**Re:** California Highway Patrol Operation “*Oakland Safe Streets*”

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The City of Oakland has experienced serious public safety challenges. There have been significant increases in violent crime. Highway shootings, homicides, vehicle thefts, property crimes, robberies, organized retail thefts and “Sideshow” have all surged in Oakland. The increase in crime has negatively impacted the quality of life for Oakland residents and has forced businesses to close.

On July 31, 2023, Oakland Mayor Sheng Thao requested additional State resources from Governor Newsom for assistance addressing increasing crime in Oakland. Governor Newsom subsequently directed the California Highway Patrol (CHP) staff to partner with the Oakland Police Department (OPD) with the shared goal of reducing crime in Oakland. The CHP operation in Oakland was dubbed “*Oakland Safe Streets*” and commenced on August 4, 2023. The operational period and its duration are determined by the CHP.

The CHP was directed by Governor Gavin Newsom to assist the OPD beyond the current mission of the CHP in Oakland that focuses on Oakland highways. CHP has been tasked with conducting proactive and high-visibility enforcement within the City of Oakland in an effort to improve public safety in Oakland. CHP has been deployed within designated high-impact areas identified by crime data and in partnership with the OPD.

OPD provided the relevant policies and procedures to CHP as outlined in OPD policy (General Order L-3, Assistance to Outside Jurisdiction and Mutual Aid). The CHP operates under their established policies, procedures and chain of command structure. CHP and OPD Command communicate and coordinate regularly to assess operations.

**CHP MISSION/OBJECTIVES/GOALS**

The CHP will assist OPD with a primary focus in three identified Zones (Zone 1, Zone 3, and Zone 6). Each zone has been identified through a weekly analysis of crime data and intelligence. CHP will likely have the most significant impact on crime by focusing on the identified Zones. CHP objectives are accomplished by:

1. Conducting high visibility and enforcement patrols with the intent of proactively enforcing the law and maintaining community safety.
2. Providing investigative support to ongoing criminal investigations that will deter violence and crime.
3. Continually assessing crime data and the need to adjust Zone locations.

### **CHP Objective 1 – Patrol**

CHP patrol operations will appropriately fall within CHP policy and procedures. Officers will enforce laws in a constitutional, fair, and professional manner. Personnel assigned to this operation are expected to work collaboratively with members of the OPD with the goal of enhancing public safety for residents and visitors.

Briefings: Briefings are held at the CHP Oakland Office: 3601 Telegraph Avenue, Oakland.

Staffing: Deployments consist of a minimum of one (1) uniformed sergeant and six (6) uniformed officers. Additional CHP units will aid the operation in addition to their primary CHP roles and responsibilities. Daily numbers and resources will fluctuate. For officer safety and operational integrity, the number of officers deployed *shall not be publicized and/or compromised*.

Hours: Deployment hours occur on Tuesdays and Fridays from **1200 to 2200 hours**.

Enforcement:

1. Deployment focuses on on-view (high-visibility) patrol and enforcement of legal statutes.
2. Officers use sound professional judgment when making enforcement contacts and appropriate discretion in all subsequent enforcement action taken.
3. All prisoners are transported in a CHP vehicle, in accordance with CHP policy, or with an OPD prisoner transport van, when available and requested. Prior to any prisoner transport, CHP may coordinate with the OPD through the Crime Gun Intelligence Center (CGIC), to determine if any OPD investigators (CID, SRS West, SRS East, Ceasefire, etc.) have an interest in their prisoner for any active or ongoing investigations.

OPD Liaison: OPD's Support Operation Division (SOD), Acting Captain E. Perez-Angeles has been designated as the Liaison between OPD and CHP for this ongoing operation.

Statistical Collection: CHP will provide their statistical data updates on a weekly basis to OPD Acting Captain E. Perez-Angeles for internal tracking. According to CHP leadership, any

specific information with regards to CHP statistical data can be requested through CHP public records request process.

