ITEM II a.- ACTION

To Accept \$122,901.24 From ACWB And Enter Into A Agreement With Mandela Partners For An Amount Not To Exceed \$100,000

RECOMMENDATION

The Oakland Workforce Development Board accept \$122,901.24 from the Alameda County Workforce Development Board and enter into a Grant Award Agreement with Mandela Partners to provide workforce services to justice involved individuals for an amount not to exceed \$100,000 from July 1, 2023, through December 31, 2025.

Staff Member Lindsay shared the background the Alameda County Workforce Development Board was awarded \$639,758.12 for the East Bay Regional Planning Unit (EBRPU), Prison to Employment (P2E) Program. The EBRPU is comprised of four WDB Alameda County, Contra County, the City of Richmond, and the City of Oakland. The OWDB has been awarded \$122,901. 24 to support reentry services with the goal of providing high - quality and effective workforce services to the reentry population.

OWDB and Mandela Partners will enter into an agreement to engage 15 justice-involved individuals to receive training and support services, from July 1, 2023, through December 31, 2025. Mandela will provide 100% of clients individualized case management support including housing and legal supports, Pathways to employment with local food businesses, paid kitchen and culinary training including fundamentals of food safety, knife skills, customer service and self-advocacy, 8-week internship at partner food businesses, where they can gain long-term employment at business internship sites. P2E clients will be provided with resources to gain employment through Mandela's broader workforce network emphasis on priority zip codes individuals to be served by P2E are predominantly African American and Latinx males.

Public Comment: None

<u>Board Member Lee McMurtray</u> questioned if the OWDB has had this type of program with Mandela before? Have we engaged in this type of specific program in the past? He inquired if this type of program has helped employees.

Staff Member Lindsay shared that the OWDB has not worked with this specific program, but LAO Family is wrapping up a P2E program, Sofia Navarro OWDB Director added Mandela Partners is an existing WIOA partner and they have an existing program going similar to this one, this funding will add to what they already have in place.

Sofia Navarro OWDB Director stated that these opportunities will allow employees to gain skills for the next employment opportunity that they get. Having some structured environments helps individuals to move forward in hospitality and food services which is a vibrant field restaurants need employees.

<u>Board Chair Ahmed Ali Bob</u> inquired if there are reporting requirements? If staff is the only recipient of the report or will the report come to the executive committee and then the full board?

Staff Member Lindsay noted there are reporting requirements and she could bring a follow up report to the executive committee.

Sofia Navarro OWDB Director added that any WIOA consolidated program will be reported to the full board in November.

<u>Board Chair Ahmed Ali Bob</u> requested a motion to approve the recommendation to enter into a grant agreement with Mandela partners.

<u>Board Member Lee McMurtray</u> moved <u>Board Member Kalpana Oberoi</u> seconded to approve the recommendation.

ITEM III a.- INFORMATIONAL

OWDB Policy for Local Board Determination Training

RECOMMENDATION:

The Oakland Workforce Executive Board recommend a policy to the Regular Board to allow America's Job Centers of California (AJCC) partners to utilize training providers not registered on the State of California's Eligible Training Provider List (ETPL).

Staff Member Wetzel presented a power point presentation highlighting questions from the previous regular board meeting. He followed up with the Local Board Determination Training Policy: what is the Employment Training Panel List (ETPL), OWDB ETPL List, CA ETPL Application Process, Provider Initial Eligibility Criteria, why a Local Board Determination Training Policy, what industries will be supported? Examples of other training needs, what is the process for implementation and OWDB Current Training Policy for ITA's. He provided how much is expected to be used of the ETPL 15%, which will be in line with the County of Alameda, the cap is \$6000.00 per client and \$50,000 per provider. The top providers: Academy of Truck Drivers, Basco Career College, Medical Assisting Program Training, Jewish Vocational Service. The top training classes: Class A Commercial Drivers License Program, Medical Assistant, Phlebotomy Technician, Truck Driver, Training Logistics, Health Care, IT Training.

Public Comment:

Richard de Jauregui OPIC stated that he is in strong support of the recommendation he shared there's somethings that should be expanded upon like currently being limited to one or more language or cultural providers is a problem, he gave an example of what that language barrier would look like for clients needing a refresher course in DMV services as an example. he also stated if approved OPIC would keep it limited and only use when it was needed.

Su Dung Lao Family Community Development, Inc. shared there is a lot of demand for class A and health care minimum wage is \$27.00 per hour the minimum training fee is \$6,000 – \$10,000

with more clients can be supported. Please support non ETPL recommendation, we will be able to serve more clients most clients are not able to complete program.

