- 2. Open Forum
 - Ms. Gunn-Cushman spoke on the COVID vaccine situation in

Alameda County.

- Commissioner Nakamura also spoke about the COVID vaccine.
- 3. Agenda Modification
 - None
- 4. Approval of January 2021 Minutes
 - A motion to approve the minutes was made (Commissioner Gregory), seconded (Commissioner Sperling), and passed with all voting in favor.
- 5 Nominations and voting for new Chair/Vice-Chair of MCPD
 - Anh facilitated the election.
 - For Chair, Commissioner Smith was nominated by Commissioner Tevelson. The nomination was seconded by Commissioner Lynn.

Commissioner Smith accepted the nomination.

Second Call: There were no other nominations. Third Call: There were no other nominations.

All voted in favor, and Commissioner Smith was elected as the new MCPD chair.

• For Vice-Chair, Commissioners Lynn and Gregory were nominated as co-vice chairpersons by Commissioner Nakamura. The nomination was seconded by Commissioner Sperling.

Commissioner Lynn and Gregory accepted the nomination.

Second Call: There were no other nominations. Third Call: There were no other nominations.

All voted in favor, and Commissioners Lynn and Gregory were elected as the new MCPD vice-chairs.

- 6. Commissioner's Announcements
 - Commissioner Gregory announced that former MCPD Commissioner Aaron Zisser has been appointed director of the Violence (Police) Commission.
 - Commissioner Smith announced that the Department of

Violence Prevention will be conducting three townhall meetings, in West Oakland, Central Oakland and East Oakland.

- 7. Shared Mobility Update
 - Kerby Olsen, new Mobility Supervisor for the Department of Transportation, provided a recap of his October 2020 presentation to MCPD.
 - He provided details on design efforts for improved accessibility for the alternative vehicle stations and clarified the requirements for alternative vehicles, which has been forwarded to potential service providers.
 - Goals are to improve physical access to the adaptive bike share program and to provide e-bikes with solid accessible design features to the disability community.
 - DOT is applying for a grant that would fund an E-bike lending library.
 - Staff plans to expand user information regarding E-Bike, alternative vehicles, etc., and establish an accessible website with all information.
 - Commissioner Gregory request that accessible/adaptable share mobility vehicles be integrated with the rest of the fleet instead of a separate program.
 - Comments were taken from the public.
 - Sheela Gunn-Cushman share an upcoming Assembly Bill 371 which will require e-scooter companies to have insurance and braille.
- 8. Commissioner Updates to the Strategic Planning Goals, Cont.
 - Yvonna Cazares from the Mayor's Office assisted the MCPD with finalizing their strategic goals for the 2021 year.
 - There are 4 potential goals which were selected: Transportation, Policing/Safety, Accessibility of City Programs and Affordable/Accessible Housing. Two goals were chosen to be emphasized for the 2021 calendar year. All subjects will be monitored during the year.
 - Re: Policing/Safety, it was proposed that the MCPD provide a liaison to the Department of Violence Prevention regular meetings starting with quarter 2.
 - Commissioner Tevelson will be attending a public safety task force meeting on February 24, 2021.
 - MCPD should investigate the accessibility of shelters/emergency housing, training and responses during

emergencies.

- A motion to extend the meeting to 7:40 p.m. was made (Commissioner Smith) and seconded (Commissioner Tevelson) and passed with all voting in favor.
- Comments were taken from the public.








Community Partner Feedback

Primary feedback received focused on the following topics:

- Safety
- Seating
- Balance
- Wider foot platform
- Deployment
- Parking
- Accessibility
- Spatial awareness
- Commuter focus



Community Partner Feedback To-Date

Safety - Those with disabilities may not feel safe operating devices in roadways

Back Support & Balance - Two-wheeled standing scooters may exclude individuals who struggle with balancing or who require support

Deployment - While not device-related, deploying near curb cuts (amongst others) was specifically mentioned as a concern by multiple communities

Parking - Improperly parked scooters can be difficult for mobility-impaired or visually-impaired individuals to navigate on sidewalks

Accessibility - Those who use equipment to manage their disability may have difficulty switching between two devices; concerns about elderly users who do not have smartphones were raised

Spatial Awareness - Accessory tools are needed to assist / supplement the abilities of those operating the device

Commuter Focus - Should be usable during users' daily daily routines, vs. a system only created for certain days (i.e. Lyft's adaptive bike program)

Safety - Implement seatbelts when possible, and explore sidewalk options

Back Support & Balance - Explore seated scooters to address balance challenges

Deployment - Avoid deploying near curb cuts

Parking - Ensure users are parking scooters on bike racks, out of the ROW of pedestrians

Accessibility -

- Make transition between devices as easy as possible
- Ensure scooter requests can be submitted via phone call to support team rather than through the app
- Explore in-person reservation systems when possible

Spatial Awareness - Implement proximity alarms, or visible signals such as lighting

Commuter Focus - Hours of operation to be Monday-Friday, throughout the day




Additional User Education

Spin understands that in parallel to the Adaptive Scooter Pilot Program, it is our responsibility to continue educating users utilizing our 2-wheel scooters on how to properly ride and park

- In-app
 - Onboarding education for new users
 - Continuous educational pop-ups
- On-device
 - Stickers added to every scooter
- In-person outreach
 - Valet service
 - Education and community events
- Digital outreach
 - Emails to Spin riders
 - Inclusion in partner newsletters and virtual engagements





Follow Rules of the Road

Ride in bike lanes, going with the flow of traffic. Sidewalk riding is not permitted in San Francisco, and may lead to fines and account suspension.

Expanding Spin's Target Audience

Input from our partners pertaining to a **reduced need for adaptive scooter devices during the pandemic** has caused **Spin to reimagine our target audience and device design.**

The seated 3-wheeled device expands Spin's target audience to anyone who:

- Has trouble with standing either for a partial or entire scooter trip
- Need balance assistance
- Require wider foot platforms for sitting or standing
- Is deaf or hard of hearing

LINK Access provides accessible vehicles to people with disabilities that preclude them from riding a stand-up LINK Scooter.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

- Vehicles can be rented by the hour or by the day, maximum three days.
- Rentals are free of charge during pilot period. Participants complete survey to help tailor program.
- Users must have a LINK account, sign a rental agreement, and complete a short questionnaire upon return.









Wheelchair Assist Pilot

- Partnership with the Center for Independent Living and Rio Mobility
- Lending Library of two (2) Firefly wheelchair assist vehicles.
 - 350 watts, 5 speed modes up to 12 miles per hour
- Based out of the Center for Independent Living facility in Berkeley across from the Ashby BART station
- Hardware installation requirement
- Launching by the end of March



Long-term Contracts with Selective Partners

- Since 2017, Veo has grown through exclusive contracts that average more than 3 years
- Focus on responsible company growth (no VC funding), and careful market selection to ensure sustainable programs
- Veo has never launched a market without a contract or permit
- Millions of scooter and bike trips across 40+ markets

Markets where Veo has been awarded permits to operate shared micromobility systems

Currently operating Astro stand -up scooter but looking to integrate seated Cosmo option to meet a wider range of user needs as market develops
