal to waive the local and small local business provisions, and if bids from outside the city would be significantly lower. Ms. Fine replied that they have granted one full waiver to a project, that DOT's analysis showed that partial waivers were not as effective as full ones, and that not every local business qualified under the provisions. Comm Roh asked if there were other parts of the bidding process that could shave time off the process. Ms. Fine replied that there were many internal factors contributing to the delays.
- Chair Baroudi asked about the requirements for the local provisions. Ms. Fine replied that the contractor does not have to be locally based, but that 50 percent of the value of the contract must be local, and 25 percent must be small local. Chair Baroudi asked about the timeline for the settlement. Ms. Fine replied that she didn't know.

- Mx. Gunn asked whether money from the Measure A sales tax could be used for the project. Ms. Fine replied that past curb ramp and sidewalk repair had been funded by Measures BB and B, which are dedicated for transportation projects. She added that it has been decades since general fund money has been used for such projects.
- Chair Baroudi stated his willingness to work with DOT and advocate for funding.

Staff Announcements

 Mr. Romoser announced that the Alameda County Transportation Commission is holding two open houses in Oakland and two in Alameda regarding the upcoming Oakland Alameda Access Project, that a lead abatement session would be held in Fruitvale on May 8, that the General Plan Community Advisory Subcommittee is looking for applicants by May 15, and that the 5-year strategic plan survey from Oakland's Aging and Adult Service and the Mayor's Commission on Aging is available.

Meeting adjourned at 7:16.














Exhibit A Washington St under I-880: Painted pedestrian space