<u>Board Member Kalpana Oberoi</u> complimented *Staff Member Mike Wetzel* on an excellent detailed follow up report.

<u>Board Member Lee McMurtray</u> asked what are the steps that non ETPL providers to get on the list?

Staff Member Wetzel gave a list of items to be provided by the non ETPL.

Board Chair Ahmed Ali Bob informed everyone that the meeting is now adjourned at 9:59 a.m due to losing quorum.

Naree Chan Deputy Attorney stated that the Special meeting is officially adjourned, and the meeting can continue with discussion since there are no further actions to be taken.

<u>Board Chair Ahmed Ali Bob</u> inquired what is the good standing requirement, what does that entail in this context?

Staff Member Wetzel shared that 50% successfully completed the training program, 50% are employed within 6-months of graduating and update the state with their employment rate at 2nd quarter.

Board Chair Ahmed Ali Bob reopened Public Comment:

Raya Zion- how will you differentiate between a ETPL training program and a non- ETPL local training program when referring a participant?

Staff Member Wetzel stated it is based on case managers aspect of clients' needs best fit, location, cost, language rolling bases and time,

ITEM III b.- INFORMATIONAL Board Recruitment Update

Sofia Navarro OWDB Executive Director shared that she and the <u>Board Chair Ahmed Ali Bob</u> are working to have approved, four new board members as well as recruiting additional executive board members before the November regular full board meeting.

Sofia Navarro OWDB Executive Director gave an update on the board retreat expected to be held between April and June 2024, while working with California Workforce Association who will assist in facilitating the event, bringing forward and introducing Human Center Design, centering on how we deliver services. Staff is working on the next RFP, putting together a more documented plan for the next cycle of grant planning for the November regular meeting with dates, for providers to apply for grants next year. Our department is also working on the Economic Development Strategy for the City of Oakland. Further detail and the timeline to come in November.

<u>Board Chair Ahmed Ali Bob</u> inquired if there are dates for the Economic Development report? the timeline is to produce it in quarter two of next year, stated Sofia Navarro OWDB Director.

Richard de Jauregui Oakland Private Industry Council shared that the ETPL is very expensive, the cost is \$5,000 to start. There's a 12 - 18 month wait barrier a slow-moving ponderous wait, 24 months isn't out of the question with the Bureau of Private Post-Secondary (BPPS).

Re: Authorize Grant Agreement with Rising Sun Center for Opportunity

RECOMMENDATION

That the Oakland Workforce Development Board (OWDB) authorize a grant agreement with Rising Sun Center for Opportunity (Rising Sun) to support the training of 60 participants for construction careers through the Opportunity Build Program. The proposed agreement would cover the fiscal year July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024 in an amount not to exceed Forty-four Thousand Three Hundred and Seventy-five Dollars (\$44,375).

BACKGROUND

On January 13, 2023 the City of Oakland launched the Direct Community Grants Program Request for Proposal (RFP). The Direct Community Grants Program is designed to address funding barriers and continue the City's long history of supporting community-based organizations (CBOs) serving Oakland residents most impacted by racial disparities by providing resources to Oakland's underserved communities disproportionately affected by social, economic, and environmental challenges.

Through this grant program, the City recognizes the collective responsibility to advance racial equity by investing in community organizations proactively working to advance racial equity by:

- 1. Funding organizations that serve communities impacted by racial disparities;
- 2. Funding organizations that engage and inform members of these communities on how to access its programs and services; and
- 3. Funding organizations that demonstrate the removal of racial barriers so members of these communities can be empowered to access programs and services and better their lives

Grant applications were due March 1, 2023, with the grant award Resolution 89887 C.M.S. adopted on September 19, 2023. Through this process, City Council awarded Rising Sun an amount not to exceed \$44,375 for the period of July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024. Rising Sun specializes in preparing youth, women, people of color and individuals in reentry for high-road careers and green pathways that offer family-sustaining wages.

Funding to support this program were identified as part of the City's FY 2023-2025 biennial budget.

Program Details

Rising Sun will train 60 participants in construction careers through its Opportunity Build Program. Opportunity Build students commit to 10-12 weeks of learning and preparing for success in the construction trades. Following up to 325 hours of classroom instruction and handson training with retired union tradespeople.

Outputs

Enrollment Goal:

- 60 participants into Opportunity Build Program
 - o 20 participants must be Oakland residents;
 - o 60% of participants enrolled are women

Training Goal:

• 85% of participants graduate

Completion dates are set for December 2023 (first cohort) and May 2024 (second cohort).

