

- Federal Constitution & Case Law
- Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965
- California FAIR MAPS Act and Election Code Amendments
 - Exemptions for Charter Cities from Some Traditional Criteria

Federal Requirements

- 14th Amendment Equal Protection Clause
 - One Person-One Vote and Population Equality Requirements
 - Limitations on Race-Based Redistricting
- 15th Amendment
 - Prohibits Intentional Discrimination Based on Race
- Voting Rights Act of 1965
 - Section 2 and Minority Vote Dilution (Intentional and Non-Intentional)
 - Case Law: Thornburg v. Gingles

Population Equality

- Federal Case Law: Districts should be "substantially equal" in population
 - State and local districts, unlike congressional districts, do not need to be near "absolute equality"
- Population Basis: Total Population (Cal. Elec. Code § 21621(a)(1))
 - All Residents, Not Just Citizens, Voting-Age Citizens, or Voters
- Census Data Will Be Adjusted to Reallocate Prisoners (Cal. Elec. Code § 21621(a)(2))
 - Statewide Database Will Adjust 2020 Census Data to Exclude Incarcerated Persons and Reassign to Last Known Address

14th Amendment: Population Equality

- Federal Case Law: Total Plan Deviation Should Be <10%
 - Consultant and Redistricting Software Will Keep Running Calculations
 - Calculation:
 - (1) Calculate Ideal District Size: Divide Total Population by Number of Seats
 - (2) Calculate Deviation Range: Subtract Smallest District From Largest District
 - (3) Total Plan Deviation = Divide Deviation Range by Ideal District Size
- Redistricting Body Can Go Below 10%, but Must Have Strong Justifications for Exceeding 10%
 - Not Necessary to Set Target %


14th Amendment: Prohibitions on Racial Gerrymandering

- Race and Ethnicity Can Be Considered as Factors and Can Be Used to Comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act, <u>But</u>
- If Race is the Predominant Factor, or As a Result of Considering Race, the Districts Are Very Oddly Shaped, then the Lines may be Unconstitutional
 - Voting Rights Act Compliance Can Justify Districts
 - Considering Multiple Factors in Addition to Race (Race Doesn't Predominate) to Justify Districts


15th Amendment: Minority Vote Dilution and Intentional Discrimination Based on Race

- Typical Forms of Minority Vote Dilution in Redistricting:
 - Packing: Overconcentrating minority voters in one district to prevent them from influencing elections in other districts
 - Cracking: Dividing a minority population into several districts to prevent them from exercising electoral influence or control within one or more districts

Packing



Cracking



Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965

- Section 2 Prohibits Minority Vote Dilution in Redistricting
 - Covers racial minorities and "language minorities" (Latinos, Asian Americans, Native Americans)
 - Populations not covered by VRA might still be kept together through neighborhoods or communities of interest
 - Typically Occurs Through Packing or Cracking Minority Populations That Could Be in Effective Majority-Minority Districts
 - Section 2 Compliance is Essentially Defensive
 - No Affirmative Requirements, but Anticipating Lawsuits and Preventing Violations
 - Redistricting Case Law Not Impacted By Brnovich v. Democratic Nat'l Committee (2021)

Federal Voting Rights Act: Thornburg v. Gingles

- Three Preconditions ("Gingles Factors"):
 - (1) Minority Group is Sufficiently Large and Geographically Compact to Constitute a Majority in a Single-Member District
 - >50% of Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP)
 - (2) Minority Group is Politically Cohesive
 - (3) Non-Minority Voters Vote as a Bloc To Enable It . . . Usually to Defeat Minority-Preferred Candidates
 - Factors (2) + (3) often considered together as "Racially Polarized Voting" (RPV)
- Additional "Totality of Circumstances" Inquiries (including past discrimination, electoral history)

Federal Voting Rights Act: Compliance Issues

- Questions re Legal and Demographic/RPV Analyses
 - Analyses of U.S. Census American Community Survey (ACS) Data to Confirm Large Minority Concentrations
 - Assumptions About Racially Polarized Voting
- Creating Districts That Adjust >50% Upwards with Larger Immigrant Populations
 - E.g., 55-65% of CVAP
- Multiple Minority <u>Coalition</u> Districts Are Allowed in California, But Not Required --Unsettled Law
- "Influence Districts" (Large minority populations < 50%) Are Not Available as Section
 2 Claim, But Can Be Drawn by Redistricting Bodies Based on COIs or Neighborhoods
 - Challenges on whether to create a single majority-minority district or spread groups among two or more influence districts -- not necessarily cracking

