## **GPU Park Site Visit Report**

2/4/2025

## I. Introduction

In July to August 2024, Strategic Planning staff conducted site visits to 22 parks across Oakland, to better understand the condition and distribution of park amenities distribution throughout the city. The findings, in tandem with existing data and research conducted using Google Earth, will be used to develop a park amenities matrix as part of the update of the General Plan's Open Space, Conservation, and Recreation (OSCAR) Element. These findings will also augment the Citywide Parks Condition Assessment project to be completed by Oakland Public Works, as well as help advance the City's goal of providing safe, clean, and high-quality outdoor spaces to all residents.

## II. Methodology

Staff worked with the departments of Public Works and Parks, Recreation and Youth Development to develop the process used to create the list of parks to visit and amenities to review. Staff also reviewed existing work by these departments, existing amenity maps, and work from the Oakland Parks and Recreation Foundation, and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee to inform our methodology.

To ensure that site visits were equitably distributed and prioritized historically marginalized communities, we developed a park prioritization strategy. To be selected for a site visit, parks had to meet two criteria, 1) parks must be in an environmental justice community (as defined by the Environmental Justice element) and 2) parks must be categorized as an active mini park, neighborhood park, or community park. These park classifications were chosen because of their popularity with the local community, rather than regional parks that may also draw visitors from outside of the city. It was important for the planning team to visit parks that were more likely to be frequented by local community members. From the parks that met this criteria, two parks from each neighborhood hub were then identified for site visit prioritization. This process resulted in the twenty-two parks listed in Figure A being prioritized for a site visit.

Site visits were conducted by a group of 2-3 Strategic Planning team members. Each member of the team collaborated to complete the <u>site visit checklist</u>. The checklist prompted the surveyors to identify park signage and times of operation, availability and quality of restrooms, general park amenities, public transportation accessibility and pedestrian safety, number of people present at parks, and activities observed.

## III. Findings and Next Steps

The findings for each park are listed in **this spreadsheet** for ease of viewing.

These site visits were the first step of a larger process to developing a park amenity matrix for all of Oakland parks as part of the OSCAR update. The park amenity matrix will be an accessible and easy to understand tool that will allow users to quickly identify which parks have amenities that meet their interests and needs.

The site visits were also complemented by a citywide park survey that asked respondents to share how they use their parks and what improvements they would like to see at their parks. We received nearly 600 survey responses that provided insights on conditions and uses at over 50 parks across Oakland. The <u>survey findings</u> show that Oakland parks are well-loved and have a consistent user base. Park users understand parks as spaces of community connection and belonging, as well as spaces that support outdoor recreation and community health. However, uneven access to green space across the city, aging infrastructure, lack of park maintenance, and concerns about safety are challenges experienced by many park users.

Both the observations from the park site visits and the findings from the park survey will be used to inform the development of the OSCAR, the broader General Plan Update and will support existing strategies to guide the maintenance and management of Oakland's parks.
