We believe that participating in local government is one of the surest pathways to influence positive lasting change for youth in our community.


→ Leadership

May 2017

Oakland Children Smoking Prevention Ordinance; presented by, Alameda County Public Health Department ACTIONS: OYAC voted unanimously to support the ordinance.

To learn more about their identified priority areas, Commissioners met with the following organizations:



In response to their key priority areas, OYAC is developing the following projects that will carryover into the 2017-2018 Commission year:

The aim of this youth forum is to bring undocumented, refugee and immigrant youth together who are dealing with similar issues; providing a safe space to share their experiences, learn about their rights and get connected to the resources and support that is available to them in the Sanctuary City of Oakland.

- OYAC has surveyed nearly 100 youth to identify the agenda for this event
- ► This is a community-wide event. The support and presence of community leaders and elected officials is key

Youth-to-Youth Mini-Grants for Improving Relations between Law Enforcement, the Community and Youth in Oakland

HSD recently launched **Oakland ReCAST**, a new project funded by the Substance Abuse Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA), which focuses on resiliency and equity for communities that have been impacted by high levels of violence, trauma and civil unrest.

One of the goals of ReCAST includes supporting community work to address tensions in law enforcement-community relations and promote community healing. **#OYACgivesback** is one component of this goal and enables Youth Commissioners to help select creative and dynamic projects developed by their peers.

#OYACgivesback allows young people between the ages of 13-21 in partnership with at least one Adult Ally to apply for **up to \$7,500** to fund their project idea that seeks to improve relations between law enforcement, community and youth in Oakland.





Future

Many of the issue and program priorities, as well as major projects described herein will carryover into the 2017-2018 Commission year. The Oakland Youth Advisory Commission (OYAC) will also be holding a strategic planning session in the Fall to develop their 2017-2018 agenda. At that time, OYAC would like to meet with Council Members and Mayor Schaaf to present their ideas and receive feedback.

The Commission requests that City Council accept this annual report and encourages Council to continue referring policy issues relevant to youth to the Commission for consideration and recommendations.

The Youth Advisory Commission would like to thank the Mayor and City Council Members for the support each of you offer to Commissioners and young people in general. In the coming year, the Commission looks forward to an even deeper level of interaction between the youth and adult leaders of Oakland.