California Law


- FAIR MAPS Act and Recent Amendments
 - Exemptions: If City Charter "provides two or more traditional criteria for redistricting other than the requirement that districts be equal in population" (Cal. Elec. Code § 21621(e))
 - Charter Cities Not Exempt From:
 - Population Equality Requirements
 - Federal/State Constitutional and Federal Voting Rights Act Requirements
 - Cal. Elec. Code § 21621(d)
 - "The council shall not adopt council district boundaries for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against a political party."
- Education Code § 5019.5

Oakland City Charter – Ranked Criteria

- Federal Criteria:
 - Population Equality and Federal Constitution
 - Voting Rights Act of 1965
 - California VRA Not Applicable to Redistricting
- Ranked "Traditional Criteria"
 - Contiguity
 - Maintaining Integrity of Neighborhoods and Communities of Interest
 - Compactness
 - Prohibition on Favoring or Discriminating Against Incumbents or Candidates
 - Additional Criteria Established By Commission
 - Lowest Ranked and Must Be Consistent with Higher Ranked Criteria

Ranked Criteria: Contiguity

• "Districts shall be geographically contiguous."



Ranked Criteria: Neighborhoods and COIs

• "The geographic integrity of any local neighborhood or local community of interest shall be respected in a manner that minimizes their division to the extent possible without violating the requirements of any of the preceding subsections. A community of interest is a contiguous population that shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. Communities of interest shall not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates."

Ranked Criteria: Local Neighborhoods

- Some Neighborhoods Defined by Well-Known Boundaries:
 - Official city neighborhoods/neighborhood councils
 - Historical or commonly known boundaries
 - Other Sources: Real Estate Designations, Nextdoor.com
- Neighborhood Boundaries Obtainable through Census Data and through Public Input

Ranked Criteria: Local Communities of Interest (COIs)

- Charter Definition: "[A] contiguous population that shares common social <u>and</u> economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation." (emphasis added)
- Common examples:
 - Urban vs. vs. suburban vs. rural communities
 - Populations with similar economic interests and income-levels
 - Populations with common interests around:
 - Natural geographies (e.g., lakes, mountains)
 - Transportation hubs (e.g., airports)
 - Racial or ethnic communities
- Prohibited: Relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates

Ranked Criteria: Compactness

- "To the extent practicable, district boundaries shall be drawn to encourage geographical compactness such that nearby areas of population are not bypassed for more distant populations."
- "Eyeball" Testing vs. Mathematical or Algorithmic Testing

Prohibited Criteria: Political Parties, Incumbents, Candidates

- "The council shall not adopt council district boundaries for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against a political party." (Cal. Elec. Code § 21621(d) (applicable to all California charter cities)).
- "Districts may not be drawn for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against an incumbent or political candidate." (Oakland City Charter)

Ranked Criteria: Additional Commission-Set Criteria

- Example from FAIR MAPS Act:
 - "Council district boundaries should be easily identifiable and understandable by residents. To the extent practicable, council districts shall be bounded by natural and artificial barriers, by streets, or by the boundaries of the city." (Cal. Elec. Code § 21601(c)(3))
 - Examples:
 - Natural Barriers: Rivers, canyons, mountains, hills
 - Artificial Barriers: Freeways/highways, railroad tracks, canals
- Lowest ranked criteria
 - Commission Can Rank Additional Criteria

General Strategies for Legal Compliance

- Remain Attentive to Criteria Rankings and Articulate Them in Educational Materials and Documentation
 - Public May Try to Prioritize Criteria Differently, Particularly Around District
 Shape and Compactness
- Determine VRA Compliance Strategies Early in Process
- Develop Principles for Reconciling Potential Conflicts Among Criteria
 - Neighborhoods, COIs

Why are Communities of Interest Important?

- Tied to Public Participation in Redistricting Process
- Consideration of Level of Government and Effective Representation
- Can Obtain Information Prior To 2020 Census Data Availability
- Can Serve as Building Blocks for Districts
- Can Provide a Basis for Distinctions and District Boundaries
- May Intersect with Other Criteria, such as Voting Rights Act Compliance

Defining Communities of Interest

"The geographic integrity of any <u>local</u> neighborhood or <u>local</u> community of interest shall be respected in a manner that minimizes their division to the extent possible without violating the requirements of any of the preceding subsections. A community of interest is a contiguous population that shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. Communities of interest shall not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates." (emphasis added)

