

Dear North Oakland neighbors,



I just returned from Sacramento where I joined with other Bay Area Councilmembers to lobby for policies and funding that will increase our ability to approve, get financing for and construct more moderate and lower income housing to meet the growing need in Oakland and nearby cities. Housing affordability continues to be a top priority of mine. Additionally, please remember that this Saturday is Earth Day. I hope you will either join me at the March for Science in San Francisco (see below for details), or volunteer in your neighborhood at an Earth Day morning event (link to options below).

Community Choice Energy

I am happy to share with you the news that the City of Oakland has joined the newly established East Bay Community Energy (EBCE) joint powers authority (JPA). Monday, January 30th, marked the first meeting of the newly formed East Bay Community Energy Authority Board of Directors—a joint powers authority to bring clean local electricity to our East Bay residents and businesses. I am honored to have been elected a Vice-Chair of this board.

Over the last 18 months, a steering committee composed of city and county officials and labor, environmental justice, and other community representatives deliberated and ultimately recommended to the County the creation of a new JPA to procure and provide electricity for ratepayers throughout Alameda County and much of East Bay.

The <u>East Bay Community Energy</u> program is being set up to meet the electricity needs of East Bay residents and businesses while prioritizing clean sources of energy and local job-creation. As Oakland's appointed voting member of the Board, I am committed to creating affordable and clean energy choice for East Bay ratepayers.

Dan's Budget Priorities and City Budget Process

The City of Oakland's next two-year (July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2019) budget process continues to be a major focus for me now and through the end of June. As provided by the "Budget Process, Fiscal Planning, Transparency, and Public Participation" policy developed by the Council in 2013-2014, I have submitted my initial budget priorities, which include additional spending for

fire prevention, violence reduction through post-incarceration reentry services, restoring the City's tree maintenance division, protecting and enhancing Public Library hours, aid to homeless residents, and more. I am also supporting increased revenues, including collecting the full Transient Occupancy Tax from Short-term Residential Rentals (such as Air BnB) for the City's Affordable Housing Trust Fund, and requesting voter approval in 2018 to change our Real Estate Transfer Tax's flat rate to a progressive rate that increases for very high value properties.

The next four budget process deadlines are:

- May 1 Release of Mayor & City Administrator's Proposed Budget;
- May Community Budget Forums—including joint District 1 and District 3 Community Budget Forum with Councilmember Kalb, Councilmember Gibson McElhaney and Mayor Libby Schaaf. That meeting is scheduled for Saturday, May 13th. Location TBD. Please check our <u>Event Page</u> in a week for more details.
- June 1 Release of Oakland's Budget Advisory Commission Report;
- June 17 Release of the Council President's Proposed Budget.

We will have difficult choices facing us for the upcoming budget. Ride for a Reason – April 29th

This fun cycling fundraising event to Sacramento has grown tremendously over the past several years. And that has benefitted our public schools in Oakland. This year, the funds raised will help the following schools: Claremont Middle, Edna Brewer Middle, Westlake Middle, Roosevelt Middle, Emerson Elementary, Oakland Tech, and Oakland International High School.



While the funds raised are extremely helpful to these schools, community fundraising alone can't do the deep work needed to fully support all schools, especially in big, urban districts. Our state's spending per pupil remains below the national average. That's why Ride for a Reason rides to Sacramento—to bring policy makers' attention to the ongoing problem of underfunded public schools.

State Legislation

We know that Oakland is not an Island and that state laws can have a real impact on Oakland residents. Here is a sampling of the 2017 bills I have asked the City Council to formally support by resolution. The City Council has endorsed all of these bills:

- SB 2 (Atkins) Building Homes document fee for Affordable Housing.
- SB 31 (Lara) Prohibits the state or any local government agency from creating or helping to create any religion-based registry.

- SB 560 (Allen) Requires financial climate risks to be taken into account in management of CalPERS and CalSTRS investments.
- SB 687 (Skinner) Requires Attorney General oversight and approval before selling or closing a hospital emergency room.
- AB 43 (Thurmond) Imposes tax on for-profit prison contractors to fund school-based crime prevention.
- AB 71 (Chiu, Bonta, Kalra) Eliminates mortgage interest deduction for vacation homes to fund Affordable Housing.
- AB 1356 (Eggman, Bonta, Weber) Tax on millionaires to fund Higher Education
- AB 1505 (Bloom, Chiu, Gloria) Allows for inclusionary rental housing to increase affordable housing units.

In addition, resolutions I introduced to support four additional bills will be considered by the City Council in the next couple weeks:

- AB 291 (Chiu, Bonta) Tenant protections
- SB 366 (Leyva) Solar program for low-income customers.
- AB 45 (Thurmond) School employee housing assistance.
- AB 523 (Reyes) Equity in clean energy investments.

StopWaste Wins Statewide Award

On January 19th, the California Environmental Protection Agency (CalEPA) awarded StopWaste with one of its 2016 Governor's Environmental and Economic Leadership (GEELA) Awards for its multi-step school program. As President of Alameda County's StopWaste authority, I was pleased to accept this award.



StopWaste's five-step action model has been used in Alameda County schools for more than a decade, diverting thousands of tons from landfills, and empowering children to be critical thinkers, problem solvers, and environmental champions in their communities.

As I stated in our announcement, "we are honored to be recognized by the Governor as an environmental leader in California, I want to thank staff for years of dedicated work to make this program a successful asset to schools in Alameda County, and a model for schools across the state."

The program would also not be possible without many partners, including Waste Management of Alameda County, BLT Enterprises of Fremont, and the Alameda County Office of Education. According to CalEPA, GEELA winners successfully integrate resource conservation, environmental protection, and economic progress. Only 12 programs throughout the state are awarded each year. Congrats to Alameda County StopWaste!

<u>Addressing Issues of Homelessness – Actions Report and</u> Hearing

We are facing a multi-faceted challenge with growing homelessness in Oakland and throughout much of the East Bay.