Employment Goal:

- 70% of graduates secure employment or enroll into further education/training within 12 months of graduation;
- 60% of job placements are in union apprenticeships;
- Average hourly wage of \$20/hr.

Rising Sun will facilitate connections between graduates and unions, employers, and employment opportunities, supporting all graduates in obtaining employment.

Retention Goal:

50% of participants employed will retain employment for at least six months

RESOLUTION AWARDING GRANT AGREEMENTS TO THE 2023 DIRECT COMMUNITY GRANT RECIPIENTS FOR A TOTAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED SEVEN HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$750,000) FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024

WHEREAS, June 30, 2022, the City Council adopted the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23 midcycle biennial budget (Resolution No. 89283 C.M.S.), which included a City Council directive to implement the direct community grant procedural recommendation presented to City Council on April 19, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the City Council reviewed the City's revenues and expenditures as part of the biennial budget review process and, on June 26, 2023, adopted the FY 2023-25 Budget Policy (Resolution No. 89804 C.M.S.); and

WHEREAS, the budget amendments adopted by City Council on June 26, 2023, included funding to award grants to the 2023 Direct Community Grant recipients to provide community-based programs and services to Oakland residents; and

WHEREAS, appropriations in the amount of \$750,000 is available for the 2023 Direct Community Grant Program and allocated to the General-Purpose Fund (1010), City-wide Activities (90591), City Council Community Grants (1006041), Third Party Grant Contracts Earned (54912), and Financial Management program (IP59); and

WHEREAS, a Request for Proposals ("RFP") was developed by the City of Oakland staff based on the recommended program procedure prioritizing equitable impacts to Oakland's underserved communities; and

WHEREAS, the Finance Department received over 100 responses to the RFP, And all proposals were screened for responsiveness, evaluated, and placed on an eligibility list; and

WHEREAS, each City Councilmember was allotted \$93,750 in funding to award to an organization(s) selected from the established eligibility list; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to provide grant funding to the entities described herein for various community-related services and activities in the specified amounts for FY 2023-2024 as enumerated in Table 1 below; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to expedite the issuance of these grants to improve the lives of Oakland community members; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council hereby awards grant funding to the entities in Table 1 for the services and in the amounts as specified therein

A RESOLUTION OF THE OAKLAND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT BOARD APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING THE NEGOTIATION AND EXECUTION OF A GRANT AGREEMENT WITH RISING SUN FOR OPPORTUNITY, TO PROVIDE JOB TRAINING THROUGH THE OPPORTUNITY BUILD PROGRAM IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED FORTY-FOUR THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$44,375) FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024

WHEREAS, the Oakland Workforce Development Board ("OWDB" or "Board") is mandated to oversee the expenditure of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014 ("WIOA") funding in partnership with the Mayor as local chief elected official in a designated workforce development area such as the City of Oakland, and the Mayor has designated the City Administrator to act on the Mayor's behalf on all WIOA administrative matters; and

WHEREAS, the OWDB budget is made up of multiple funding streams that support workforce development efforts, including Federal, State, City of Oakland, and miscellaneous grants from private businesses and philanthropic support; and

WHEREAS, on September 19, 2023, the Oakland City Council adopted Resolution No. 89887 C.MS. authorizing a grant agreement with Rising Sun Opportunity in an amount not to exceed Forty-Four Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$44,375) to provide job training through the Opportunity Build Program.; and

WHEREAS, Rising Sun will train 60 participants in construction careers through its Opportunity Build Program. Opportunity Build students commit to 10-12 weeks of learning and preparing for success in the construction trades; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the Board approves and authorizes the negotiation and execution of a grant agreement with Rising Sun for Opportunity to provide job training for construction careers as part of the Opportunity Building Program in an amount not to exceed Forty-Four Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$44,375) for Fiscal Year 2023-2024.

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Board authorizes any FY 2023-24 contracted funds not fully spent by service providers by June 30, 2024, to be carried over into FY 2024-25; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That each contract for workforce development activities shall have specific performance benchmarks consistent with program regulations, and that the City shall terminate the contract of a service provider that materially fails to meet contract performance, with funds reallocated to existing service providers or an on-call pool; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City is hereby authorized to spend such funds in FY 2023-2024 and take other action with respect to the authorized contracts consistent with the Resolution and its basic purposes, subject to review and approval by the City Attorney's Office as counsel to the OWDB.