Elements of COIs: Locality and Contiguity

- Communities of Interest Must be Local
 - COI Should Not Be Too Expansive or Citywide
- Communities of Interest Must be <u>Contiguous</u>
- Can Recognize COI That Crosses City Boundaries, But Can Only Maintain COI Within Your Own Jurisdiction

Elements: Sharing Common Social and Economic Interests

- Example of Enumerated Listings (Source: Colorado Law State Level):
- "(II) Such interests include but are not limited to matters reflecting:
- (A) Shared public policy concerns of urban, rural, agricultural, industrial, or trade areas; and
- (B) Shared public policy concerns such as education, employment, environment, public health, transportation, water needs and supplies, and issues of demonstrable regional significance.
- (III) Groups that may comprise a community of interest include racial, ethnic, and language minority groups"

Elements: Effective and Fair Representation

- Relationships Between Interests, Representation, and Level of Government
- City Government and City Council Responsibilities, including:
 - Administration of Justice/Law Enforcement
 - Fire and Safety
 - Business Regulation/Taxation
 - Infrastructure
 - Housing and Human Services
 - Zoning and Land Use
 - Environmental Health
- School Board and Educational Interests

COI Example: Airport Proximity & City Council Districts

- Residential Areas Near a Local Airport
 - Geographic Proximity
 - Common Policy Issues:
 - Noise Abatement
 - Traffic
 - Zoning
 - Additional Commonalities:
 - Income Levels
 - Property Values; Renter vs. Homeowner
 - Representational Interests Because of City Council Oversight or Policy-Setting Powers

Special Consideration: Racial or Ethnic COIs

- Special Consideration: Race or Ethnicity
 - Close Relationship to Federal Voting Rights Act and Population Size
 - Federal Constitutional Issues When Using Race as a "Predominant Factor"
 - Should Look at Multiple Factors That Overlap With Race
 - E.g., Neighborhood Proximity, Socioeconomic Status
 - Be Attentive to Geography and Population Concentrations, As Well As Dispersion
 - Be Careful With Non-Compact Populations

Implementation Challenges

- Definitions and Expectations
 - Open-Ended vs. Enumerated Lists of COIs
 - Local COIs and Sizes of Districts
- Relative Rankings and Conflicts
 - Neighborhoods vs. COIs and COIs vs COIs
- Subjective vs. Objective Information
 - Public Comments, Testimony, Maps
 - Demographic Information, Including Census Data (ACS & 2020) and State/County/City Data
 - Statistical Analyses, such as Clustering and Factor Analysis
 - Electoral Data (e.g., Ballot Initiative Voting) But Be Careful About Prohibited COIs

Common Problems

- Gaps in Information
 - No Public Testimony from Certain Areas
 - Missing or Imprecise Boundaries
- Inconsistent Information
- Overlapping COIs
- Potential Manipulation
 - Mass Mobilization
 - Partisan or Incumbent-Based Interests vs. Community Interests

Public Input and Processing Strategies

- Education and Outreach (See Cal. Elec. Code § 21608)
 - Accessibility Issues: Disability, Language Groups
- Multiple Channels for Input Recommend But Do Not Require Specific Formats
 - Public Hearings and Testimony
 - FAIR MAPS Act Minimums
 - Attention to Expanding Participation, Community Locations, Hours
 - Submissions
 - Commission-Generated Forms
 - Low-Tech Can Be Just as Effective
 - Online Tools: DistrictR and Other Apps

Public Input and Processing Strategies

- Cataloguing
- Mapping Decisions
 - Reconciling Overlapping COIs
 - Weighting
 - Individual vs. Mobilized Testimony
 - Advocacy Group Submissions
 - Problem of Cherry Picking COI Information
- Iterative Mapping
 - Optional: Develop Pre-Draft COI and Neighborhood Maps
 - Drafts and Comments

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4. Disclosure Requirements by Commissioners

5. Redistricting Principles and Best Practices Training

The Commission received a training from Kathay Feng, National Redistricting Director at Common Cause, on the best practices for conducting Oakland's redistricting process. The training included information on the history of redistricting and formation of independent redistricting commissions, the importance of public access and participation, and best practices for engaging with the public.

Commissioners engaged in a question-answer session with Kathay Feng, Connie Malloy and Chris Chaffee, consultants with Redistricting Partners.

There were no public comments on this item.

6. Commission Deadline and Public Hearing Schedule

The Commission received a presentation from Deputy City Attorney Mitesh Bhakta on the Commission's legislative requirements in completing the redistricting process by December 31, 2021. The Commission also received staff's recommendation in conducting four public hearings at the Commission's regular meeting dates in August, September, October and November.