The following is a summation of this week’s operational efforts to include the total activity from the beginning of the operation (to date):

**CHP Executive Summary**

*The Operation Oakland Safe Streets performed two deployments during the week of February 26, 2024, to March 3, 2024. Deployments consisted of a departmental presence comprised of seven personnel working collaboratively with personnel from the Oakland Police Department (OPD) and other stakeholders. The deployments concentrated on proactive enforcement to reduce criminal activity, specifically vehicle theft, highway violence, and organized crime. The following is a summation of this week’s operational efforts to include the total activity from the beginning of the operation (to date):*

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OPD made a specific request from CHP for the following statistical data:

- **All Arrests** – Offenses and Zones
- **All Use of Force** - Incidents – Offenses and Zones
- **All Pursuits** – Offenses and Zones
- **All Recoveries** – Offenses and Zones
- **All Citations** – Primary Factors and Zones
- **All Vehicle Impounds** – Primary factors and Zones
- **All Complaints taken** – Types – Zones
- **All Narcotics and Drugs seized** – Types -Zones

CHP advised OPD that a Public Records Request would be required to supply this data. CHP also advised they do not possess a robust cadre of data analysts that could mine this specific data from their records quickly.

From February 5-9, 2024, Governor Newsom temporarily deployed additional CHP officers for “Operation Deep Roots” in Oakland. The operation was focused on auto theft, cargo theft, organized retail theft, violent crime, and high visibility traffic enforcement. This operation was also under the command and coordination of the CHP. CHP provided public statistical data from this operation. The results were 71 arrests, 145 stolen vehicle recoveries and 4 guns linked to crimes were seized. This operation included 120 CHP officers operating in the City of Oakland. OPD provided CHP with communications support. An OPD liaison was assigned to coordinate with CHP during each of their scheduled operations.

*In response to the continued influx of crime within the city of Oakland to include gun violence, robberies, retail/commercial theft, assaults, burglaries, carjacking’s, stolen vehicles, and Driving While Under the Influence (DUI) related incidents, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) will be conducting city wide operations over five days. CHP’s operational areas and operations are as follows:*

- 1. ACRATT – Alameda County Regional Auto Theft Task Force - Auto Theft Enforcement Operations (Mon-Thurs 0700-1700 BFO’s 1 & 2)*
- 2. Northern FEAR Team – BFO 2 - Area 4 Safe Streets Operation (Wed-Fri 1000-2200)*
- 3. Warrant Service Team (DUI) - (Friday- 0700-1700 Citywide)*
- 4. Organized Retail Crime Task Force - Theft Operation (Friday, 0900-1900 BFO 1, Area 3)*
- 5. Commercial Enforcement Operations (Wed, 0700 -1300 Port of Oakland, BFO 1, Area 1) (Friday, BFO 2, Area 5, 0700-1300 Coliseum)*

*The Oakland Police Department’s Special Resource Section’s, CGIC (Crime Gun Intelligence Center), Motors, CID (Criminal Investigations Division), Air Unit- Argus, Electronic*

*Surveillance Unit (ESU), and the Alameda County Regional Auto Task Force (ACRATT) provided support for CHP's operations throughout the week.*

In addition to the above-mentioned CHP operations, OPD recently assisted CHP in two large scale operations:

- 1. On March 6<sup>th</sup>, 2024, The Oakland Police Department specialized units to include Ceasefire conducted a joint operation with CHP regarding a freeway shooting investigation. The culmination of the investigation resulted in the arrest of four individuals linked to the shooting and several firearms recovered to include an assault rifle. The incident was documented under OPD report 24-011458.*



- 2. On March 12<sup>th</sup> the Oakland Police Department specialized units assisted the California Highway Patrol and the U.S Department of Agriculture, Officer of Inspector General serve multiple search warrants in BFO2 area four, regarding a group of individuals committing Woman, Infants, and Children (WIC) fraud. The result of the investigation yielded about \$22,000. worth of stolen retail merchandise and illegal firearms to include an assault rifle.*

All complaints received in Oakland related to OPD will be addressed per the Department's policy on internal investigations (General Order M-3). If it is determined that the complaint pertains to CHP or another law enforcement agency that is not OPD, OPD staff will contact that agency regarding the complaint to conduct their own investigation.

Any additional statistical data and/or specific information that has not been provided by CHP with regards to both the "Oakland Safe Street Operations" and the "Surge Operations" must be requested through a public records request through the CHP.