Commissioners discussed the proposed schedule and staff's proposal to conduct townhall meetings beginning in October to receive additional input from residents.

Commissioner Gloria Crowell was excused from the meeting at 6:39 pm.

Commissioner Mary Velasco exited the meeting at 6:55 pm.

A motion was made by Stephanie Goode, seconded by Paul Marshall, to continue this item to the special meeting on July 28, 2021. A substitute motion was made by Shirley Gee, seconded by Jan Stevens, to adopt staff's proposed public hearing schedule with the understanding that the Commission could add more public hearing dates. 7. Approval of Meeting Minutes

The Commission reviewed the draft meeting minutes. A motion was made by Benjie Achtenberg, seconded by Amber Blackwell, to approve the minutes for the meeting of May 26, 2021 and June 9, 2021. The motion passed with 10 ayes (Achtenberg, Blackwell, Gangas, Gee, Goode, Hamidi, Marshall, McKnight, Miller, Stevens) one not present (Velasco) and two excused (Crowell, Shah).

8. Redistricting Budget Update

City staff member Richard J. Luna provided an update on the \$40,000 in additional funds the City Council approved to assist the Commission's outreach and engagement work. Staff recommended the Commission form an ad hoc committee to develop a proposed scope of work that would be distributed to the City's on-call outreach consultants for consideration.

Commissioners discussed if the work should be assigned to an existing ad hoc committee, or if a new one should be formed with members of the various existing committees. 



Why is Redistricting Important?

- The Commission will approve new boundaries without bias or discrimination
- Goal is to approve a map that represents equal and equitable representation for all Oaklanders
- Redistricting occurs once every 10 years
- Direct consequences for communities' access to political power through elections, government policies and city laws

How is this Year Different?


2013

- City Councilmembers decision makers
- New districts avoid displacing incumbents from their current districts
- City Council sets criteria and priorities for redistricting process
- Redistricting takes place every 10 years, in years ending in 3 (i.e., 1993, 2003, 2013)

2021

- Volunteer Commissioners decision makers
- Commission cannot consider incumbents or candidates for office
- Top priorities set by City Charter, with Commissioners adopting additional criteria

What are Communities of Interest (COI)?

- A concentrated population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation
- Examples include areas where people share similar living standards, have similar cultures, use the same transportation facilities, have similar work opportunities, or have access to the same media

COI continued

- People can belong to multiple COI
- A COI is not the same as a district
- Identifying COI in Oakland are the key building blocks the Redistricting Commission will use in developing the new district boundaries

Commission Deadline

- City Charter dictates a December 31st deadline for approving the final boundary maps
- Should the Commission not meet the deadline, then a temporary map is issued with assistance from City staff

REDISTRICTING COMMISSION

Learn more about the redistricting process in Oakland.

What is Redistricting?

Redistricting is the process of drawing new boundaries for congressional, state and local districts. Redistricting occurs every 10 years, after the completion of the U.S. Census. The Oakland Redistricting Commission will redraw the boundaries for the City Council and Oakland Unified School Board districts. The California Citizens Redistricting Commission is responsible for congressional and state districts.

When was the Oakland Redistricting Commission formed?

In 2014, Oaklanders overwhelmingly voted for Measure DD, which created a new independent and non-politically affiliated Oakland Redistricting Commission. This measure removed and prevents elected officials from participating in the city's redistricting process.

The inaugural Oakland Redistricting Commission was formed in September 2020 and meets regularly on the second Wednesday of the month at 5:00 pm.

Who serves on the Oakland Redistricting Commission?

Fifteen community members serve on the Oakland Redistricting Commission. The Commissioners represent each of the city's districts and have been Oakland residents for at least three years. All Commissioners applied and were screened by a panel through an open and transparent process.

WHY DOES THIS MATTER TO OAKLANDERS?

This is the first community led redistricting process for Oakland. The purpose of the Commission is to redraw the districts' boundaries without bias or discrimination, whether for or against, any incumbent, candidate, political party or demographic in the city's population. The outcome of the redistricting process is a redrawn map of the city that represents equal and equitable representation for all Oaklanders.

The redrawn districts have direct consequences for communities' access to political power through elections, government policies and city laws. Elected officials propose and adopt policies and laws that may impact communities for the next 10 years, until the next census, or beyond.

What are the legal requirements for redistricting in Oakland?

The new districts will comply with all federal, state and local laws, have reasonably equal populations across districts and be geographically contiguous. The Commission will respect neighborhoods and communities of interest, and will not consider home addresses of current elected officials or future candidates for office in the maps. The Commission may also establish additional criteria in how it prioritizes its work.

How long will Redistricting take and what's involved?

The redistricting process officially started in October 2020, when the Commission met for the first time. The final redrawn district maps must be approved by December 31, 2021. This will ensure the new district boundaries are in place before the 2022 Oakland elections. The Commission will use 2020 U.S. Census data to determine the new maps.

The Commission will receive the final census numbers in mid-2021 indicating the current demographics and changes to Oakland's population. In early 2021, the Commission will select a consultant to assist their work.

The public will have full access to maps produced and under the Commission's review in a manner designed to achieve the widest public input and feedback as possible. Public comment will be offered in multiple formats and Commission meetings will include a variety of hours. All potential maps will be made available for public comment for a minimum of 14 days prior to the Commission voting on the proposal.

How will the Redistricting Commission engage with the public?

The Commission will hold an open process for receiving public input and deliberation. It will be promoted through an extensive outreach program to solicit broad public participation. This includes engaging with the public prior to any maps are drawn, along with receiving critical feedback on draft maps as they are developed.

Data alone does not explain Oakland. Therefore, the redistricting process relies heavily on public engagement, which is essential for understanding and identifying Oakland's diverse communities. In preparation for their public service, the Commissioners are trained to complete this work in an open and transparent process as the voters intended.

HOW TO GET INVOLVED

The Redistricting Commission invites you to attend the monthly meetings and any special meetings of the Commission. All meetings are open to the public with schedules, notices and agendas posted on the Commission's website.

¿Qué es la redistribución de distritos?

La redistribución de distritos es el proceso de establecer nuevos límites para los distritos electorales, estatales y locales. La redistribución de distritos se realiza cada 10 años, después de la finalización del censo de los EE. UU.). La Comisión de Redistribución de Distritos de Oakland volverá a restablecer los límites de los distritos del Concejo de la Ciudad y de la Junta Escolar Unificada de Oakland. La Comisión Ciudadana de Redistribución de Distritos de California es responsable de los distritos electorales y estatales.

¿Cuándo se formó la Comisión de Redistribución de Distritos de Oakland?

En 2014, los habitantes de Oakland votaron en su mayoría por la Medida DD, que creó una nueva Comisión de Redistribución de Distritos de Oakland independiente y sin intereses políticos. Esta medida eliminó e impidió que los funcionarios electos participaran en el proceso de redistribución de los distritos de la ciudad.La Comisión de Redistribución de Distritos de Oakland inicial se formó en septiembre de 2020 y se reúne con regularidad el segundo miércoles del mes a las 5:00 p. m.

¿Quiénes forman parte de la Comisión de Redistribución de Distritos de Oakland?

En la Comisión de Redistribución de Distritos de Oakland participan quince miembros de la comunidad. Los comisionados representan a cada uno de los distritos de la ciudad y han sido residentes de Oakland por al menos tres años. Todos los comisionados se postularon y fueron seleccionados por un panel a través de un proceso abierto y transparente. ¿POR QUÉ ES IMPORTANTE PARA LOS HABITANTES DE OAKLAND?

Este es el primer proceso de redistribución de distritos de la comunidad para Oakland. El propósito de la Comisión es volver a establecer los límites de los distritos sin prejuicios ni discriminación, ya sea a favor o en contra de cualquier funcionario, candidato, partido político o demográfico de la población de la ciudad. El resultado del proceso de redistribución de distritos es un mapa restablecido de la ciudad que constituye una representación igualitaria y equitativa para todos los habitantes de Oakland.

La redistribución de distritos se realiza una vez cada 10 años. Los distritos restablecidos tienen consecuencias directas para el acceso de las comunidades al poder político a través de las elecciones, a las políticas gubernamentales y a las leyes de la ciudad. Los funcionarios electos proponen y adoptan políticas y leyes que pueden impactar a las comunidades durante los próximos 10 años, hasta el próximo censo, o incluso después.

¿Cuáles son los requisitos legales para la redistribución de distritos en Oakland?

Los nuevos distritos cumplirán con todas las leyes federales, estatales y locales, tendrán poblaciones razonablemente iguales en todos los distritos y se mantendrán contiguos en términos geográficos. La Comisión respetará los vecindarios y comunidades de interés, y no considerará en los mapas las direcciones de los actuales funcionarios electos o futuros candidatos a cargos públicos. La Comisión también podrá establecer criterios adicionales en la forma en que prioriza su trabajo.

¿Cuánto tiempo tomará la redistribución de distritos y qué implica?

Este proceso comenzó oficialmente en octubre de 2020, cuando la Comisión se reunió por primera vez. Los mapas finales de los distritos restablecidos deben aprobarse antes del 31 de diciembre de 2021. Esto asegurará que los nuevos límites de los distritos se establezcan antes de las elecciones de Oakland de 2022.

La Comisión usará los datos del censo de los EE. UU. de 2020 para determinar los nuevos mapas. La Comisión recibirá los números finales del censo a mediados del 2021, que indicarán la demografía actual y loscambios en la población de Oakland. A principios de 2021, la Comisión seleccionará un consultor que lo ayude en su trabajo.

El público tendrá acceso completo a los mapas producidos y bajo la revisión de la Comisión de forma tal que se obtenga el mayor aporte y retroalimentación del público como sea posible. Se ofrecerán comentarios del público en múltiples formatos y las reuniones de la Comisión incluirán una variedad de horarios. Todos los posibles mapas se pondrán a disposición del público para que este formule observaciones durante un mínimo de 14 días antes de que la Comisión proceda a la votación de la propuesta.

¿Cómo se relacionará la Comisión de Redistribución de Distritos con el público?

La Comisión llevará a cabo un proceso abierto para recibir las opiniones y deliberaciones del público. Se promoverá a través de un extenso programa de divulgación para solicitar una amplia participación del público. Esto incluye la participación del público antes de que se tracen los mapas, así como la recepción de comentarios críticos sobre los borradores de los mapas a medida que se vayan desarrollando.

Los datos por sí solos no explican lo que ocurre en Oakland. Por lo tanto, el proceso de redistribución de distritos depende en gran medida de la participación pública, que es fundamental para comprender e identificar las diversas comunidades de Oakland. Para prepararse para su servicio público, los comisionados están capacitados para completar este trabajo en un proceso abierto y transparente como los votantes lo quisieron.

¿CÓMO SE PUEDE PARTICIPAR?

La Comisión de Redistribución de Distritos lo invita a asistir a las reuniones mensuales y a cualquier reunión especial de la Comisión. Todas las reuniones están abiertas al público con horarios, avisos y agendas publicados en el sitio web de la Comisión: www.oaklandca.gov/redistricting. La Comisión se reúne el segundo miércoles de cada mes a las 5:00 p. m., con excepción de los días festivos locales y federales. 屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選區重劃

什麼是選區重劃?

選區重劃是一項為國會、州和地方選區重新劃定分界的程序。選區重劃在每十年一次的美國人口普查 (U.S.Census) 完成後進行。屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選區重劃委員會 (Oakland Redistricting Commission) 將重新劃定屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市議會選區和屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市聯合學區的分界。加州公民選區重劃委員會 (California Citizens Redistricting Commission) 將負責劃定國會和加州選區分界。

屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選區重劃委員會在何時成立?

在 2014 年,屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選民以壓倒性票數通過了「DD 議案」(Measure DD),並據此成立了一個全新、獨立且與任何政治團體均無連帶關係的屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選區重劃委員會。此議案已排除並預防民選官員參與本市選區重劃程序。

屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選區重劃委員於 2020 年 9 月上任,並固定於每月第二個星期三下午 5:00 開會。

屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選區重劃委員由誰擔任?

屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選區重劃委員由十五名社區成員擔任。這些委員代表了本市每個選區,並且在屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市至少居住三年。所有委員均透過公開透明的程序提出申請,並由一個專責小組進行篩選。 委員簡歷和申請資料均會公佈在委員會官網,網址:

這件事對屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市民為什麼重要?

這是屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市第一次由社區主導選區重劃工作。委員會宗旨是在沒有偏見或歧視的情況下重劃 區域邊界,也就是不計對現任官員、候選人、政黨或本市人口群體的支持或反對。選區重劃程序最終 將為本市重新劃定一份能公平公正代表所有屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市民的地圖。

選區重劃每十年進行一次。重新劃定的選區將直接影響社區通過選舉、政府政策和市法律取得政治權力的結果。民選官員將提案和通過多項政策和法律,而這些政策和法律會影響社區在未來十年 (直至下次普查) 甚至更久的發展。

屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市的選區重劃有哪些法律要求?

新選區將符合所有聯邦、州和地方法律的規定;各地選區擁有合理均等的人口,且具備地理連續性。委員會將尊重鄰里和社區的共同利益,且不會考慮現任官員或未來候選人的住家地址在地圖上的位置。委員會還可能制訂更多標準,用來決定重劃工作的優先順序。

選區重劃要花多久時間? 涉及哪些因素?

選區重劃程序已從 2020 年 10 月委員會第一次開會起正式啟動。最終的選區重劃地圖必須在 2021 年 12 月 31 日表決通過。如此才能確保新的選區分界在 2022 年屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市選舉前定案。

委員會將採用 2020年美國人口普查的數據來決定新地圖的劃分。在 2021 年中,委員會將收到 最終普查數據,其中將顯示屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市目前人口的群體分布和變化。在 2021 年初,委員會 將選擇一名顧問來協助這項工作。

大眾將可完全存取已製作且委員會正在審查的地圖,目的是為了收集最廣泛的大眾意見和反饋。 大眾將可通過多種形式提供意見,且委員會將安排不同時間長短的會議。在委員會對任何提議的 地圖表決以前,至少會有 14 天時間供大眾查閱和提供意見。

選區重劃委員會將如何讓大眾參與?

委員會將採用一套公開程序來收集大眾意見和考慮事項。委員會將通過全面性外展計劃來宣傳,以徵 求廣大群眾的參與。這項計劃包括在繪製任何地圖前先與大眾交流,以及在繪製草圖後收集重要的公 眾反饋。

單憑數據並不能看見屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市全貌。因此,選區重劃程序大部份需仰賴大眾參與;這是瞭解和 識別屋崙 (奧克蘭) 市多元化社區的基本要素。在準備擔任公職時,所有委員將接受培訓,以便能遵照 選民意願,用公開透明的方式完成份內工作。

你可以如何參與?

選區重劃委員會邀請你參與委員會的每月會議和任何特別會議。所有會議都對大眾開放;委員會官網將公佈時間表、會議通知和議程,網址:www.oaklandca.gov/redistricting。委員會目前在每月第二個星期三下午5:00 開會,但市政府和聯邦假日除外。你亦可上網提交意見和建議,網址:

TÁI PHÂN CHIA KHU VỰC Ở THÀNH PHỐ OAKLAND

Tái phân chia Khu vực là gì?

Tái phân chia Khu vực là quá trình vẽ ranh giới mới cho các khu vực thuộc quốc hội, tiểu bang và địa phương. Việc tái phân chia này diễn ra 10 năm một lần, sau khi hoàn thành cuộc Điều tra Dân số Hoa Kỳ. Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực Oakland sẽ vẽ lại ranh giới cho các học khu của Hội đồng Thành phố và Hội đồng Trường học Thống nhất Oakland. Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực Công dân California sẽ chiu trách nhiệm về các khu vực thuộc quốc hội và tiểu bang.

Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực Oakland được thành lập khi nào?

Vào năm 2014, các cư dân Oakland đã bỏ phiếu áp đảo cho Dự luật DD, để thành lập ra một Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực Oakland độc lập và không có liên kết về mặt chính trị. Dự luật này đã loại bỏ và ngăn các viên chức được bầu tham gia vào quá trình tái phân chia khu vực của thành phố.

Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực Oakland ban đầu được thành lập vào Tháng Chín năm 2020 và họp định kỳ vào ngày Thứ Tư thứ hai mỗi tháng vào lúc 5:00 pm.

Những ai phục vụ trong Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực Oakland?

Mười lăm thành viên cộng đồng phục vụ trong Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực Oakland. Các Ủy viên đại diện cho từng khu vực thuộc thành phố và họ phải là cư dân của Oakland trong ít nhất ba năm. Tất cả các Ủy viên phải nộp đơn ghi danh và được một ban hội thẩm sàng lọc thông qua một quy trình công khai và minh bạch. TẠI SAO ĐIỀU NÀY LẠI QUAN TRỌNG ĐỐI VỚI CÁC CƯ DÂN OAKLAND?

Đây là quy trình phân chia lại khu vực do cộng đồng lãnh đạo đầu tiên ở Oakland. Mục đích của Ủy ban là vẽ lại ranh giới của các khu vực nhưng phải đảm bảo sẽ không có thành kiến hay tình trạng phân biệt đối xử nào, dù là ủng hộ hay chống lại bất kỳ viên chức đương nhiệm, ứng cử viên, đảng phái chính trị hay khu vực nhân khẩu học cụ thể nào trong dân số của thành phố. Kết quả của quá trình phân chia lại khu vực sẽ là một bản đồ được vẽ lại của thành phố, thể hiện được sư đại diện bình đẳng và công bằng cho tất cả cư dân Oakland.

Việc tái phân chia khu vực diễn ra 10 năm một lần. Các khu vực được vẽ lại sẽ mang lại tác động trực tiếp đến việc tiếp cận với quyền lực chính trị của các cộng đồng thông qua các cuộc bầu cử, các chính sách của chính phủ và luật của thành phố. Các viên chức được bầu sẽ đề xuất và thông qua các chính sách và luật có thể tác động đến các cộng đồng trong 10 năm tới, cho đến cuộc điều tra dân số tiếp theo hoặc sau đó.

Các yêu cầu pháp lý đối với việc tái phân chia khu vực ở Oakland là gì?

Các khu vực mới sẽ tuân theo tất cả các luật của liên bang, tiểu bang và địa phương, có dân số tương đối đồng đều so với các khu vực khác và sẽ tiếp giáp nhau về mặt địa lý. Ủy ban sẽ tôn trọng các khu dân cư và cộng đồng có chung mối quan tâm, và sẽ không để ý đến địa chỉ nhà của các viên chức được bầu hiện tại hoặc các ứng cử viên tương lai cho chức vụ trên bản đồ. Ủy ban cũng có thể thiết lập các tiêu chí bổ sung về cách ưu tiên công việc của mình.

Việc Phân chia lại Khu vực sẽ diễn ra trong bao lâu và cần thực hiện những điều gì?

Quá trình phân chia lại khu vực chính thức bắt đầu vào Tháng Mười năm 2020, khi Ủy ban họp lần đầu tiên. Các bản đồ vẽ lại khu vực cuối cùng này phải được phê duyệt trước ngày 31 Tháng Mười Hai, 2021. Điều này để đảm bảo ranh giới của các khu vực mới sẽ được hoàn thành trước cuộc bầu cử năm 2022 ở Oakland.

Ủy ban sẽ sử dụng dữ liệu Điều tra Dân số Hoa Kỳ năm 2020 để xác định các bản đồ mới. Ủy ban sẽ nhận được dữ liệu điều tra dân số cuối cùng vào giữa năm 2021 cho biết số liệu về nhân khẩu học hiện tại và những thay đổi trong dân số của Oakland. Vào đầu năm 2021, Ủy ban sẽ chon một nhà tư vấn để hỗ trơ công việc của mình.

Công chúng sẽ có toàn quyền tiếp cận các bản đồ mới dưới sự xem xét của Ủy ban theo cách thức tiến hành để đạt được những ý kiến đóng góp và phản hồi sâu rộng nhất có thể. Ý kiến Nhận xét của công chúng sẽ được cung cấp dưới nhiều hình thức và các cuộc họp của Ủy ban sẽ diễn ra trong nhiều khung giờ khác nhau. Tất cả các bản đồ tiềm năng sẽ được cung cấp để lấy ý kiến nhận xét công chúng trong ít nhất 14 ngày trước khi Ủy ban bỏ phiếu về đề xuất.

Cách để Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực tương tác với công chúng?

Ủy ban sẽ tổ chức một quy trình công khai để tiếp nhận ý kiến đóng góp và thảo luận của công chúng. Quy trình này sẽ được thúc đẩy thông qua một chương trình tiếp ngoại sâu rộng để thu hút sự tham gia trên diện rộng của công chúng. Điều này bao gồm việc tương tác với công chúng trước khi vẽ bất kỳ bản đồ nào, cùng với việc nhận các ý kiến phản hồi quan trọng về các bản đồ dự thảo khi chúng được xây dựng.

Chỉ sử dụng dữ liệu để phân chia lại khu vực cho Oakland là không đủ. Vì vậy, quy trình phân chia lại khu vực sẽ chủ yếu dựa vào sự tham gia của công chúng, vốn rất cần thiết để hiểu và xác định được các cộng đồng đa dạng của Oakland. Để chuẩn bị cho việc phục vụ cộng đồng của mình, các Ủy viên sẽ được huấn luyện để hoàn thành công việc này theo một quy trình công khai và minh bạch như theo mong muốn của cử tri.

Ủy ban Tái phân chia Khu vực mời quý vị tham dự các cuộc họp hàng tháng và mọi cuộc họp đặc biệt của Ủy ban. Ủy ban hiện họp vào ngày Thứ Tư thứ hai của mỗi tháng vào lúc 5:00 PM, ngoại trừ các ngày lễ của thành phố và liên bang.
